





What About that Turkey!



Let's be clear up-front, I'm not talking about the turkey industry that provides us with the turkey you and I buy at the store or your local turkey farm. I'm writing about the wild turkey, the bird, and how it has become an American tradition. But first some basics about the bird, it's origin and it's habits.

Its genus is meleagris. It has a distinctive fleshly wattle hanging from its beak which is called a snood. While the turkey is native to North America, turkeys have been used and/or domesticated in Mexico and South America for hundreds of years. Turkeys were brought to Europe from the middle east where those merchants were called "turkey merchants." They were imported through Constantinople thus getting its name of turkey. Shakespeare uses the term "turkey-cock" in *Twelfth Night* indicating that the term and the bird were widely known in England at that time. India, Poland, Russia and Peru also had names for the bird, but the name "turkey" has been the one that has stuck.

The male turkey is larger than the female and doesn't mate for life. In fact, many males go off in a herd together. A female will have one brood in her life, consisting of four to 17 eggs. They will remain with her for up to a year when they will be able to take care of themselves. She nests on the ground in dead leaves at the base of a tree. Both male and female turkeys can run and fly when threatened. I have had the privilege of watching a flock of wild turkeys. They can run surprisingly fast and their flights from the ground to the lower branches of surrounding trees is not only delightful but hilarious. They normally roost in flocks. Wild turkeys are considered game birds and their population is increasing. They have responded well to game management and are second only to deer for hunters. If you are a bird hunter Florida has a Spring turkey season. There is a quota and lottery system for permits on specified locations and days. If interested I suggest you contact the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission for further information. (1(888) 404-3933 or myfwc.com)

We know that the pilgrims or settlers celebrated the first Thanksgiving with the Wampanoag Indians in 1621. Edward Winslow who was present writes in a letter: "Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we



might after a special manner rejoice together after we had gathered the fruit of our labors. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help besides, served the company almost a week." While there is no specific mention of turkeys most have assumed that the word "fowl" included turkeys. It was known to the settlers that Queen Elizabeth had served turkey when celebrating the sinking of a fleet of Spanish ships on their way to attack England. Others opine that she had another goose roasted and the settlers chose to roast turkey instead. The Spanish Armada was launched in 1588 and the engagement lasted through 1604 so the date of this occasion is unclear.

Nothing much was heard about the turkey for the next hundred or so years, although one can assume it was being hunted, killed and eaten as were other fowl and game. But as the United States was being formed and the Continental Congress was drafting our founding documents Benjamin Franklin began to champion the turkey as the national emblem of the United States. The turkey lost out to the bald eagle. But the turkey had other advocates. Sarah Josepha Hale, a New Hampshire writer and early advocate for women of her time, took up the turkey's cause. She's been called the "godmother of Thanksgiv-



ing." While promoting Thanksgiving as a national holiday she wrote: "The roasted turkey took precedence on this occasion, being placed at the head of the table; and well did it become its lordly station, sending forth the rich odor of its savory stuffing and finely covered with the froth of the basting." In 1863, probably in an effort to unify the nation after the Civil War, President Lincoln invited Americans to observe the last Thursday in November as a day of thanksgiving. It wasn't until 1941 that President Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the U.S. Congress made Thanksgiving a legal holiday.

Karen Davis, president of United Poultry Concerns has stated: "The 'turkey at Thanksgiving idea' is that the turkey is the de facto symbol of America's prowess, of its national origin myth.... But it's a creation myth that was just invented." President Ronald Reagan strengthen that myth when he began the tradition of pardoning two turkeys as a way of avoiding questions over pardons concern-

ing the Iran-Contra affair. And so, the turkey, with or without a political context continues to be a part of "Americana".

The turkey in so many ways expresses our national pride with its tail feathers, our wealth and abundance and even our social habits. Perhaps Benjamin Franklin was right in his desire to have the turkey as our national emblem. But whether the turkey has that status or not it has served and still serves our country well by bringing us together in thanks. The wild turkey is pardoned while the poultry industry produces all those millions of turkeys for us to consume on Thanksgiving. However, there are turkey alternatives being produced and developed. I'm not quite there yet. Some traditions, even if they are mythical, are worth holding on to. So, whatever you choose, enjoy your Thanksgiving, count your blessings and those of this great country and give a special thanks to the turkey for all it has given to us. As always. wishing you fair winds and following seas.

Jack's son John has followed John's creative thoughts and ambitions and is producing one of a kind concrete garden art. His pieces can be viewed on his web site, GPDesignz.com. He has been producing this work for about six years and is known locally for his generous donations to fund raising organizations. 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St. Andrew's Students Conduct Ocean Research Aboard the SSV Corwith Cramer

Academy students experienced an adventure with a purpose, in a partnership with the Sea Education Association (SEA). This unique student enrichment program at St. Andrew's was the brainchild of Suzanne Barry, Head of Schools at St. Andrew's and an alumnus of SEA. Jessie Alkire and Madison Green, along with Ms. Barry, had an experience of a lifetime aboard the research vessel SSV Corwith Cramer, as active crew members on this tall ship.

Sailing from New London, CT to Woodshole, MA in blustery October weather, they stood

watch, handled sails and lines, completed hourly boat checks, along with performing routine cleaning or maintenance duties. However, the *Corwith Cramer* is more than that. Madison and Jessie were able to learn from the scientists performing research and assist in the lab. October in New England can challenge any sailor going offshore. Our students had to learn and under-

stand the physics of sailing in cold weather with hours of gale force winds. This tall ship is not a luxury cruise ship and takes no tourists. Everyone on board is there to be a part of the crew and the comforts of home are scarce, except for the camaraderie with fellow crew members and meals.

One of the educational highlights, was sailing around Block Island, which is about four miles off the coast of Rhode Island. It is home to the first commercial offshore wind farm in the United States. The 30-megawatt, five-turbine Block Island Wind Farm began commercial operations in December 2016. One of



the founders, John O'Keefe, was aboard the *Corwith Cramer* and provided Jessie and Madison an insider's knowledge on the project and the benefits for research, education, the community and the environment. Additionally, they recorded data from the fish and bio-luminescent marine life they discovered and discussed the salinity and Chlorophyll-A Levels with the scientists as they reviewed the results.

"My experience as a college student, crewing aboard the *Corwith Cramer*, was a much broader learning opportunity than I could have received anywhere else," says

Ms. Barry. "The leadership lessons fostered within this adventure are many. My hope for Jessie and Madison, and future **St. Andrew's** students, is that they learned as much about themselves as they did from the classes and duties on the ship."

Indeed, the students talk about how valuable the experience was to them. "We were pushed to our limits on this

trip and it strengthened both of us. I feel we both can take on new challenges with less fear." explains Jessie. Madison agrees. "It made us more confident about taking on bigger roles. We learned how to work through difficulties and lead," she says.

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


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
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
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Your Weekend Wear Can Make You An Eco-warrior!

id you know that micro-plastics have been found in the deepest depths of our oceans, and were recently discovered within ice cores drilled in the Arctic?

Years ago, and much closer to home, I personally found a sea turtle in the Indian River Lagoon that, sadly, died because he had gotten tangled in a plastic bag. On that very day, we banished plastic bags from the Vanishing Mermaid Gift Shop and we started using paper bags made from recycled materials.

The Manatee Observation and Education Center (MOEC) has been educating the public about the importance of keeping our estuary and the Indian River Lagoon clean for over 22 years. This season, a unique display will be featured in the exhibit hall showing the length of time it takes certain materials to decompose. You will be amazed (and appalled) at the information. Single-use plastics are the biggest problem. For example, did you know that a plastic bag could take over 100 years to fragment, and plastic water bottles up to 450 years?

You can also learn more about The Unnatural History of Plastic at the Fort Pierce Yacht Club this month, November 21st at 6:30 p.m., where Dr. Tracy Mincer of Florida Atlantic University will highlight the challenges of plastic in our Lagoon.

But this isn't the end of the story. Many eco-minded companies have found ways to combat the plastic pollution problem. Many make products from recycled materials; others have created products that prevent wasteful consumption. And I am glad to report that you can find many of these products at the Vanishing Mermaid Gift Shop.

30A is a line of super-soft clothing made from recycled water bottles. You will not believe how soft they are! As of March 2019, 30A has removed 3.1 million plastic bottles from landfills and oceans. You might have seen them on Good Morning America during a segment focused on "Go Green, Choose Clean" that aired in June.


As the season progresses, the seawall becomes a favorite hang-



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Small Business Solutions: Cloud Storage, Thumb Drive or Disk Drive? **Pros and Cons**

ne certain that the storage solu-Dtions you choose are going to keep your data secure.

Today's businesses need to store more data than ever before. In fact, data storage requirements are growing by about 40 percent each year. However, you need to make sure that the storage solutions you choose are going to keep your data

secure. In fact, there were an average of 62 cyberattacks each day in 2018, with many of those affecting businesses and their sensitive data.

In order to keep all of the data you use safe and easily accessible, you need to find the right storage and backup solutions. There are a ton of different options to choose from, including cloud storage, thumb drives, and disk drives. All of these options have their own advantages and drawbacks. So you need to carefully consider your own storage needs before choosing. And you might even opt to make use of multiple options in different ways.

Here's a rundown of each of these options so you can create the combination that works best for your small business.

CLOUD STORAGE

Cloud storage is a model that essentially allows users to store files and information across various servers. So you don't keep it in a hard drive that's located on-premises. Instead, it's backed up in a separate location.

One of the main benefits of cloud storage is that it allows your data to be accessible from anywhere. You can bring up the same files at your desk that you can on your home computer or your laptop when you travel. You can also give your team members access, or even allow clients to view select files through cloud sharing platforms. Keeping your files saved in a separate location from your business can also be useful in disaster recovery. If there's a flood or fire at your facility, you can still access that important data if your hard drives or on-premises servers were destroyed.

However, security is a major concern for businesses using cloud storage solutions. Since the data is not stored in your own disks or hard drives, you have less control over who can access it. And hackers often target cloud based storage platforms. So you may not want to use this solution for files that contain customer information, financial records or confidential company data. In fact, only about 18 percent of all files uploaded to cloud based sharing and collaboration platforms contain sensitive data. But despite those challenges, about 80 percent of businesses have adopted cloud storage in some capacity.

THUMB DRIVE

A thumb drive is a small, portable device that allows you to store and share files. You plug it into a computer or other device using the USB port. Then you can add files to back them up in a second location or easily share those documents with other devices.

These devices are small and very simple to operate. You simply plug it into your computer and drag and drop files that you want to back up. Some even offer advanced features like password protection so you can keep those files extra secure.

However, if you use them on a device that's infected with viruses or malware, you could end up spreading those vulnerabilities around your office. Additionally, their small size makes it easy for users to lose or break them. So they probably shouldn't serve as your main storage solution for especially important items.

DISK DRIVE

A disk drive is a type of hardware that uses rotating disks and electro-mechanical technology to store information. This can either be housed within a computer or laptop, or contained on a separate external hard drive.

This type of storage is fairly affordable and easy to use. There are a variety of hard drive storage options out there. And many offer higher capacities than those available with small thumb drives. So you can easily find an option that provides enough capacity for your storage needs, even if you need to store large files or programs.

However, this type of physical storage doesn't last forever. And when the disk stops working, you could end up losing the data you have stored on it. As such, it's usually best to back up the data you have stored on this type of device on another source as well. They also don't usually come with password protection or advanced security features. So it may not be the best option for super sensitive data. But someone would usually need to have a physical copy of the disk in order to access that information.

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Wild Rice

Wild rice, despite its name, is not directly related to the rice we usually cook. Grown in shallow water like small lakes or streams, the grains of wild rice are a dark brownish black color and have a somewhat chewy outer sheath with a more tender inner grain. It is nutty, earthy, and has a heartier in flavor.

Wild rice is good for you. Unlike other starchier rice varieties (such as basmati, jasmine, etc.), wild rice boasts several key nutritional benefits.

- Wild rice is high in protein, coming in second when compared to oats in protein content per 100 calories.
- High in the amino acid Lysine which may help with calcium absorption, wound healing, and reduce anxiety.
- High in fiber (whereas white rice is not).
- Low in fat.
- Wild rice is gluten-free.



COOLER WEATHER, COOLER WATERS

November brings cooler waters to our local area which means more fish are moving in. Sheepshead, snapper, jack, and pompano are more abundant and a good choice to target. Look for pompano in shallow waters of the lagoon and off the beach with live shrimp for best results. Mahi can be caught offshore as they are following the cooler water and migrating down from the Carolinas. Snapper and sheepshead are found around channel markers on either incoming or outgoing tides.

Snook are still being caught and as always, giving a good fight. Use live mullet or pilchards for your best chance at hooking one of these linesiders and focus on the ledge of the Fort Pierce Inlet, bridges, docks, and other structures. Keep the drag tight and be ready to set back on the rod when a snook is on and you will have a great fish story to tell. If your snook is in the slot, no less than 28 inches and no more than 32 inches, you will have a great fish dinner as well! Trout fishing is good now, too, and keep on the lookout for tripletail near buoys and channel markers where they can sometimes be seen floating on the surface. Tripletail can be found inshore and offshore and typically swim near floating debris and weed lines.

Remember to "Shop Small" this season and buy your tackle, nets, rods, and reels at your local tackle shops. They are also good for fishing licenses and FWC rules and regulations. Wishing everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and feeling thankful to keep Pullin Drag!







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Incredible Thanksgiving Sides

Cranberry Pecan Sweet Potato Wild Rice Pilaf

Crunchy pecans, cranberries, sweet potato, wild rice, and herbs come together in this colorful dish!

- 3 cups chicken broth (or vegetable broth)
- 1 cup wild rice blend
- 1/2 teaspoon dried parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 sweet potato diced small
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup cranberries
- 1/3 cup pecans chopped



In a medium sized saucepan bring the broth to a boil and add wild rice, parsley, oregano, and thyme. Reduce the heat to a simmer and cover with a lid. Cook for 45 minutes or until tender. In another skillet add the olive oil, sweet potato, and onion and cook until tender. Add cranberries and chopped pecans and cook for 1 to 2 minutes. Add to the rice mixture and fluff with a fork. *Serves 6*.

Vegetable Casserole

This recipe is a great addition to your Thanksgiving table.

- 1 head cauliflower, cut into flowerets
- 1 head broccoli, cut into flowerets
- 1 small bag of baby carrots, whole
- 1½ cups sour cream
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 11/2 cups cheddar cheese, shredded
- ½ cup milk
- 1 cup parmesan cheese

Cook the vegetables until just tender. Drain and set aside. In a large bowl mix sour cream, mayonnaise, cheddar cheese and milk. Add in vegetables and mix until well coated. Place in an oven-proof casserole. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Bake 350° for 30 to 45 minutes or until the casserole is heated through. *Serves 8 to 10*.



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
