
role in opening the port and inlet for deep-water commerce in 1921 has left a lasting impact.

Journey: 450 Years of African American History at the Sunrise Theater

Derek Boyd Hankerson of **Hankerson Henry Productions** announces an evening of guest speakers followed by the film showing of "Journey: 450 Years of African American History." **Sunrise Theatre** concessions will be available.

In addition to Hankerson, presenters include Melanie Hayling George, a Fort Pierce native, daughter of Charlie Hayling, and niece of Dr. Robert Hayling. Dr. Hayling was the advisor to the NAACP during the Civil Rights movements in Florida. Former Fort Pierce Florida State Representative, Larry Lee, who founded *Lincoln Park Main Street*, will also be a presenter.

Hankerson, whose family hails from St. Augustine, is a filmmaker, social scientist, and Florida Atlantic University faculty member. His presentation will show how the film, the city of Fort Pierce, the Hayling's family, and his own family's genealogy connect to Florida, especially St. Augustine, and the Civil Rights Movement.

Mr. Hankerson's great aunt was the Dean of Girls at Florida Memorial College in St. Augustine and built her 12-room Victorian home on Bridge Street in 1930. She shared here knowledge and wealth of with Hankerson, her great nephew, who also co-produced a 30-minute documentary on St. Augustine's role in the passage of the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

When asked about the "450 Years" film, Mr. Hankerson stated, "I feel this film is one of my greatest works on the accurate account of how and why Former President Lyndon Baines Johnson signed the civil rights act after seeing the events that occurred in St. Augustine led by Dr. Martin Luther King, Ambassador Andrew Young, Dr. Robert Hayling, and others."

Mayor's Message City Marina Expansion and Clearing the Inlet

ur City of Fort Pierce Marina is in high demand and has a continual waitlist. Its high popularity with the boating community is due, in part, to the Fort Pierce Inlet, the widest, deepest and most navigable Inlet on Florida's east coast, but also

because the *City of Fort Pierce* has made the necessary investments in the marina to make it an attractive place to stay and live. Recently, the City Commission agreed to take our marina to the next level and expand the marina to accommodate more and larger vessels.

Our city marina is a 24/7 floating five-star hotel that welcomes boaters from all over the world. They enjoy our downtown amenities, and over the years, some have purchased property in our area. Our City Commission recognizes the importance of a first-class, state-of-the-art marina facility that both enhances, and is enhanced by, our downtown. The Commission knows the vital importance of optimizing the city marina operations, and that includes working cooperatively with the Army Corps of Engineers to maintain dredging of the channel to appropriate depths.






The Commission also agreed to partner with St. Lucie County to establish Anchoring Limitation Zones to unclog the Fort Pierce Inlet of the many vessels that have crowded there. A recent state statute allows St. Lucie County to establish temporary anchoring in identified zones for 45 days. These zones will be located in the Indian River Lagoon and monitored by a new city marine unit that will register each new arrival. There are plans for the marine unit to be multipurposed and include pump-out capabilities. This effort will not only protect the Derecktor mega yacht facility but also provide for safer boating in the Inlet and provide for more environmental protection for the Inlet, the Lagoon and all our waterways.



Fort Pierce Artist Lands On Moon: Michael Nash's Lunar Legacy

In the vast expanse of the cosmos, only a select few human creations have transcended the boundaries of our planet's atmosphere. Among these remarkable achievements is the acclaimed film "Climate Refugees" by local filmmaker Michael

Nash from Fort Pierce. On February 22, 2024, a lunar time capsule dedicated to arts and humanity touched down on the moon's surface, marking America's return to lunar exploration since the early 1970s. Among the chosen few to be curated into this capsule were 222 artists spanning the past 2,000 years, including luminaries such as Rembrandt, Beethoven, Van Gogh, Bob Dylan, Elvis and our very own Treasure Coast filmmaker and artist, Michael P. Nash.



For Nash, who moved from Chicago to Fort Pierce in 1976 when his parents Phil and Alice Nash acquired the Cadillac, Pontiac, and Jeep dealership in the area, the significance of this inclusion is profound. Reflecting on his upbringing in Fort Pierce, and witnessing rocket launches along the Indian River, Nash expressed his surreal sense of pride, knowing that his artwork has now become part of humanity's narrative, preserved for future generations to discover in the lunar museum. Nash, who tireless dedication to shedding light on environmental issues through film has earned the founder of *Beverly Hills Productions* acclaim, including a place among *MovieMaker* magazine's "Top 10 MovieMakers For The Planet."

"Nash, along with producer Justin Hogan, traveled around the world in 2008-2009 shooting the film in search of the human face of climate change. The documentary made waves at the *Sundance Film Festival*, gained

distribution on Netflix, and became an instrument of change for heads of state and policymakers globally. Reflecting on the lunar invitation, Nash expressed profound gratitude, recognizing the honor bestowed upon him and his team. The film can be viewed at www.ClimateRefugees. com. A sequel to the 2010 award-winning film is currently in production; Nash has partnered with Leonardo DiCaprio

and George DiCaprio on the new film titled 'Chasing Truth,' set to be released in late 2026."

The collaboration behind this historic event brings together the forces of NASA, the Arch Mission Foundation, SpaceX, and BlueSpace. Nash's film, the sole documentary film curated into the time capsule, underscores the role of art in documenting and confronting the global challenges we face. From the depths of space, it carries a message of hope and resilience, reminding us of our interconnectedness and the importance of preserving our planet for future generations. In this transcendent moment, art and science converge, uniting humanity in a shared vision for a better tomorrow. •






City of Fort Pierce Mayor Linda Hudson is our 2024 Home Rule Hero




Ecology 101: Habitat and Niche

In nature, any given species will interact with many other species living in the same area as well as participate in ex-

changing a variety of simple materials between themselves and their environment. The interactions taking place between different species, such as competition, symbiosis, and predation, fall under the umbrella of community ecology. Through breathing, eating, and waste elimination, these same organisms take in and release chemicals (ex: water, oxygen, carbon,



nitrogen) from their bodies throughout their lifetimes. For example, humans breathe in oxygen and exhale carbon dioxide. By factoring in the complexities of these chemicals cycling in and out of living organisms, we thus bump ourselves up into a larger framework of study called ecosystem ecology. A main topic within both community and ecosystem ecology is learning where individual species live and the reasons why they are able to survive and reproduce.

The habitat of a species is defined as the location or physical setting in which it lives. For example, a habitat might be a forest floor, a slow meandering stream, a rocky mountaintop, or the shoreline of the ocean. Some species show habitat selection when they gravitate to a particular subset of the larger habitat. From a functional point of view, all species have a niche, the job or duties they perform within the habitat. There is a wide variety of roles that organisms fill, such as being a top carnivore (ex: lionfish), a herbivore (ex: manatee), photosynthesizer (ex: seagrass), or decomposer (ex: bacteria and fungi).

Habitats and niche preferences can be quite different for organisms that undergo major physical changes within their

lifetime. For insect species undergoing metamorphosis within their life cycle, we know that caterpillars form a cocoon and later emerge as a butterfly. As it turns out, the caterpillar and butterfly consume different foods (different niche) and live in different locations (different habitats). This is beneficial to the species as it reduces competition between the larval and adult

forms. On the other hand, the newly hatched and juveniles of many game fish live in protected, low energy mangrove habitats prior to growing larger and entering more open and energetic waters. Here, the two age groups of a single species have different habitats and niches. The *Indian River Lagoon* is a perfect spot to kayak and experience both of these relatively unspoiled areas.

One of the greatest threats to the planet is the vast reduction and/or outright destruction of habitats by human activities across both aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems. Habitat loss has



been brought about by such factors as agriculture, livestock, mining, urban development, and the pollution generated by these and other industries. It is estimated that about 15 million acres of tropical forest are being cleared annually, a rate that would completely eliminate the world's remaining tropical forests in 175 years. Unfortunately, if a species is unable to move to or adapt to a new habitat, it may become extinct. The IUCN Red List of Threatened Species has estimated that habitat loss was a contributing factor in the loss of 73% of the species that have become extinct in the last few hundred years.

One Year In: FPUA Launches Wastewater Wednesdays to Share Construction Progress on the New Sewer Treatment Plant

ver a year ago, Fort Pierce Utilities Authority (FPUA) began construction of the long-awaited sewer treatment plant on Energy Lane – the plant that, after over two decades of debates and planning and approvals, is finally becoming a reality. This one-year milestone is celebrated with

updates from the **FPUA** Board Chair Dr. Barbara M. Bennett, photos, and a new Social Media and sustainablesewer.net blog featured named *Wastewater Wednesdays*.

"The new sewer treatment plant is a forward-thinking project enhancing sustainability and community-centered service in Fort Pierce," Dr. Barbara M. Bennett, **FPUA** Board Chair said. "It is located in an industrial area, far away from the neighborhoods that we know and love; far away from the neighborhoods where our kids play and learn outdoors. During my time on the **FPUA** Board, I've seen first-hand how Fort Pierce's municipal utilities are the backbone of our community's commerce, education, medical care, public services, livelihood and well-being. Sustainable, reliable and affordable utility services are key to empowering underserved

communities, and they're essential for continued growth and expansion of our community."

Dr. Bennett champions this project as a native of Fort Pierce and an elementary school teacher at Francis K. Sweet Elementary School in addition to serving as chair of the **FPUA** Board. She is a highly engaged and devoted community member, helping those in need and maintaining leadership roles as a co-pastor at *Yahweh's Hands On Ministry, Inc.*, Chairperson of *Big Brothers Big Sisters Bowl for Kids Sakes* at Francis K. Sweet, Chairperson for Liberty Truth & Deliverance Eloquence Department, Chairperson and Founder of *New Horizons Gospel Concert*, Secretary for her local Homeowners Association, and more.

Dr. Bennett was also an early champion for pursuing grants as a funding opportunity for this project. **FPUA's** new inhouse grants development team successfully secured \$21 million of state and federal funding toward this project in the first year, with an additional \$67,600,000 proposals pending as of April 2024. Funds have been received with support from the *Florida Department of Environmental Protection Resilient Florida* program and appropriations sponsored by our local and state representatives at the State and Federal levels.





"These funds have been instrumental in making our vision a reality, and we hope you will join us in extending our sincerest gratitude to these organizations and individuals," continued Dr. Bennett.


Last month, in celebration of the one-year anniversary, **FPUA** launched a Social Media and Blog-Style webpage to provide weekly updates on construction progress of the new plant. The page provides updates for those with a growing interest in the project's progress and provides an avenue for sharing our growing collection of progress photos.

The weekly photo updates show the substantial progress that has been made in the past year including significant site preparation work, such as land clearing and fill, excavation of stormwater and process ponds, and final site grading of the future plant equipment structures. Recent photos show progress from the first quarter of 2024, including field crews constructing buildings, treatment tanks, stormwater and process ponds, and deep injection wells. Construction is expected to be completed in late 2025.





Ever play "Rock, Paper, Scissors" with a commercial diver, or hold a fishing rod or get in a boat for the first time or hear about the adventures of a member of the United States Coast Guard? This is what approximately 100 students from four schools in St. Lucie Public Schools did through the generosity of Fort Pierce Yacht Club members, multiple sponsors, volunteers, and maritime and marine repre-

sentatives. A collaboration of the *FPYC Foundation*, *St. Lucie Schools*, and the *City of Fort Pierce*, the goals of *Chart Your Course* are: introduce students to marine and maritime careers, provide students with information about jobs on or near the water, and provide a unique education experience for students.

On Thursday, February 22, students from St. Lucie Centennial West High, Westwood Academy, Lincoln Park Academy middle school, Dan McCarty middle school and *Project Lift* had the opportunity to explore and discover jobs and careers in the marine and maritime industry right here in Fort Pierce and along the Treasure Coast.

Through discovery and exploration students learned many things including how the *Fort Pierce Police Department Marine Unit* helps patrol the waters, how **Towboat US** helps aid and rescue boaters in need and how the **Freedom Boat Club** makes boating available to those who do not want the upkeep of their own boats. This is but a small sample of what students experienced at the FPYC and **River Walk Center**.



It is also a great deal more expensive to build from scratch rather than restoring a solidly built building and retrofitting it for modern times. It was so exciting to be a part of the multiple meetings, planning sessions, fundraising events, and then — to begin to see the progression of all of this planning come to fruition, step-by-step. A favorite memory was the day when the paint specialist carefully peeled away layers of paint to recover the original paint schematics and the Koblegard crest that is now visible on either side of the stage. Another exciting day was when the custom-made re-creation of the original marquee arrived and was mounted. The restoration of the Sunrise The**atre** played a major role in further investment in Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County. It was an amazing experience to be part of this process.
- What is a favorite memory about downtown Fort Pierce? My favorite memory of downtown Fort Pierce took place during the City's Centennial Celebration in February 2001. Along with *Main Street* director, Doris Tillman, the *Main* Street Marketing & Events coordinator at the time was Linette Trabulsy. She served as the committee chairwoman for the Centennial Celebration committee. It was a time when the community really came together to make this event spectacular. Corporations, community organizations, nonprofits, government officials, and many others all played key roles in each of the many special activities leading up to the actual Centennial Event. The Centennial Celebration event had many moving parts, and it went off without a hitch because of all the wonderful partnerships that took place. It was a very special time filled with community pride and cooperation.

- What is one of your favorite things to do downtown and/or what is something you would recommend for visitors and guest to do in downtown? When my kids were younger, we would visit the library, feed the fish in the marina, visit the Manatee Center or the Backus Gallery, get ice cream or a cupcake, and play in the Veteran's Memorial Park. When I can get away to shop, I enjoy how personable the business owners are. I try to do most of my Christmas shopping downtown and encourage everyone to consider downtown businesses as their first stop when they need a special, personalize gifts, etc. I also love going to the Farmer's Market and attending other events that take place downtown.
- What is your hope/wish for the future of downtown? I wish the spirit of the cooperation I mentioned above during the centennial committee would be one that resides in all of us all the time. It takes all of us pitching in together to invest in our community. From small contributions like picking up a stray piece of trash to volunteering with one of the many community organizations or keeping and investing money locally, we all play a part in making Fort Pierce a special place to live and visit.



May Fishing Report: Salty Groceries!

he calmer winds and milder **L** temperatures of May have us planning to target big kingfish and mahi mahi. Plus, grouper season opens May 1st! This time of year, we see an increase of bait in the area which means big fish are sure to follow and when you find the bait, you find the fish! Inshore, offshore, the inlet, the river, and the lagoon all offer a spectacular variety of species and habitats which is why our Treasure Coast waters are simply the best for putting fish on the dinner table.

Offshore, I suggest a slow troll with fresh ballyhoo, naked or skirted, at about 80 feet or more when fishing for mahi, also called dolphinfish. Weed lines and float-

ing debris are good places to find mahi hiding out and when you find one, a school should be close by. This month is also a great time to target big kingfish that are moving back up the beach in 90 to 120 feet of water. Mullet, threadfins, or blue runners on a slow troll are best choices to put kings on deck. You are allowed to catch kingfish all year with a limit of two per angler per day and they must be at least 24" to the fork.

As more bait enters the river, it's generally a productive time to fish the grass flats and oyster beds for red drum and snook. Red drum have been plentiful lately and will provide some great action as they are known for their strength and stamina. The snook bite has been on fire with all sizes being hooked and plenty of slots in the mix. You can get in on the snook action by using live bait like mullet, pilchards, and threadfin.



A tight drag will help handle the impressive fight from these popular but wily fish that are very good at cutting line on any nearby structure. Snook remain in season until June 1st.

Our Fishy Photo of the Month is a super 18-inch lane snapper caught on live shrimp by awesome angler Jack Curley. Way to fish, Jack!

Whether cooking blackened grouper fillets, snapper tacos, or a full seafood fest, it doesn't get any better than enjoying your own fresh, salty groceries. I've been fishing these local waters all my life and truly enjoy sharing the fun with my charter guests. Let me know when you're ready with that salty grocery list! Remember


