



# Mayor's Message Fort Pierce Gift to Citizens: Open Government Portal

Tort Pierce has become one of the most transparent governments on the Treasure Coast, thanks to changes in our City of Fort Pierce website.

Our commission meetings, as well as many boards or committee meetings, have been televised for many

years, and are available on Channel 27, live streaming, or after the meeting on the website. Click on "Meetings and Agendas" on the front page of our website. Search agendas, meetings and minutes also, back to January 2014.

On our new Open Government page, you can request records by clicking the Public Records Requests bar. You can choose to make an anonymous request, because Florida law requires governments to have that option. All requests are given a number, so you can track the progress of your request. Several other bars under this category include Lien, Building, Status, and Police (which must be submitted to the Fort Pierce Police Department). There's a bar for Reports, which gives you a history of requests and the time it took to fulfill the request. What a treat that is to see the very timely and prompt responses we have given to our public.

Other bars under Open Government provide information for a variety of requesters. You can see Frequently Requested Records, Building Permits, Bid Postings, and Business Tax Receipts. You can also access SeeClickFix (a way to report a non- emergency problem), our Code of Ordinances and Comprehensive Plan, and financial records. You can look for zoning and property information and find Meetings and Agendas.

While you can still request information the old-fashioned way, via phone, access Open Government here: https://www. cityoffortpierce.com/989/Open-Government. This is our gift to our citizens: Our Open Government portal with a wealth of information at your fingertips. Enjoy. �




Fort Pierce without ever having to cross a major road? It's also one of Fort Pierce's waterway public access points; you can reach it by water from downtown.

## **Vendor Profile: Gary Abel**

The Jazz, Crafts and Arts Market is thriving again. After a tenuous Covid start, the crowds are back and tents are up. It cannot be overstated how important the market is to the vendors and the artists. This is their downtown storefront without the glass and the rent. If you are walking through and are drawn to the sound of native celebration you are getting close to Gary Abel's tent and his impressive display of Native American Style Flutes.

Gary is one of the veterans; in November he will be celebrating eight years exhibiting in the Market. The more I spoke with Gary, the more intrigued I became about that instrument, its unique properties, and about the performers who play it, and artisans, like Gary, who produce it. Not only is it one of the oldest instruments made by man (more than 40,000 years in the past), it has a rich history and many followers. Check out this website and you'll be amazed: https://www.flutopedia.com/.

Gary makes two types of flutes — single and drones. A drone flute is basically two flutes in one: one side with multiple holes to produce melody and the other with a single hole producing single note, usually tonic of the scale of the flute. Drone flutes

are produced in the "walking stick" style or in a side-by-side arrangement. Some drones are produced with three side-by-side chambers (two drones). The nomenclature of drone harkens back to the bagpipes. Most of us have seen bagpipes ... it is difficult to ignored them passing by.

Bagpipes have basically three components: the inflatable air chamber, the chanter which the bagpiper plays and three drones: bass drone, two octaves lower than the low-A of the chanter and two tenor drones, one octave lower than the low-A of the chanter. It's the drones that you hear first as the bag is being inflated.

I asked Gary how he got into this business. He said that he saw the flute, liked it's looks, and according to the clerk and the instructions provided anyone could master it without a musical background. Apparently, it was true. He was playing little tunes within couple of days. This was in 2003 and he added about a thousand flutes since then. He can produce one in about half a day, although in the beginning it took days to make one.

Curious, I checked the Flutopiedia pdf on how to do it (https://www.flutopedia.com/refs/Shands\_2010\_HowToBuildASimple-








NorthAmericanStyleFlute\_2010\_03\_01. pdf). With 71 pages of scary stuff and procedures, it's no wonder it takes days. Gary has a shop in Fort Pierce and uses a combination of tools and handiwork. From this point, on it's the mastery of the craftsmen to turn this wood into functioning and beautiful instrument.

So, what was I intrigued by? In spite of its ancient ancestry, it's a thoroughly modern instrument. Aside from the massive website I mention it is also promoted and supported by INAFA (International Native American Flute Association), and

the World Flute Society. On the technical side, the most common tuning is in the key of G; it's a nice size flute. As expected, they get smaller going up on the scale and larger going down. It





has six or five fingering holes to produce the pentatonic minor scale with scale steps of 3-2-2-3-2.

Advanced players can produce countless other modes with advanced techniques. Below are the fingerings for the diatonic major scale with scale steps of 2-2-1-2-2-2-1. Notice that the last note is overblown and played in the second register.

There are 2,146 scales based on 293 temperaments. Although it looks deceptively simple, there is a lot of technology making these flutes and skills to play them to full potential. Pros bend the notes, par-

tially cover the finger holes and even utilize different mouthpieces requiring embouchure. Trumpet players know that well.

As with any product, there is a range of possibilities. Gary Able certainly produces very fine instruments which one can purchase for a reasonable price. But at the other end of the spectrum there are flutes that one wonders are crafted for playing or for "investment" and display only. I spotted as triple drone with mother of pearl inserts, exotic woods and carvings, on a stag horn display stand. Incidentally when I checked the stock, none were available.

The buildings that burned are two blocks north of the St. Lucie County Courthouse.

Fire officials and police detectives spent all day Monday at the scene, searching for a cause.

The fire started about 9:30 p.m. in the former Rubin's department store, now a vacant one-story building. Firefighters thought they had the fire under control around 10:30 p.m. and were working to keep it from spreading to the adjacent Coke's Stationers when the tar-paper roof caught fire, and flames spread to the second story of the Coke's building.

Richard Coke, watched the fire ravage his business Sunday night, but he had little to say. The business has been there for 21 years.

The building directly north of Coke's was not damaged (Raulerson Building).

The Rubin's building has been vacant since the former

Health and Rehabilitative Services – now the Department of

Children and Families – moved its offices into a permanent

building on U.S. 1 a little more than a year ago.

Rubin's Department Store, once the only retailer in town that sold Boy Scout Uniforms and children's school clothes, had been closed for several years.

The Raulerson building, also owned by Coke, had the best preserved architecture on the block and the side of the building was stained with soot. A business owner who went inside after the fire was mostly out said the interior appeared to be free of smoke damage.

The Raulerson building is separated from the Coke building by a narrow alley.

"Thank God for that alley," said Sandy Stebbins, owner of a hair salon on the first floor of the Raulerson Building, as she watched the roof on the Coke building collapse.

"We were really lucky," she said. Stebbins and her partner, Wyatt Blankenbaker, opened the salon four months ago.

"There's so much being done downtown now, fixing it up and everything," Stebbins said. "It' such a shame to see a business go like this."



# Fishing Makes the Wishlist!

ur local waters provide amazing opportunities to enjoy fishing...and catching your own fresh fish dinner. This time of year the waters are getting cooler and the fishing is getting hotter! Cobia, tripletail, mackerel, and pompano are great fish to target in December and winter months.

The Atlantic Tripletail is a pelagic fish that many anglers love to catch and some even say they are the best tasting fish in the ocean. These aggressive feeding and fighting fish are recognized by the closeness of their dorsal, caudal, and anal fins which appear to look like three tails. Look for them inshore and offshore around floating debris, channel markers, weed lines, buoys, and crab trap markers. Although they will go for small baitfish and artificial lures, their favorite bait is shrimp and crab.

Cobia are also highly attracted to buoys, wrecks, and floating objects. These powerful, pelagic fish will take most any bait, live or artificial, and eat anything from shrimp and crab to mullet. You will need to use medium to heavy tackle to land a cobia and have a gaff ready since they can get up to 100 pounds. The limit in Atlantic waters is one cobia per angler or six per vessel whichever is less. They must be at least 33 inches to the fork to be a keeper.

The Golden or Florida Pompano are a popular target for their great fight and delicious mild taste. Small jigs, live shrimp or sandfleas are best choices for pompano success. Daily limit of Florida Pompano is six per angler per day.

Home to me is Mexico even though I was born in the United States. I feel a different connection when in Mexico; it is where most of my family lives. My dad immigrated here when he was 17 to build a good life for him and our family. Home tastes like Mexican food to me. Whether it is my mom, grandma or someone else's mom, it feels as though it is made with love specifically for you.

I felt most connected to my roots when I was in Mexico at my grandmother's. She didn't have a stove, so they put together concrete blocks leaving a shallow hole in the middle and lit a fire. They lined it with aluminum foil on the blocks and set the pot with the food in between two blocks to heat the pot. It was a very cool experience and amazing how creative everyone was. It was very different from how we live in the United States.

The food I identify with the most is empanadas. It was the first dish I learned to make. My specific memory was when I was 10. My

mom showed me how to make the empanadas in our kitchen and I was so excited to finally be able to help make something for everyone to eat.

#### ----- Recipe for Empanadas

Bag of mesa

Add water

Add salt

Choose type of meat

Potatoes

Sour cream

Queso fresco

Lettuce

Mix mesa with water and salt until consistency is moist. Roll the mesa into balls, put wax paper on tortilla press and place mesa balls. Press the mesa flat, but not too thin.

Prepare and cook the meat and potatoes. Add filling to flattened mesa, but not too full. Gently fold it over evenly, connecting it with the other side, and use your fingers or a fork to press the edges to seal it.

Heat oil in pan and put empanada in to fry until a golden brown then remove. Let them cool a little and top them with sour cream, queso fresco and lettuce. Serve with rice and beans and enjoy!
