

Mayor's Message Honoring and Remembering the Florida Highwaymen



n February 17, the City of Fort Pierce and the Fort Pierce Redevelopment Agency (FPRA) holds its seventh annual Highwaymen Heritage Trail Art Show and Festival, funded from the city's Art in Public Places fund. The Florida Highwaymen are world-renown African Amer-

ican speed landscape artists who originated in the City of Fort Pierce in the 1950s. They painted local natural beauty with vibrant colors. They painted quickly on construction materials, rather than traditional art supplies. They sold their art out of their vehicles along Treasure Coast roadways, to tourists and natives alike, or by visiting local businesses.

The city and the FPRA rededicated the Jackie Caynon building at 1234 Avenue D for the location of a new Original Hall of Fame Florida Highwaymen Museum and History Center. The city received a Florida Department of State grant to retrofit the existing building to create a top-notch facility to



house and display valuable Highwaymen works of art and artifacts. The project received full funding in the amount of \$483,662. Funds are being used to transform the two-story, 3,200-square feet building located in the historical African American community of Lincoln Park to house valuable works of art.

Doretha Hair Truesdell leads the Board of Directors of the new museum. On Saturday, February 24, Doretha, an artist in the Highwaymen style, is guest of honor at the Downtown Fort Pierce Famers Market Anniversary Celebration, 8 a.m. to Noon, at the waterfront. The annual anniversary bags will feature her Royal Poinciana painting.

The A.E. Bean Backus Museum host its Original Florida Highwaymen on the Way to Fame 1954-2004 exhibit January 13 to March 3, featuring the art of Highwaymen Harold Newton, Alfred Hair, Livingston Roberts and Willie Daniels. The Original Highwaymen were inducted in 2004 into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. This exhibition of rarely seen paintings, gathered from private collections, celebrates their first fifty years of fame and bold course forward to the hard-won triumph of statewide recognition.







6th Annual "Celebrating Florida" Show

he artists Anita Prentice and Doretha Hair Truesdell are L excited to be showing together again at their *6th Annual* Celebrating Florida show and sale at Main Street Fort Pierce on Thursday, February 8th from 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. If you can't make the show on Thursday night there will be a second chance to see and add to your local artists' collection on Friday, February, 9th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Prentice and Hair Truesdell are pleased to have master wood artist Jack Shelton exhibiting with them again this year. Shelton has been creating award-winning wood art for over 30 years. He began making utilitarian pieces and then fell deeply in love with the grain, color and feel of wood. In Jack's hands,



wood is not an inanimate object — it comes alive. Shelton sees the beauty captured in the wood and releases it for all to see. His one-of-a-kind works of art have been shown all over the United States and are coveted by collectors worldwide.

You have probably seen and maybe even sat on Prentice's work. She is the mosaic artist responsible for the over 200 mosaic benches placed throughout St. Lucie County including at the Fort Pierce Jetty and Veterans Park. She is the resident artist for Heathcote Botanical Gardens and has created "Cobalt," a blue and white mosaic panda bear, a pair of mosaic lions and an old-fashioned hopscotch game in the Children's Garden. Prentice added a retired Florida roadside show gorilla, "Gloria," to


the Rain Forest. She is magnificent - completely mosaicked in upcycled old china. It is not a coincidence that one of the founders of the Garden was named Gloria Moore as Prentice chose to honor her memory and legacy with this installation. Prentice also works on a smaller scale and her mosaic landscapes, hibiscus and palm trees can be found hanging in most area homes. A couple of her lady bugs reside in France and one of her "Zora" portraits was exhibited in a show in Kent, England in 2022. Prentice was commissioned to create mosaic grave tributes to a number of the late Florida Highwaymen. In fact, that is how she first met Doretha Hair Truesdell, when she added a mosaic of his artwork to the grave marker for Hair Truesdell's late first husband, the Highwayman Alfred Hair.

Doretha Hair Truesdell was married to a Highwayman and is the mother of a 2nd generation Highwayman artist and most importantly, a Florida landscape painter in her own right. Hair Truesdell paints the Florida many of us have seen kayaking, on a hike or driving the back roads. The native landscape before it has been paved or gated. She is an articulate speaker and a

driving force behind the effort to have a Florida Highwaymen license plate added to Florida's specialty plate choices to honor these grassroots legends. Proceeds from plate sales will go towards funding and operating the Florida Highwaymen *Museum* in Fort Pierce.

FPUA WEOP Ceiling Insulation Program

This year, FPUA is revamping our Weatherization Education and Outreach Program (WEOP) to provide Blown-In Ceiling Insulation at no cost for FPUA electric customers while funding lasts. This new offering of the WEOP program will assist both homeowners and renters to reduce energy usage in their homes by adding up to 12 inches of ceiling insulation.

In Florida, the single largest consumer of energy in the home is air conditioning, and one of the best ways to assist your air conditioner is by insulating your ceiling. For that reason, this year's WEOP program will focus on ceiling insulation. While other factors may contribute to poor heating and cool-



ing, lack of ceiling insulation is a direct cause of escaping heat and escaped cool air. Some studies show that households can save upwards of 40% of their energy consumption with a well-insulated home!

The WEOP program is part of FPUA's community outreach and conservation initiatives that helps households weatherize their home and reduce energy costs year-round, increase a home's comfort, improve safety and health, and conserve energy use. Thanks to funding from the Florida Municipal Power Association (FMPA), we can customize our WEOP program to best meet the needs of FPUA electric customers.

To help FPUA customers learn about home-energy conservation and energy consumption, we provide home energy audit booklets and online resources that guide households thorough understanding home energy usage. Understanding energy use is key to an effective home-energy conservation plan.

Additionally, FPUA's online bill portal allows customers with Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) meters to track energy consumption and identify spikes in power usage. This easy-to-read data shows excessive energy usage and the potential benefit of improving your home heating and cooling costs with ceiling insulation. The addition of AMI meters to the electric service territory is part of FPUA's ongoing efforts to modernize our electric grid. Nearly 40% of almost 30,000 meters in the electric system have been upgraded to AMI so far.

FPUA designed an easy to follow WEOP application process that answers all your questions about eligibility criteria for this no-cost energy conservation program. Customer Service

representatives at FPUA are also available to review power consumption data with eligible households seeking no cost ceiling insulation under our WEOP program. Please note that homes with flat rooftops are not eligible for this weatherization program because the roof sheathing or roof decking frames do not have sufficient space between the frame and ceiling material to add the ceiling insulation.

> FPUA's online tools will quickly verify FPUA electric customers' eligibility for our blown-in ceiling insulation program. Your home must meet ceiling requirements and should not currently have ceiling insulation. Once your home is determined

eligible, a release of liability waiver must be signed, and then FPUA will hire licensed and insured contractors — at no cost to FPUA electric customers - to insulate your ceiling. There are no other obligations, costs or payments.

Homeowners and renters: Visit https://fpua.com/WEOP/ to learn if your home qualifies for FPUA's free ceiling insulation program. Funding for this no-cost program is limited. Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

This project represents one of many economical, conservation, and environmental projects led by FPUA including: storm-hardening and upgrading the electric grid for resiliency and reliability; relocating the sewer treatment plant off the Indian River Lagoon; lining sewer pipes with PVC to protect against inflow and outflow from cracks in aging clay pipes; installing several more acres of seagrass thanks to grant funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection Resilient Florida program; and more.



An Overnight Success 50 Years in the Making

Come See Fast Forward: The Original Florida Highwaymen on the Way to Fame 1954-2004

The next presentation of the 2023–24 season continues L the A.E. Backus Museum & Gallery's annual series of special exhibitions celebrating the unique art movement that traces its beginnings to our community. Fast Forward: The Original Florida Highwaymen on the Way to Fame 1954-2004 marks the 50th anniversary of the painters' induction into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. Fast Forward is on view January 13 through March 3, 2024 at 500 N. Indian River Drive in Historic Downtown Fort Pierce.

When a nineteen-year-old Harold Newton became inspired to paint the Florida landscape in 1954, his vision, courage, and accomplishments encouraged his friends and neighbors to take up paintbrushes and follow a new path as professional artists. Over time, dozens of individuals joined the fast painting venture that elevated the natural beauty of the Sunshine State and unintentionally founded a movement.

Yet their progress over the decades was no secret. Their achievements were recorded in contemporary newspapers, documenting their work for local and regional audiences.

After more than fifty years in becoming an overnight success, the 26 landscape artists now known as The Original Highwaymen were inducted in 2004 into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame.

Fast Forward presents an exhibition of more than 50 rarely or never-before-seen paintings assembled from 10 private collections from around the state, including works by Harold Newton (1934–1994), Alfred Hair (1941–1970), Livingston Roberts (1942-2004), R.A. "Roy" McLendon (b.1932), Sam Newton (b. 1948), Mary Ann Carroll (1940-2019), Willie Daniels (1950-2021), and others. The exhibition includes notable newspaper appearances from the past, all celebrating the artists' first 50 years of fame and charting their bold course forward to the hard-won triumph of statewide recognition ---exemplified by the original Florida Artists Hall of Fame award "La Florida," conferred to the group in Tallahassee in 2004 and presented for public display in *Fast Forward* for the first time in 20 years.



New Year, New Assessment

Tor property owners in Florida, January 1 valuation isn't Γ just the start of a new year: it's also the official assessment date for property taxes. This means the Saint Lucie County Property Appraiser's Office determines your property's value and eligibility for exemptions as of that date.

What does this mean for you? Your property value will be based on its "just market value" as of January 1. This means considering factors like comparable sales in your neighborhood, recent additions, and overall market conditions.

If you bought your property in 2023, the property's value will be reset to just market value and any exemptions or caps from the previous owner will no longer apply. This will also be the first year to apply for Homestead Exemption, Portability, or any other exemptions you may qualify for. Ready to claim your exemptions?

The good news is, filing for exemptions is easy. You can do it online at www.paslc.gov before the deadline of March 1, 2024. Don't miss out on valuable savings!

What to expect next: You'll receive your TRIM Notice in mid-August. This notice will outline your property's assessed value, any exemptions applied, and your estimated property tax liability.

Here are some additional tips for navigating the January 1 assessment: Visit our website at www.paslc.gov to learn more about how your value is determined and the various exemptions available to residents. Additionally, you can view videos about our TRIM process and information for new homeowners.

Understand that your taxable value the first year of purchase may increase the next year dependent upon the exemptions applied under the previous owner.

Contact the Property Appraiser's Office if you have any questions: we are here to assist you in the assessment and exemption process.

With a little planning and preparation, you can easily navigate the January 1 assessment and ensure you are receiving all exemptions you are entitled to.



They set up a guiding Board of Directors and recruited a manager. Mrs. Neal said, "We projected we would have twelve vendors that first year with hopes for 25." The market now has space for three times that number.

announced **FPYC** was supporting the **FPUA** and the **Manatee** Center grant proposal to help restore seagrass along the Indian River. And the good news is that the project was started in 2023 and there is now a series of PVC pipes along the shore east of the FPYC clubhouse. These PVC pipes will be used to specifically identify areas of seagrass and measure the change of our seagrass over time

The FPYC collaborates with Main Street Fort Pierce in hosting Coffee with the Mayor, and at the February 2023, Coffee with the Mayor, Robynn and Steve Holland, members of the FPYC were recognized as volunteers of the month. In March, the FPYC sponsored Coffee with the Mayor and chose Dorethea Hair-Truesdell as the volunteer of the mouth for her outstanding contributions to the community, and at the May Coffee with the Mayor, the sponsor, Treasure Coast Youth Sailing recognized Forest Blanton, FPYC Commodore, as volunteer of the month for his outstanding service to the TCYSF.

The FPYC hosts the Manatee Observation and Education Center (MOEC) Lunch and Learn Program throughout the year and during the summer, hosts the Fort Pierce Jazz and **Blues Society** for their summer series.

Additional donations given from the FPYC Foundation included a donation to the Alexander Family Christmas Toy Drive, the Marine Cleanup Initiative, an organization involved in creating artificial reefs by sinking ships, and the Annual Treasure Coast Waterway Cleanup.

Fall in Love with Fishing!


ne thing we love about our amazing Treasure Coast waters is the abundant opportunities for great fishing adventures. This month anglers will be enjoying catching snapper, pompano, snook, triggerfish, sheepshead, and Spanish mackerel. February is a terrific time to plan on targeting sheepshead on the shallow reefs near shore while they are in for feeding and breeding, although they can be caught year-round in our area. Sheepshead are generally known to be bait thieves and difficult to hook, but with a little skill, we can fill up the fish box. Gray triggerfish and Florida pompano are also being reported this time of year around the inshore reefs and both are very good on the table.

Best results for sheepshead will be seen using live shrimp on light tackle with 30-pound fluorocarbon leader and a quarterounce jig. Run out to the shallow reefs along the beach in about 20 to 30 feet of water and plan to fish first thing in the morning as the sun comes up for some great action. Anglers of all ages will love the excitement of catching a sheepshead with almost every drop of bait! One of my favorite fish to catch in February is the elusive snook. Many anglers will be hoping to avoid heartbreak by landing that first keeper snook of the season which opens February 1st. A "keeper" snook is one that falls within the FWC slot regulation of no less than 28 inches and no more than 32 inches and causes an angler to fall in love with snook fishing! Snook can be targeted in the inlet and around the jetties on both incoming and outgoing tides using live mullet, pilchards, and threadfins.
