In addition to our monthly Friday Fest and Coffee with the Mayor events we have several

other events going on this Spring.

We are very excited to share with you that the *Main Street* Fort Pierce Annual Reverse Raffle Event will take place on Saturday evening April 20th at the Pelican Yacht Club on Hutchinson Island. Main Street's mission is to preserve, promote and build on historic and natural treasures of our downtown waterfront and



the Platts/Backus House needs repairs/renovations so we've added an additional event this year to raise the funds — "Talk Derby to Me!" This event will take place on May 4th and the time will coincide with the actual Kentucky Derby. We plan to make this an annual event. There will be a limited number of tickets sold. Ladies start shopping for that perfect hat because there will be a hat contest! Men prepare your taste buds for Bourbon Tasting and maybe a horse race of your own. All proceeds from this event will go towards the restoration of the Platts/Backus House.

This house is stop #8 on the Zora Neal Hurston Dust Tracks Heritage Trail. AE (Bean) Backus was a friend of author Zora Neal Hurston. He was a self-trained artist who painted Florida landscapes. He launched the movement of the Highwaymen who were a group of artists around the Fort Pierce area who quickly created Florida folk art featuring landscapes from oil paints on Upson Board used as roof sheeting. From 1950-1980 they would anonymously sell the art out of the trunks of their cars on A1A and US 1 from Daytona to Miami.

After Backus became established as an artist he was able to purchase the Platt House built by Dr. Platts in 1896 at 122 Avenue C to use as a new art studio. It was close to his former studio so he would not lose clients from the move. He continued creating art here from 1960 until his death from a heart attack in 1990.

Today the original Platts-Backus House has been restored as the headquarters of Main Street Fort Pierce. The street in front of the house was renamed A.E. Backus Avenue in honor of Fort Pierce's famous artist. The house is now used as an art gallery and to host art exhibitions (https://www.yelp.com/biz/ historic-platts-backus-house-fort-pierce). If this building could talk, can you imagine the stories that it would tell?

Speaking of art exhibitions. Hats off to an amazing Art Show in February, by Anita Prentice, Doretha Hair Truesdell and Jack Shelton and a huge thank you to all of those who attended.



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Mayor's Message Coast Guard's Historic Presence in Fort Pierce

The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 58, which just celebrated its 80th birthday, and the City of Fort Pierce are pursuing a "Coast Guard City" designation by making special efforts to acknowledge the professional work of the Coast Guard men and women assigned to this area.


Coast Guard Cities regularly reach out to Coast Guard personnel and their families and make them feel at home in their "home away from home."

In Fort Pierce, since the mid-1930s, the *United States Coast Guard* (USCG) is part of the Miami sector. Its territory includes the waters from Sebastian to Stuart, and Lake Okeechobee. Station Fort Pierce, located at 900 Seaway Drive, safeguards the Treasure Coast specializing in search and rescue, maritime law enforcement and marine environmental protection. Created in 1790, the USCG is a maritime, military, multi-mission service unique among the United States eight

military branches for having a maritime law enforcement mission with jurisdiction in both domestic and international waters and a federal regulatory agency mission as part of its duties.

Since 1942, Flotilla 58, located at 1400 Seaway Drive, has been serving the boating public of Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County. During World War II, Flotilla 58 members used their boats to patrol the sea, performed many rescues, and patrolled the waters to prevent looting of wrecked vessels. Flotilla 58 provides direct support to the *Coast Guard* and the boating community in Boating Safety Courses, Vessel Safety Checks, Marine Recreational Boating Safety, Aviation and radio operations, and strong fellowship among members.

Fort Pierce is proud to have the *Coast Guard* in our city. 




RICHARD K. DAVIS CONSTRUCTION: HISTORY WITH A STRONG FUTURE



When Richard K. Davis ran away from his West Virginia home at 15-years old in 1945, he made his way to South Florida, traveling through Fort Pierce. Though he eventually returned home to West Virginia, Florida kept calling his name. After graduating from West Virginia University, marrying his high school sweetheart, Nancy, and being awarded a Purple Heart for his service in the Korean War, he moved his young family to Fort Pierce in 1958. Richard founded Richard K. Davis Construction Corporation in 1960 and, after 64 successful years, the company has become a professional and philanthropic leader on the Treasure Coast.



Richard's son Douglas joined the company in 1980 after receiving his degree from the University of Florida. In 1997, when Richard retired, Douglas assumed the second-generation position of company President and steered the company through a new era utilizing his more than forty years of business experience. Douglas completed many notable projects during his tenure: the Humane Society of St. Lucie County, Expert Shutters in Port St. Lucie, and Palm City Presbyterian's Huizenga Family Life Center in Palm City.

Richard and Douglas were joined by associate Roger Priest in 1989. Roger graduated from Clemson University and used his technical training in design to assist with the company's many design/build construction projects. With Douglas' retirement in 2021, Roger continues as the company's President. Some of Roger's recognizable projects include Westside Church's grand 1,740 seat sanctuary, more than 350,000 s.f. of plant expansions for Pursuit Boats over the span of four years, Maverick Boat Group's expansion in 2021, and Trinity Episcopal Church in Vero Beach.

The company's future continues to look bright with the next incoming generation of family! Dalton Smith, Douglas' son-in-law, joined the company in 2019 and has already tackled significant construction projects like the 46,800 s.f. Total Truck Parts, a classroom building expansion for Christ Lutheran School in Port St. Lucie, and several projects for John's Island Club in Indian River Shores. Armed with a business administration degree from Florida Tech, Dalton will prove to be an asset to the company, guiding us with

his business knowledge into many more prosperous years.



In Loving Memory of Don Bestor, Jr. — Community Supporter and Music Aficionado



Don Bestor, Jr., was born into music royalty, and he was fortunate enough to love music as much as it loved him. Don's father, who was his namesake, was the famed bandleader for the Jack Benny Radio Program and also the guy who came up with the jingle for J-E-L-L-O, and Don's mother, Beulah, was a

cover model.

Like his father, Bestor, Jr., was an accomplished professional musician, and whether you've dined at local favorites like 2nd Street Bistro, upscale eateries like Stuart's Café Martier, or enjoyed Tuesday or Wednesday evening Jazz Jams at the Sunrise Black Box, the Fort Pierce Yacht Club, Port St. Lucie Botanical Gardens, or any number of private parties, special events, and fundraising events between Jupiter and Sebastian, you've likely been entertained by the magic Bestor created on the keyboard. Locally, Don was often the man behind the soundtrack of many of your favorite events and activities here on the Treasure Coast because, for many years, Don served as the president of the Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society, a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting the importance of music and music education and providing opportunities for live, professional music throughout the region.

Like so many members of the *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*, Bestor enjoyed a successful career as a professional musician and had the opportunity to play with and for some of the legends of show business. But you'd have to spend a lot of time with him before you were able to tease that information out of him because he's typically more likely to toot someone else's horn instead of his own. That tendency to help encourage up and coming musicians, particularly those who have a passion for performance music and potential, is one of the reasons why *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*, a very small nonprofit organization, has been so successful for more than a quarter of a century.

Under Bestor's leadership, members of *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* have provided master classes and performances in local schools, mentored some of the area's newest talent, and helped ensure that the art of live performance and the soundtrack of our lives will continue for generations to come. Since its inception, *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* has provided more than \$100,000 in scholarships for area students pursuing a career in performance music or music education. Accomplishing all this with a small group of dedicated volunteers is nothing short of miraculous, but under Don's leadership, members of *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* have proven to be believers in the magic of music and the miracles it makes.

To say that Don played the piano would be a colossal understatement. Don didn't just play a piano — his fingers on a keyboard had the ability to melt away the ivory and turn




the hammered vibrations of a keyboard and strings into something as smooth as butter or as light as a breath. Don Bestor, Jr., gave a piano life and turned that inanimate object into magical music. Whether it was sweet and soulful, bluesy or ballsy, rockin' or rich — it all depended on how Don wanted his audience to respond. He was not just good; he was more than masterful at the keyboard.

And while Don may not have achieved the kind of fame (or notoriety) his dad did, he became a legend in the hearts of all those he did meet and whose lives were touched by his musical magic and his lightning-fast sense of humor. It would be hard to find a single musician Don performed with during his lifetime career of making music who would not have at least one story of Don's world-class sense of humor and quick ability to launch a grenade of hilarity or send flying a snarky comeback. It would be even harder to find someone who didn't have a story about Don's generosity or love of music.

Last year, while he was battling the illness that was slowly robbing him of his breath, he and his beloved wife, Debbie, traveled to a place that had been advertised as a feline rescue facility. They rescued Sam, a cat whose back story was already tragic, but who was so secretly and profoundly ill that within hours of bringing him home, Don and Debbie were at an emergency veterinary facility trying to save Sam's life. Nearly ten thousand dollars later and after helping Sam defy the extraordinarily high odds of failure the vet had advised for an animal they'd just met, Don and Debbie were finally able to welcome a recuperating and exceptionally grateful and loving Sam into their family.

When asked if they had ever considered the cost involved and how much it impacted them financially, Don was shocked that such a question would even come up for consideration. After all, the little guy was sick and needed help, explained Don. He was equally loyal to friends and fellow musicians, too, and his heart had an abundance of space for helping young musicians who were serious about learning the craft, sharing suggestions, tips, connections, and helping to launch the musical dreams



of scores of youth through scholarships, mentoring, and connections they made as a result of their affiliation with the *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*. But for Don, everything came back to making and sharing music. Everything.

Don Bestor wanted to play piano more than anything else – towards the end of his life, he shared that he wanted to play piano more than he wanted to breathe. During one hospital stay, he

had a keyboard brought into his room, and he performed and provided music for the other patients, nursing staff, and to help himself heal enough to go home, where he could go back to playing again. Even in the weeks when his days were filled with Hospice and hospitals, Debbie would become a roadie and carry all Don's equipment and set it up at a restaurant, club, or other gig, and Don would configure his oxygen tube and tank to be as discreet as possible before blowing the crowd away with his larger-than-life talent.

If you've enjoyed live music during the past 25 years on the Treasure Coast, there's a very distinct possibility that Don Bestor was either behind that music — or at least behind the keyboard. So many events, venues, restaurants, and activities that have happened in the area have had a soundtrack provided by Don or members of the *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*

Don died early in the morning on Wednesday, February 21st. And while the music will continue, just as Don would have wanted, all of us who had an opportunity to spend time with Don and enjoy his musical magic, are wandering through the world that is a little out of step today. It's as if, without Don, we're having a little trouble finding the right key. We know he would laugh about that and try to tactfully tap a little harder on a key note to help us out, and somehow, just knowing that helps us realize that, though he may have completed his concert here on earth, he's left behind a legacy of love, laughter, and music that all of us will carry with us until it's time to take our own final bow. We are grateful for Don Bestor, Jr., for his leadership of *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*, is friendship and humor, and most of all, we are grateful to have been part of the magic of his music and the place he loved to call home.

City of Fort Pierce Water Resources

Did you know that Fort Pierce Utilities Authority (FPUA) provides drinking water to nearly 23,000 customers from the City of Fort Pierce and some of unincorporated St. Lucie County? The water is sourced from the Surficial Aquifer (~100 feet below the surface) and the Floridan aquifer (~1,000 feet below the surface), and is treated right here in Fort Pierce by FPUA water professionals. In fact, over 50 FPUA employees dedicate their daily work and careers to ensuring that your drinking water is safe, free from contaminants, and tasty too.

Every March, **FPUA's** Water Resources department competes in the "Best Tasting Drinking Water Competition" hosted by the *Florida American Water Works Association*. This is a fitting time for the competition because we also observe "World Water Day" on March 22 to bring attention to the importance of safe drinking water, and proper management of water resources for the Fort Pierce community.

FPUA's Water Resources department is committed to providing safe, high quality water to your tap every day. We are vigilant in meeting the challenges of new regulations, source water protection and water conservation in delivering water to your home. FPUA Water Resources ensures that the quality of finished water production from our water treatment plants meets or exceeds stringent federal and state drinking water requirements.

We operate two water treatment plants; one plant uses lime softening to purify drinking water from the Surficial Aquifer, while the other uses reverse osmosis for water from the Floridan Aquifer. Together, these plants serve nearly 23,000 water customers with clean, safe drinking water:

- 277 million gallons produced on average per month.
- 9 million gallons produced on average per day.





- 379,000 gallons produced on average per hour.
- 9 million gallons of storage capacity.
- 400 miles of water mains, remote pumping facilities, ground level storage tanks, hydrants, and valves.

Throughout the year, **FPUA** takes great pride in the quality of Fort Pierce's water, and great pride in our dedicated **FPUA** professionals that monitor the quality of the entire water distribution system. All **FPUA** water resource professionals and technicians are licensed by the *Florida Department of Environmental Protection* (FDEP) with Level 3, Level 2 or Level 1 water operator licenses. Level 3 is the entry-level certification with Level 2 and Level 1 requiring progressively more technical knowledge and experience.

FPUA hosts annual *Water Distribution Certification* training for people who may be interested in a Water Resources career, as well as **FPUA** water resources professionals progressing in their career. The training is led by the *Florida Rural Water Association* and approved by the FDEP. The certification training provides proof of educational eligibility to sit for the State Water Distribution Certification Exam.

The **FPUA** Water Resources staff ensures that there will be plenty of water to meet the existing needs of Fort Pierce, continued city growth and health, as well as unincorporated St. Lucie County's needs. In addition to delivering excellent drinking water, the **FPUA** Water Resources Department provides fire protection to the city and surrounding service areas.

FPUA's *Henry A. Gahn Drinking Water Plant* hosts an onsite laboratory certified to perform drinking water testing required by state and federal environmental agencies. The findings of these tests are included in **FPUA's** Annual Water Quality Report.





A few of the best-known artists who worked in illustrated fine art include Norman Rockwell, Maxfield Parrish, and Andy Warhol, all of whose work has been used in advertisements, magazines, and featured in fine art exhibitions.

The full Korshak Collection consists of approximately 100 paintings, drawings, and etchings of published illustration including works from classic and notable contemporary fiction stories such as Edgar Rice Burroughs's Tarzan of the Apes and John Carter/ The Princess of Mars, J.R.R. Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings, Lewis Carroll's Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, Goethe's Faust, Shakespeare's The Tempest, Edgar Allan Poe's The Pit and the Pendulum, and Cervantes's Don Quixote, among others.

Maria is from Orebro, Sweden where she lives with her cat Tigerella and was discovered by two of TPHAF board members while visiting her exhibition at the local Orebro council's gallery. Maria studied at the Cardiff School of Art & Design in the UK and has her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Ceramics. She chose Cardiff for its long tradition of ceramics in its art program and became a ceramicist and what she calls a "maker" using clay as her medium and finding ways to express herself with it, "seeing where it will take her." Ecology 101: Invasive Species

s you know, ecosystems are very diverse and contain a wide $m{\Lambda}$ variety of unique living organisms. For example, the *Florida* Everglades represents a wetland ecosystem filled with thousands of different species, many of them microscopic, each interacting with other organisms and carrying out their ecologic roles in balance with one other. When a new species enters an established ecosystem, oftentimes the delicate natural balance that had been in place for hundreds or thousands of years can be drastically altered, sometimes leading to irreparable damage.

Let's start with some basic terms. An introduced species — also called a nonnative or exotic species — is an organism that has been transported (either intentionally or unintentionally) to regions outside of their native range. It is common for large oceanic ships to pump ballast water in and out of their tanks, thereby transporting small organisms and/or their eggs from ocean to ocean. Insects can bore into wooden shipping boxes and be transported to a new country. For some introduced species, there are two general fates: the introduced species may successfully blend into the new ecosystem without upsetting the balance or it will quickly die out because there are not enough resources for it to survive.

On the other hand, an invasive species is an introduced species that takes domination of an ecosystem by, 1) breeding in excessive numbers, 2) preying upon or killing native species, and/or, 3) depleting its natural resources. The success of an invasive species can be due to several factors, the most important being the lack of native predators in the new ecosystem. Invasive species can also cause damage to domesticated plants and animals, inflict human disease, and even lead to the extinction of native species.



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Florida is an exceptionally welcoming location for invasive species to colonize and thrive. Most people are familiar with the Burmese python, lionfish, and cane toads. Unfortunately, the list of our state's invasive species goes on and on — there are over five hundred more. According to a recent study by the University of Florida, there is potential in the near future for at least 40 more species to invade Florida's ecosystems. This new round of invaders includes alewifes (a type of herring), zebra mussels, and crabeating macaque monkeys.

Florida is not the only place suffering damage to its ecosystems and bearing the associated economic costs. A recent report from the United Nations estimates the annual worldwide losses due to invasive species is more than \$423 billion dollars, that number having been quadrupled in every decade since 1970. Efforts aimed at eradicating invasive species from an area have had mixed results, for example the removal of red swamp crayfish from Clay County, Minnesota in 2022.

As the saying goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Thus, we should be concentrating on preventing invasive species from getting established in the first place as opposed to spending millions of dollars trying to remove them once they arrive. One needs to look no further for an optimistic outcome than when "murder hornets" from Asia first appeared in the Pacific Northwest and the efforts taken to protect native honeybee hives.

Blue, Gold, and Green of March

Tt's time to try your luck at **I** fishing with some tips and insights about what we catch in March. We're already lucky to live on the Treasure Coast because the waters here are an absolute angler's dream! Inshore and offshore fishing in March produces great catches like kingfish, redfish, cobia, snapper, grouper, snook, and sheepshead. Just keep an eye on the weather and take full advantage of those days when the winds are low.

Snook fishing is the main focus for many anglers with

pilchards, pinfish, and croakers being top bait choices. Look for them around bridges, docks, jetties, and mangroves with fast moving currents. The key is to keep the drag tight and be ready to set back on the rod when a snook is hooked. If you're lucky enough to land one in the slot, between 28 inches and 32 inches, you'll have a great fish story and a great fish dinner! Sheepshead have been plentiful on the inshore reefs. I recommend light tackle with 30-pound fluorocarbon leader, a quarter ounce jig, and live shrimp. Spanish mackerel are also being





caught on the inshore reefs and are great for smoking and making smoked fish dip.

The snapper have been chewing offshore on the 60–90 foot reefs so bottom fishing is a great strategy. Use live bait or cut-bait with enough weight to keep your bait on bottom. Although the warmer waters of April produce more mahi, March can also be a good time to troll for these beautiful, intense-fighting fish. Mahi are known for their distinctive turquoise, green, and yellow colors plus their amazing ac-

robatics when hooked. Some call them the prettiest fish in the sea.

The Total Solar Eclipse on April 8th 2024 is a Once-in-a-Lifetime Event

There happens to be a total solar eclipse about every 18 months somewhere across the planet earth. The "Path of Totality" shifts, bends, crosses oceans, and traverses continents. It is in this path that broad daylight suddenly turns dark. The bright skies of the day are replaced by twinkling stars against a twilight backdrop. The temperature drops 10 degrees. Crickets sing, flowers turn away and close their petals, nocturnal creatures emerge from hiding. During this eclipse Mercury, Saturn,

and Venus will be visible in the dark skies. A total solar eclipse happens when the Sun, Earth, and moon are precisely aligned. The moon passes in front of the sun and casts a shadow onto earth. The last North American eclipse was in 2017. The eclipse in April will be exceptional in that the moon is closer to earth than usual and will appear to be larger. The path will be wider, between 80 and 115 miles, and travel a great distance between Mexico and the Canadian sea. Complete darkness will last approximately 4



minutes and 20 seconds. This is the longest time recorded on American soil. Millions of people are expected to travel from about 50 countries to witness this stunning event. From Central Florida we will see about 60% of the shadow, so the darkness will be subtle. The next total solar eclipse in the Americas will be in 2044. It will begin in Greenland and sweep through Canada, Montana, and the Dakotas. When viewing this event be sure to wear special protective eyewear designed to view eclipses. �





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
