

The 7th Annual Treasure Coast History Festival will be held Saturday, January 13, 2024, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., in its new location at Museum Pointe Park, 414

Seaway Drive, on the grounds where the **St. Lucie Regional History Center** is located. Speakers and topics include: Rick Modine on *Cow Hunters and Carltons*; Marshall Adams on *A.E. "Bean" Backus* life and art; Doretha Hair Truesdell on *The History of the Highwaymen*; Jeanne Johansen on the *Life of Edwin Binney*; and Steve Hoskins on the *History of St. Lucie Village*. Doug Rooks will speak about architect,

William Hatcher, who designed the still-standing, 2nd Street **Raulerson Building**, celebrating its centennial in 2024. He also designed **Old City Hall**, completed in 1926.

The event will also feature family-friendly activities, including **Sumerlin's Fish Fry**, historical and pioneer exhibits, refreshments and music. Local story tellers like Billy Johnson, Tommy Schwartz, Terry Howard and others will be on hand to share their stories of early life on the Treasure Coast.

Following the overwhelming success of the inaugural *Mural Program*, which saw the transformation of several key locations






into captivating works of art, the **FPRA** is thrilled to invite artists to participate in the second phase of this transformative project.



7th Annual Treasure Coast History Festival, January 13th

¬o know and understand the dynamics of a community is to study its roots and the people who shaped its future. The counties and municipalities that make up the Treasure Coast are relatively young compared to other European and early American settlements along the east coast. Many of the families that first forged a living in the beautiful, yet wild landscape of south Florida did so around the late 1800s. The



post-Civil War settlement mirrored the branching out and development that was simultaneously occurring in the western territories of the United States. The folks who sought opportunities here back then did so before the availability of reliable transportation routes, air conditioning, mosquito control, early hurricane warning systems, and water management. To top it off, they also had almost no protection from one of the most treacherous predators of the region — sand flies, a.k.a. no-see-ums. The stories of their accomplishments and disappointments have been told, retold, and added to by the generations of family members that remained in the area throughout the decades. Since its inception, the St. Lucie County Historical Society has collected these stories and artifacts that paint the picture of life along the Indian River before the modern convenances we have today. These oral histories and demonstrations will be available to the public during the 7th Annual *Treasure Coast History Festival* on Saturday, January 13th.

The *Treasure Coast History Festival* was started by the *Indian River Magazine*, which is owned and run by Gregory Enns. His family moved into the area just over 100 years ago. Immediately after moving to the area, various members of the Enns family sold and developed real estate, owned & operated a citrus grove, owned an insurance company and purchased the local newspaper, the *News-Tribune*. Two members of the



Enns family, Ted & Paul Enns, served in managing roles during 24+ years they owned the newspaper, and continued as its publisher and business manager for years after it was sold to new owners. Greg was the fourth generation of his family in the newspaper business and to work for the local *News-Tribune* (now known as *St. Lucie News Tribune* under the daily news organization *Treasure Coast Newspapers*, LLC – TCPalm). He left his newspaper career and started the *Indian River Magazine* in 2006. His family's story is featured in the current edition of the *Indian River Magazine* or online at https://indianriverma-gazine.com/enns-of-an-era/.

This year the *St. Lucie County Historical Society* will oversee the *Treasure Coast History Festival* on the grounds of the *St.* Lucie County History Center located at 414 Seaway Drive in Fort Pierce. This is a family-friendly event that will run from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. There will be historical exhibits of pioneer history including a late 1800s cow camp and a Seminole War Army camp recreation. Several speakers will narrate the history of local industries, communities, individuals, and cultural icons throughout the event. Along with the speakers, there will also be story tellers in the family section of the St. Lucie County History Center that will tell tales about life in the area throughout the past century and beyond. Music will be played throughout the day by local band, The Square Ones and local musician, Kyle Kraft. This history festival would not be complete without a Summerlin Family Fish Fry and delicious BBQ will be available from the local chapter of Sigma Pi Beta (proceeds from BBQ sales will go to underprivileged children in our community). Refreshments will also be provided by the Key Club.

This year's History Festival is dedicated to Lucille R. Rights, a local historian, teacher and author. Her books will be available in the *SLC History Center's* retail shop. The *Florida Classics* library will also be on hand with a plethora of books about

the history of south Florida. An old postcard display will present the scenes and landmarks of yesteryear. The *History Club* of Fort Pierce Central High School will be present to assist with demonstrations

This will be the first year the *Treasure Coast History Festi*val will be held on the grounds of the History Center. It is a homecoming of sorts for Treasure Coast history. My own family has lived in St. Lucie County for over 100 years. In the 1980s when I was a young child, I remember visiting the History Center during history festivals with my grandparents, who were active members of the St. Lucie County Historical Society. My grandfather, Claude Davis, found and donated a small canon that bears his name on the plaque there. I remember the Seminole Indians and the beautiful dolls they made, and the old Gardner House being transported over the South Bridge on its way to its new home on the museum grounds. The folks that volunteer and operate the St. Lucie County Historical Society are a dedicated group of volunteers that want to ensure that the accomplishments of the people that occupied the region throughout its past are remembered and preserved for future generations. The History Center is open from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., Tuesday - Saturday. The St. Lucie County Historical Society gathers once a month for a dinner meeting that features different speakers each month. These meetings are open to the public but reservations are required. 

If you have lived in our area for any length of time you probably don't need an introduction to our state marine mammal, the Florida manatee (Trichechus manatus latirostris). These floaty potatoes can be found along our coast line, in our rivers and springs and even chilling in backyard canals.

The **Manatee Center of Fort Pierce** helped over 60,000 people get to know manatees better in 2022!

The Manatee Center was created to answer people's questions regarding the Florida manatee and educate locals and visitors about the unique environment and inhabitants of the Treasure Coast. The center features an outdoor classroom, exhibit area full of aquariums, a touch tank, terrarium and hands-on displays, plus a fun little gift shop. Depending on your timing you may even see manatees in Moore's Creek right behind the center!

Some educational programs are daily and some monthly ranging from "mommy and

me" story hours to creek-side chats; lunch time lecture series to Manatees 101. During the summer months there are 3 to



4 weeks of summer camps offered. You may ask how all of this is accomplished with only 4 paid staff but the answer is simple: Volunteers!

Our volunteers are what makes our center a success. Our volunteers are dedicated, knowledgeable and enthusiastic about our mission. We have one volunteer that actually started before the building was finished 27 years ago! Now that is dedication. Of course, we want to


offer more in-depth programs and ensure our visitors have the best experience possible but right now we are struggling to have a full contingent on each shift.

TREASURES OF THE PAST

the January 29, 1899 edition of the Morning News (Savannah, GA)

The Brooksville News-Register advocates the appointment of a state forest and fish warden

D.H. Alderman of Fort Pierce, has a fine orange grove near Judge M. S. Jones grove, west of Fort Pierce. He has ten acres under cultivation with 1,000 trees already planted. Some of his orange trees are fifteen inches in diameter, and are loaded with fruit. Many of his trees were uninjured by Florida's big freeze. Mr. Alderman also owns another grove in Mims.

... The Boggs brothers, Robert M. and John G. proprietors of the Oxford hotel, Avon by the Sea, are managing the Fort Pierce hotel, Fort Pierce, Fla., during the winter. Their Florida hotel is located in a section where hunting and fishing is excellent, and consequently a great number of sportsmen congregate at their southern hostelry.

Colonial Hotel at Fort Pierce is to be Opened Jan. 15

Work on the new Colonial hotel, 34 rooms, is coming along in good shape and the new hotel is to be opened for business Jan. 15, according to announcement of Mr. and Mrs. R.C. Erskine, who are having it built and who will operate it.

The opening of the new hotel will be coincident with the convening in Fort Pierce of the Florida State D.A.R. Conference, which will be in session here from the 15th through the 17th. The Colonial is to be the headquarters for the conference visitors.

While of Colonial design and build, the new hotel will be modern in facilities and appointments throughout. Situated so that it overlooks picturesque Indian River and has entrances from two of the main streets, its location is excellent. There will be a bath and shower in every room and otherwise the place will be fitted up in fine shape.

A coffee house located on the hotel grounds is to open at the same time and is to be used both for the hotel guests and for private dinner and luncheon parties, etc. It, too, is of colonial design, prettily fitted out and very "homey" in arrangement.

Alto Adams Named Chief Justice Here

Justice Alto Adams, former Fort Pierce circuit judge, has been named chief justice of the Florida Supreme Court for the next two years.

He succeeds Justice Elwyn Thomas, who also came to the bench from the Fort Pierce circuit court. Justice Adams will be 50 years old this month.

He is a native of Walton county, and was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1940. He got his law degree from the University of Florida and practiced in Pensacola before going to St. Lucie County.

McCarty to Head Cancer Campaign -**Public Figure Named State Chairman**

One of Florida's best-known public figures will lead the drive in the State in April for funds to carry on the fight against cancer. He is Dan McCarty, of Fort Pierce.

His selection as State Campaign chairman by the State Executive Committee of the Florida division, American Cancer Society, was announced here today through Mrs. Malcolm Smith, the Division's executive director.

Mr. McCarty who was runner-up in the gubernatorial race last year, already has begun setting up a small army of volunteer workers who will carry the drive into every corner of every county in the State.

"Money given to the American Cancer Society by the people of Florida over the last three years," Mr. McCarty said, "has built here one of the finest cancer control programs in the United States.

"Right now it is saving lives that otherwise almost certainly would have been lost, and the overall cancer fight is the brightest it has ever been. But that doesn't mean that it is won. The

Tide has begun to turn, but there still are more than 2600 men, women, and children dying of cancer in Florida every year. The lives of half of them can be saved.

"It will take money to help do it. The Florida Division is not going out to see how much money it can raise. It needs \$175,000 to carry out a careful program that has been mapped by the doctors and cancer control specialists. That amounts to an average of about 25 cents per family in the State...a ridiculous figure in the light of what it can accomplish."

Mr. McCarty said that a campaign chairman would be named in each county and a campaign organization built around the more than 600 volunteers who conduct the year-round cancer education program.

The State campaign chairman is recognized over Florida as one of the most public-spirited men in the State.

His family pioneered the development of Fort Pierce and the lower east coast and Mr. McCarty, soon after his graduation from the University of Florida followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather.

He was elected to the Legislature in 1937 and at the 1941 session was elected Speaker of the House - the youngest in Florida's history. He owns substantial citrus groves in St. Lucie County and was the organizer of the Indian River Citrus Associates, a cooperative packing and marketing group which he serves as general manager.





Start 2024 with a Trip Offshore!

The cooler waters of January bring amazing opportunities for anglers so it's the perfect time to make a new resolution to enjoy more of our great Treasure Coast fishing. From the Indian River Lagoon to the Fort Pierce Inlet and out into the Atlantic, you can expect exceptional fishing for snapper, tripletail, cobia, redfish, pompano, and sheepshead. Fishing is a great way to enjoy the outdoors, make a salty memory, and put dinner on the table!

One of my favorite fish to target in January is the Atlantic Tripletail. They are a favorite fighting pelagic fish that give a great battle and an even greater meal. Tripletail get their name from

the fact that the elongated dorsal, caudal, and anal fins are so close together they appear to look like three tails. I look for these fish around floating debris, buoys, and crab trap markers. Use light tackle and a small weight with 30-pound fluorocarbon and shrimp or crab as top bait choices. FWC regulations say the season is open year-round with a minimum length of 18 inches.

Bottom fishing is still a productive option this month with mangroves, lanes, and muttons being found offshore on the



50–100 foot reefs. Near-coast reefs are perfect for targeting sheepshead when the wind keeps us closer to shore. After you find the sheepshead, be prepared for a bite with every drop of bait and remember to keep your bait on the bottom with enough weight.

This month you can fish the *6th* Annual Lenny Schelin Jr. Memorial Tournament to benefit continued glioblastoma research. The dates are January 5th through 14th. The awards party will be held at Little Jim Bait & Tackle. More info can be found at lennyschelinmemorialtournament. com. Fish "the Lenny!"

Favorite Recipes from Main Street Board Members

Beef Stew by Wendy Lounds

2 pounds cubed beef chuck or beef stewing meat see note Flour for dredging

2 tablespoons olive oil + more as needed divided

1 medium onion chopped

3 sticks celery chopped

6 cloves garlic minced

1 (6 ounce) can tomato paste

1 cup dry red wine

3 cups beef broth

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon Italian seasoning

3 bay leaves

1 pound Yukon Gold potatoes peeled & diced

4 medium carrots peeled & sliced fairly thick

1 cup frozen peas optional

Salt & pepper to taste

Instructions

Prep ingredients. I recommend peeling and cutting the potatoes and carrots just prior to step 8.

Coat the beef cubes in flour, and shake off any excess.

Add 1 tablespoon of the oil to a pot/Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Once the oil is hot, sear the beef in two batches until nicely browned (if you crowd the pot it won't brown). Don't move the meat around the pan... turn it with tongs after it's had a few minutes to sear. Add the remaining oil to the pot for the second batch. Transfer the meat to a plate after each batch.

If the pot seems quite dry, add another teaspoon or so of olive oil, then add in the onions and celery and sauté for 5 minutes. Stir in the garlic and tomato paste and cook, stirring often, for 1–2 minutes. Stir in the wine, broth, and Worcestershire sauce. Scrape up any brown bits from the bottom of the pot.

Add the beef back to the pot (and any juices on the plate) as well as the Italian seasoning and bay leaves. Bring the stew to a gentle boil, then reduce the heat, cover the pot, and simmer for 1 hour. Important: I recommend stirring it occasionally during this time to ensure nothing is sticking to the bottom of the pot and that the temperature is still correct. On my gas stove I cook this stew alternating between mediumlow and low (I adjust as needed so it's bubbling fairly gently vs. full-on boiling).

Stir in the potatoes and carrots, cover the pot again, and continue simmering for another hour or until the potatoes, carrots, and meat are nice and tender. As per the previous step, give it a stir occasionally to ensure nothing is sticking/scorching, and adjust the stove's temperature as needed so it maintains a simmer.

Take the bay leaves out of the stew and stir in the frozen peas. Let them warm through.

Season with salt & pepper as needed and serve. �
