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


This is more than just a slogan. It is our mission: To preserve, promote and build on the historic and natural treasures of our downtown waterfront community.

There are Nutcrackers and then there is "The Nutcracker"

N I suppose since the first cave person picked up a rock and crushed a nut but a tool made specifically or designed to crack nuts was first mentioned in ancient Greece although one assume that someone at some time before that invented or designed a tool of sort for that purpose. But since then such tools have come in all shapes and sizes, with or without levers, made of various woods, metals and even porcelain.

In England, France and Italy they came to be more than a useful

tool. During Victorian England, nuts were served at dinners as conversation starters often in preparation for the serving of the final course. Diners often needed a break in the long meals that were served and a chance to relax and converse while the kitchens probably needed some time to catch their breath, wash dishes and make final preparations. One can only imagine the gleaming silver or gold nutcrackers along with the array of fish forks, soup spoons and butter spreaders that adorned the candlelit tables.

In the 1800's Germans began to popularize the wooden carved nutcracker. Some historians believe that after the fall harvest and the gathering of nuts before the winter snows began to fall in earnest the farmers took to carving wooden nutcrackers for the Yuletide Holidays in which nuts were often put in children's stockings.

German folklore has nutcrackers as a symbol of good luck and were often made by puppet makers. There were challenges

among this group one such challenge was apparently won by someone who created a doll with a mouth for a lever to crack the nut, which by then had become a traditional symbol of the Holidays. The most famous nutcracker carvings came from Sonneberg in Thuringia (a center for doll making) and part of the wooden toymaking "industry" in the Ore Mountains. The dolls/nutcrackers became especially popular in the U.S. after the first U.S. production of "The Nutcracker" and the return of solders after WWII. Many of the German workshops which had created these "soldier" like "dolls" became part of the Soviet Zone at the end of the WWII.

"The Nutcracker" was first performed in the U.S. in 1934 by the San Francisco Ballet. It has become a "hit" and a staple of the New York City Ballet since its first performance there in 1954.

This brings us to "The Nutcracker and the Mouse King" written by E.T.A. Hoffmann, a Prussian author, in 1816. That story which was adapted by Alexandre Dumas (author of the Three Musketeers) in 1844 and put to



music by composer Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky in 1892 with choreographers Marius Petipa and Lev Ivanov which became the ballet "The Nutcracker". The original story is slightly more detailed and involved than Dumas' adaptation and I'm not going into details of the plots in either versions, but both carry the same themes. While the original performance at the Mariisky Theatre in St. Petersburg was not well received "The Nutcracker" has become part of the tradition of the Christmas Season. The basic story is of a young girl (Clara) on Christmas Eve who awakens to find romantic love. It is a story without religious connotations. It is a magical world of young children, parents, toys, Christmas Trees, snowflakes and candy. The eternal battle of good (sugar plum fairies) against evil (the mouse king and his mice) and the enduring love of Clara and the Nutcracker or her captor's nephew. All of which make for the enjoyment of all and of traditional values that transcend the Holiday Season.

We in Fort Pierce are fortunate to have the State Theatre of Odessa performing "The Nutcracker" live at the Sunrise Theatre on December 26, 2019. Tickets can be had at the Sunrise Theatre Box Office at 117 South 2nd St. Ft. Pierce (772-461-4775) or at www.sunrisetheatre.com. As Isabel McMerkan, founder of Everybody Ballet, has stated: "It' really a feel-good ballet to perform as well as to watch...It's fun when it comes on each year, there's a role for everyone...It really does stand alone, there's no other ballet like it."

So, here's wishing you sugarplum fairies and handsome nutcrackers and nuts for your stockings as you approach the Season with fair winds and following seas.





The Essence of Nature Art Show & Sale will Feature Works from Several Talented Local Artists

On Thursday evening, December 12th, a handful of talented local artists will converge and join forces at the historic **Platts/Backus House** to present an art show not to be missed. The house itself has a rich cultural history that revolves around the creative thinkers it attracted while it was the former house and studio of the beloved landscape artist, A.E. "Bean" Backus. In fact, one of the artists to be showcased in this upcoming show is *Jackie Schindehette*, a Backus student.

Last year, Jackie and her husband returned to Fort Pierce after a 20-year hiatus; however, the previous 20 years were spent in Fort Pierce raising their two sons, Chad and David. Ten of those earlier twenty years were spent with Backus at his studio/home. "Bean had an open-door policy, so I would just visit and watch. Eventually he

invited me to paint with him. I declined because I did not know how to paint. He insisted and made a list of supplies. I bought them and showed up the next day — brush in hand."

Thanks to Bean's generosity and willingness to share his extensive knowledge Schindehette's

hobby turned into a career. Her formal training was at the prestigious Art Students League in New York City.

Schindehette specializes in oil paintings of the Florida landscape. She paints on location to accurately capture the essence of Florida from the beaches with sand dunes and waves to the interior with live oak trees and sawgrass.

She is listed in Florida Artists Registry, National Museum of Women in the Arts, Art Students League of New York, Oil Painters of America, National Association of Independent Artists, Plein Air Florida, Artists Alliance of North Florida, and International Plein Air Painters. Artist Statement: Using paint to convey my affinity for nature, I strive to refrain from literal interpretation. I often convey the same places repeatedly. Once I begin a canvas, I follow what is taking place on the surface. Pushing paint is a way for me to suggest a sense of place though contrasts, light, and color without fully defining the subject. The physicality of paint is often the subject matter.

Mayor's Message In Fort Pierce, Art Surrounds Us

At holiday time, many of us decorate our homes, lawns and businesses to add to the festive holiday spirit. What if we decided to enhance and beautify our whole town to lift our spirits year-round? That's just what the City of Fort Pierce has been encouraging in recent years.

The Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful

Advisory Board started the ball rolling when it embarked on decorating the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority boxes. On the beach, the boxes have a sand and surf theme, and on the mainland, the boxes are "wrapped" with other colorful scenes.

The City created the Peacock Arts District (PAD) and local artists painted large street landscaping pots with various scenes of their own creation. Fifteen vibrant painted pots now line Orange Avenue from U.S. 1 to 7th Street. New decorative pole banners have now joined the painted pots. Earlier this year, the City held a contest for artwork to use on the pole banners. A total of 16 designs were chosen and are now displayed along Orange and Delaware Avenue, and 7th and 10th Street in the PAD.

Next, the City began branding different neighborhoods with new street signs. Downtown signs are cyan, Lincoln Park is black, and the PAD is deep purple, all with white lettering. The City has now introduced colorful scenes on the traffic signal boxes. Fifteen traffic signal boxes have been decorated throughout the city. Some highlights: Avenue H and U.S. 1, night port scene (photo by Terrie Selph); Orange Avenue and Indian River Drive, orange blossoms; Avenue D and U.S. 1, waterfront saxophonist at night; Orange Avenue and 10th Street, royal poinciana blooms amid peacock feathers.

Murals are starting to adorn buildings through the City: Georgia Avenue and U.S. #1, sail fish painted on the Dollar Tree (Artist: Brian Bezo Taylor); Avenue D and 8th Street, Highwaymen Tribute mosaic royal poinciana (Artists: Pat Cochran and Anita Prentice); N. 9th Street, children reading books, under "Save Our Children" (Artist: Logan Designs). These are just a few of the murals, old and new, that can be found inside and outside buildings in Fort Pierce.

Main Street Fort Pierce collaborated local schools. with artists, businesses, the city and FPUA to create the "Fish on the Fence," a project to beautify the fence around the large empty area where the King power plant once stood. And, don't forget to look down walking when on Orange Avenue, east of 2nd Street. Sanitation covers have also been painted brightly.



Fifteen traffic signal boxes have been decorated throughout Fort Pierce, including this orange blossom array on Orange Avenue.

Did you know that Indian River Drive and North and South A1A are designated as scenic highways by the State of Florida? This designation is meant to preserve and enhance the cultural, historic, recreational and natural resources of the area, while promoting their appreciation and enjoyment by residents and visitors alike.

Add to these beautification efforts the city's façade grants, the Gold Hammer and Neighborhood Gem Awards, the ongoing efforts of our city and FPUA staff, along with *Main Street Fort Pierce*, Art Walk, the Downtown Business Alliance and the South Beach Association, and so many, many more who collaborate every day to help *Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful.*

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Audubon's Kings Landing Moves Forward

November 12th was a day for congratulations and celebration in the City of Fort Pierce. Their 100 year history with the H. D. King Plant property will have a new phase as a tax-paying benefit to the City.

"The *Kings Landing* project has the potential to offer a major benefit to downtown Fort Pierce, the city as a whole, and the Treasure Coast region. The choice of *Audubon's Kings Landing* by the *Fort Pierce Redevelopment Agency* (FPRA) represents years of effort by the City of Fort Pierce, the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority (FPUA) and the FPRA to transform the seven-acre downtown property from a century-old power plant to a clean and safe, river front site, ripe for development. The FPRA, with the help of the *Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council*, city staff and the citizens of Fort Pierce, helped shape a community decision, balancing protection for the taxpayer, and opportunity for the development team," said Mayor Linda Hudson.

The Fort Pierce Redevelopment Authority Board voted unanimously to move forward with an \$85 million dollar mixed-use project that will be a catalyst for downtown development. Kim Delaney of the *Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council* moderated the presentation describing the process and the eight phases of the project to the FPRA board. Ms. Delaney said, "We are so excited for the City's great success in negotiating a model public/private agreement with **Audubon Development**. This project will take the H. D. King property from vacant land to an exciting and vibrant mixed use to continue the City's great redevelopment success story."

The project, called *King's Landing*, will be in eight phases with phase 1 to include a hotel, housing, retail, and office spaces. It will also include infrastructure for public streets, water, sewer, storm water drains, lighting and landscaping. This phase will be an estimated cost of \$2.5 million to be paid by **Audubon Development**. Construction is planned to begin within one year.

Phases two through eight will include additional mixed use as well as improvements to Moore's Creek adding a pedestrian bridge and promenade, landscape and public amenities. Build-out of the project is expected to be completed within five years.

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Brussels Sprouts For Dinner

Brussels sprouts can be so much more than the boiled, bitter side dish that some of us may have had in our childhood. A tasty dish of Brussel sprouts starts with the Brussels sprouts that you buy and how you prepare them for cooking. Here are a few tips.

1. When you're shopping for Brussels sprouts, look for balls with tight, compact leaves. They should be bright green, without any browned spots or yellowing leaves.

2. The larger the Brussels sprout, the more they take on the qualities of cabbage. Large pieces will be slightly more bitter, while smaller Brussels sprouts are a little bit sweeter.

3. If you are going to shred them in a food processor or by hand, trim the end and leave them whole. For roasting or sautéing, halving or quartering in best. If you just want the leaves, trim a little higher up above the stem. This makes it easier to pull apart the leaves from the head.

4. As Brussels sprouts roast, they brown around the edges or the cut sides that are faced down on the sheet pan. The browning adds loads of flavor to every bite. The next time you roast them, cook them a little longer than you have previously to capitalize on how mellow and sweet their flavor becomes.

5. Raw is just as good as roasted. When dressed with the right vinaigrette, uncooked Brussels sprouts make for a tasty salad. If you want to take some of the edge off, toss it with the dressing and let it stand for as little as 15 minutes before serving. Like coleslaw, the leaves will soften slightly without losing all their crunch.



December Fishing, the Fort Pierce Way

The intense tropical heat is finally over and with the cooler waters moving in, the fishing will be heating up! Our local waters provide abundant opportunities to enjoy this great sport. This is the time to look for migratory fish like cobia, tripletail, mackerel, and pompano.

Cobia move from the colder waters of the Carolinas and north Florida to our area and further south in the fall. These powerful pelagic fish are highly prized as a great catch and a delicious dinner. They are attracted to buoys, wrecks, and floating objects and debris. Use medium to heavy tackle for your best chance to land these aggressive feeders. They are also fast growers and can reach over 100 pounds so keeping a gaff ready is a very good idea.

The Golden or Florida Pompano, known simply as pompano, are fun to catch and very popular for their mild and slightly sweet taste. Some consider them the best tasting fish in the sea. They are in the jack family so you will have a great fight when you get one hooked. Small jigs, live shrimp or sandfleas are the baits of choice for pompano.

Always check your local bait and tackle shops for complete fishing regulations and license information. This time of year remember them for all your tackle needs too, otherwise known as "Christmas shopping needs!" Merry Christmas! All I want this season is to keep Pullin Drag!

Christmas Sides

I love Brussel sprouts! Here are a few ways I've prepared them.

Brussels Sprouts with Pancetta

- 2 pounds fresh Brussels sprouts, trimmed and halved
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 6 pancetta slices (1/8-inch-thick)
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated Parmesan cheese



Preheat oven to 425°. Toss together Brussels sprouts and next three ingredients in a 15- x 10-inch jelly-roll pan. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until sprouts are tender and edges are

lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, cook pancetta in a large skillet over medium heat 8 to 10 minutes or until crisp. Remove pancetta and drain on paper towels. Crumble pancetta. Remove sprouts from oven, and place in a large serving dish. Top with cheese and crumbled pancetta. *Serves 8.*

Brussels Sprouts Supreme

- 1 pound Brussels sprouts, trimmed and halved
- 4 strips bacon
- 1 Tablespoon butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 small tomatoes, diced salt & pepper sour cream

In a medium pan steam Brussels sprouts till tender. In a skillet cook bacon till crisp, set aside. Reserve 2 tablespoons bacon grease. Discard the remaining grease.




Add butter, reserved grease and onion to skillet; cook until tender. Crumble bacon and add to onion. Stir in tomatoes. Season with salt and pepper. Add Brussels sprouts to skillet and heat to warm. Serve with sour cream. *Serves 8.*

Oven Roasted Parmesan Brussels Sprouts

- 1/2 pound Brussels sprouts (trimmed & halved)
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 2/3 cup parmesan cheese
- 2 teaspoon garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Heat oven to 425°. Very lightly spray a cookie sheet with cooking spray. In a bowl, combine Brussels sprouts (that have been halved and ends trimmed) with the remaining ingredients. Toss together to coat all the Brussels sprouts. Spread onto the cookie sheet making sure they are not touching. Cook for 16–18 minutes. Serve immediately. *Serves 4*.









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
