

# Mayor's Message City of Fort Pierce Accomplishments in 2022

The City of Fort Pierce accomplished a great deal in 2022 and heads into 2023 with similar ambitions.

Many new homes were approved and/or built in 2022, a large majority in the Western Corridors between Kings Highway on the west and Hart-

man Road to the east, including Celebration Point, Blue Sky, Bent Creek, Phase II, Avalon Crossing, Waypoint, Hillpoint and Willow Lakes. Businesses were approved in the same area, including Camping World, KOA, Crosstown Parkway Warehouse, Flagstaff Self Storage, Lazy Daze RV Park, Aspen Dental, Homes to Suites by Hilton, and the Wave Garden on Midway Road.

Commercial improvements were made by Lawnwood Regional Medical Center, The Sands Assisted Living Facility, and Renaissance Businesses Park. Seven-Eleven took over the old Walgreen's at 25th Street and Orange Avenue.

A new **Wa-Wa** opened on U.S. 1, near Virginia Avenue, **Ocean Village** built a new clubhouse, **Harbor Cay Shops** opened on Seaway Dr. and the *City of Fort Pierce* improved and enhanced *Porpoise Beach Access* with a colorful mural.

Street resurfacing began city wide, and major improvements were made on 5th, 8th, and 17th Streets. Also, Beach Court, Avenue B, Indian River Dr., Ohio Ave. and Binney were all improved. In January, the city opened *Indian Hills Sun Trail* improvements.

The city opened the *Highwayman Museum* and began a partnership with *Incubate Neighborhood Center at Means Court Center*. The **Sunrise Theatre** came back to life, postpandemic, and hosted the only gubernatorial debate held in Florida in 2022.

Our police and public works departments worked unceasingly during 2022. The police resumed *Courageous Kids* and

*Unity in the Community* events. Public works kept our city clean and functioning throughout the year, when our near neighbors endured garbage woes brought on by contract carriers. Both police and public performed outstandingly during Hurricanes Ian and Nicole.


We changed the Election District lines with a thoughtful and public process, conducted elections and welcomed two new commissioners: Arnold Gaines after special and general elections and Michael Broderick, after the November general election.

A 1715 Cannon was unveiled at the waterfront, after a 3-year curing process and our city, along with the *Sunrise Kiwanis* and many community groups and individuals participated in a community rebuild of the *Kids Park at Jaycee Park*.

These are highlights of 2022, but so much more was achieved. We now begin planning for 2023 and beyond. ❖







## Kindness, Community and Cups on Display



Kindness is a quality of friendliness, generosity, and consideration.

"A Cup of Kindness" is an art exhibit featuring local artists working in clay and 90 original cups and mugs created by these artists. This exhibit will be presented January 20, 202, in the *Ramp Gallery* at **First United Methodist Church** in Fort Pierce. Thirty potters have entered 90 original cups and mugs in sup-

port of the *Kathy Krueger Acts of Kindness Memorial Fund*. The artists have added more than \$1,000 to the *Kindness* fund. The *Kindness* fund honors Fort Pierce native Kathy Krueger, who passed away in 2021 and is remembered for her kindness. Soon after her death, friends at **First Church**, established a fund whose purpose is to continue Kathy's legacy of kindness.

Since August 2021, the *Kathy Krueger Acts of Kindness Memorial Fund* has honored first responders in Fort Pierce. **First Church** began using the fund to provide meals and goody bags to all the emergency room shifts at **Lawnwood Hospital** and all ICU shifts. Next up, **First Church** focused on each shift at all *Fort Pierce Fire Rescue* stations. To date, over 550 goodie bags and 350 meals have been provided to honor and show kindness to our city's first responders. The *Fort Pierce Police Department* will be the next focus of efforts to recognize first responders.

The "Cup of Kindness" exhibit will run January 20 through February 12, 2023. The opening reception will take place on Friday, January 20th, from 5–7 p.m. This will be a unique exhibit. All cups will be available for purchase. Please support the artists as they have generously supported the *Acts of Kindness Fund*. Proceeds of sales go directly to the artists.





# 6th Annual Treasure Coast History Festival, Saturday, January 14

History will come alive in downtown Fort Pierce on Saturday, January 14, as the 6th Annual Treasure Coast History Festival is celebrated.

This year's festival will take place from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Second Street in front of the **Sunrise Theatre**, 117 S. Second St. Besides historical exhibitions outside the theater, the festival also features three presentations inside the theater, all tied to events that began exactly 100 years ago, in 1923.

Access to all events at the festival is free, compliments of Fort


Pierce-based *Indian River Media Group*, publisher of *Indian River Magazine* and *Fort Pierce Magazine*, and presenting sponsor, **St. Lucie Battery and Tire**. Also assisting in production of the festival are *Main Street Fort Pierce*, the *St. Lucie County Historical Society* and the Sunrise Theatre.

The first presentation inside the **Sunrise Theatre** begins at 9 a.m. and celebrates the centennial of the school that would become *Lincoln Park Academy*. Back in 1923, few black students were able to attend high school — there was no black









high school south of Palatka — and local parents got together to begin a high school in Fort Pierce that would provide an education for black teenagers. The presentation features eight panelists deeply tied to the school, including former School Board member Samuel Gaines, who has written a history on the school. Other scheduled panelists are Veryl Moore, Francina Mimms, Hassie Russ, Harry B. Williams, Ernestine English, Dorothy Jackson and Dave Perry.

The second presentation, at 10:30 a.m., celebrates the **Sunrise Theatre**, which opened as a vaudeville theater in 1923, the fulfillment of the vision of impresario R.N. "Pop" Koblegard. Two of Koblegard's granddaughters, Wendy Bishop and Mary Ann Bryan, will help recall the theater's early days and transition to a movie theater while other panelists, including *Main Street Fort Pierce Executive Director Doris Tillman*, will share how the theater was restored and reopened to its current splendor in 2006. The session includes a video presentation of rarely seen photographs tracing the theater's history.

The final presentation inside the theater is at 12:30 p.m. and features a *Cow Creek Reunion*, bringing people

together featured in *Indian River Magazine's Cow Creek Chronicles* series that followed the lives of C.F. Raulerson, who founded what would become the *Cow Creek Ranch* in 1923, and his descendants.


Scheduled guests on the panel include Debra Sloan, greatgranddaughter of C.F. Raulerson, and includes many of the descendants of the original Cow Creek cowboys and focuses on early Florida ranch life and cowboy folk ways.

The presentations inside the theater are emceed by Gregory Enns, publisher of *Indian River Magazine* and author of the *Cow Creek Chronicles*.

Planned exhibitions at the street festival include historical reenactors from the Seminole War who established Fort Pierce, a tent dedicated to the history of the Spanish treasure fleet that sunk off our coast in 1715 and a selection of historical books available for sale by the *St. Lucie County Historical Society* and the *Florida Classics Library*.

# Treasure Coast Manatee Foundation Supports Ecological Restoration

The Indian River Lagoon (IRL) has long suffered water **L** quality issues due to stormwater run-off from both urban and agricultural areas. Barometers of estuary health include the presence (coverage) of seagrass meadows and oyster beds. Both have been in decline in the IRL for quite some time.

In an effort to help, the Treasure Coast Manatee Foundation (TCMF) and the Manatee Observation and Education Center (MOEC) have embarked on two restoration projects in Moore's Creek, a natural tributary to the IRL. These ongoing restoration projects are a new direction for MOEC and TCMF who, historically, have focused primarily on education and awareness.

Beginning in 2019, TCMF and MOEC partnered with Florida Institute of Technology to initiate a Living Docks Oyster Program in Moore's Creek. Oyster shell donated by 2nd Street Bistro is cleaned and attached to mesh mats. The mats are then installed by wrapping them around dock pilings, just below the surface of the water. The old oyster shells work as a homing beacon of sorts for young, larval stage oysters which settle on the mats and develop into living adult oysters.

The program will assist with water quality improvement as each oyster filters up to 50 gallons of water per day as part of their feeding process. There are currently 31 oyster mats deployed in Moore's Creek. If each mat recruits 100 oysters, water filtration could be as high as 155,000 gallons every day!

When the manatee mortality rate reached a crisis level in 2021, TCMF and MOEC embarked on a second restoration effort, this time involving seagrass. The project quickly became a rallying cry — "Save the Seagrass!" and resulted in an inspiring community grassroots effort. Fundraising goals were reached and exceeded within a few short months, allowing the addition of a secondary seagrass enhancement project just outside Moore's Creek.

Fundamental to the cause was Pierced Ciderworks who hosted a Save the Seagrass fundraiser in November, 2021, where many local businesses and artists, along with community members, supported the cause. Additionally, the Doris M. Carter Family Foundation matched the funds raised that evening to help the initiative get started. Sea and Shoreline

was chosen as the environmental consultant, and plantings commenced in June, 2022. The young plants will take time to grow and spread, but once established the seagrass will provide habitat, food and spawning areas for various Indian River Lagoon species.

Peering into Moore's Creek you might wonder, "What are those cages/traps?" These devices are better known as herbivory exclusion devices which are in place to protect the fragile young seagrasses in the one-acre planting zone. These exclusion devices will remain in place for up to a year to allow the plantings to flourish and spread.

I invite all to stop by and visit the Manatee Observation and Education Center and see how you can get involved. By working together, we can make a real difference! �




































# Love, JAZZ Community: The Year of Yes!


to 9 p.m. Basically, you can enjoy a great meal and then burn off some of the calories dancing to your favorite songs because, of course we play requests.

125 years ago this month as reported in the Saturday, January 8, 1898 edition of the The Inquirer (Lancaster, PA)

### Florida Freeze Costs Millions

Early this week Florida had the coldest weather since the disastrous freeze of 1894. The mercury dropped to 22, two degrees lower than in the great freeze of 1894. The loss to pineapple and coconut growers will aggregate many thousands of dollars.

At Fort Pierce all the truck farms are ruined. Hundreds of thousands of dead fish are floating in the lake. Over 1,100 acres of pineapples around here are killed.

At Eau Gallie, the freeze has destroyed the last hopes of the orange growers along Indian River. The loss to orange growers and farmers along the coast will be between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

### White Way Project is Given Big Boost

Fort Pierce's white way project was given quite a boost when the officials of the Florida East Coast railroad company, here on an inspection tour Thursday, subscribed for twelve standards and lights, to be placed along the railroad's property adjoining the passenger station.

This now makes a total of 136 standards and lights that have been subscribe for, enough to give the city one of the most complete white way circuits of any to be found in the state.

C.S. Brasswell, promotor of the proposition, states that the bigger part of the material has already reached here and that arrival of the cable is now the only thing that is holding up the commencement of the installing it. This is now enroute and is expected to reach here any day.

The whole project will cost it is stated, \$11,600, of which all but a few hundred dollars has been subscribed.

### **Alto Adams Named Chief Justice Here**

Justice Alto Adams, former Fort Pierce circuit judge, has been named chief justice of the Florida Supreme Court for the next two years.

He succeeds Justice Elwyn Thomas, who also came to the bench from the Fort Pierce circuit court. Justice Adams will be 50 years old this month.

He is a native of Walton county and was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1940. He got his law degree from the University of Florida and practiced in Pensacola before going to St. Lucie County.

### **McCarty to Head Cancer Campaign**

One of Florida's best known public figures will lead the drive in the State in April for funds to carry on the fight against cancer. He is Dan McCarty, of Fort Pierce...

...Mr. McCarty, who was runnerup in the gubernatorial race last year, already has begun setting up a small army of volunteer workers who will carry the drive into every corner of every county in the State. 23

"Money given to the American Cancer Society by the people of Florida over the last three years," Mr. McCarty said, "has built here one of the finest cancer control programs in the United States...

...The State campaign chairman is recognized over Florida as one of the most public-spirited men in the State.

His family pioneered the development of Fort Pierce and the lower east coast and Mr. McCarty, soon after his graduation from the University of Florida followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather.

He was elected to the Legislature in 1937 and at the 1941 session was elected Speaker of the House – the youngest in Florida's history. He owns substantial citrus groves in St. Lucie County and was the organizer of the Indian River Citrus Associates, a cooperative packing and marketing group which he serves as general manager.





# January Brings Fishing Resolutions!

There is no better time to make a new resolution to enjoy more of the great fishing here on the Treasure Coast. The cooler waters of January provide amazing opportunities to get outdoors and catch a delicious fish dinner. I believe it's one of the best months of the year to be on the water because the fish are so plentiful. Redfish, snapper, tripletail, cobia, pompano, and sheepshead are choice targets.

Bottom fishing can be very productive in January, as well as being a ton of fun. Mangroves, lanes, muttons, and yellowtails are being found offshore on the 50–100-foot reefs. Remember to keep the bait on the bottom with enough weight. I prefer live bait but frozen will also work for snapper fishing. Near-coast reefs are good for targeting sheepshead, especially on those windy days when offshore is less attractive. When you find the sheepshead, be prepared for a bite with every drop of bait! Catching these sheeps will guarantee one of the tastiest fish dinners you've ever had on the table. If you would like someone else to be on cooking detail, **Cobb's Landing** in downtown Fort Pierce will be happy to take your fresh catch and turn it into a feast.

Offshore trolling is still seeing significant catches of kingfish, mahi and some sails. Mullet, threadfins, or blue runners are a good bet to put some kings on the boat. King mackerel must be at least 2" to the fork and anglers are allowed to keep two kings per day according to regulations.

This month will also see the *5th Annual Lenny Schelin Jr. Memorial Tournament* to benefit glioblastoma research. Fishing days are January 7th through January 14th. Awards party is scheduled at **Little Jim Bait & Tackle** on January 15th at 2pm. Your support is greatly appreciated. More information can be found at lennyschelinmemorialtournament.com.
