


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




#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



#### It's Hurricane Season. Are You Ready?

We are all familiar with the damage a hurricane, or even a strong, fast-moving thunderstorm can cause. Now is the best time to plan, prepare, and take the steps necessary to help you and your family stay safe during the 2021 Atlantic hurricane season (June 1 to November 30).

After the record-breaking 2020 Hurricane season, the predictions for the 2021 hurricane season from Colorado State University is again above average with 17 named storms, including 8 hurricanes, and 3 major hurricanes. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration stated their predictions as 13–20 named storms, 10 hurricanes and 3–5 major hurricanes. We are not even a month into hurricane season and there have already been three named storms this season: Tropical Storm Ana (May 19–23), Tropical Storm Bill (June 13–15, and Tropical Storm Claudette, named on June 19.

Storms are coming and the steps to prepare your plan are simple. Listed below are steps that can assist you with your planning. In addition, a listing of online resources can be found at the end of this article.

#### **EXAMINE YOUR RISK**

- **6** Are you in an area that is prone to storm surge and storm tide?
- •Are you in an area that could experience inland flooding from heavy rainfall?
- **\( \)** High winds, rip currents and tornadoes are also major hazards associated with hurricanes.

#### MAKE YOUR PLAN

- Find out if you live in an evacuation zone. Develop an emergency plan that includes your evacuation route. Experts recommend preparing an alternate route as well. Share your plans with someone that is not in the path of the storm.
- •Plan your evacuation destination. Remember that most hotels still have pandemic guidelines, so call ahead. If needed, be sure they accept pets.
- ♦ If you plan to evacuate to a shelter, update yourself on local public shelters. Know which shelters are for special needs or are pet friendly. Most areas require early registration for a special needs or pet-friendly shelter.
- **6** If you plan to evacuate to another state, be sure you know the pandemic guidelines for that state.


- If you plan to stay with family or friends, discuss any pandemic guidelines with them and how you will all stay protected.
- Make a plan for all of your pets. If you have to evacuate, never leave them behind.

#### PREPARE

- Prepare a list of emergency numbers and post in a convenient location, such as on the refrigerator door.
- Prepare your *Hurricane Emergency Supply Kit* now. Basics include enough non-perishable food and water to last at least three days. Have a two-week supply of prescription medicines and medical supplies. Don't forget to pack food and supplies for your pets. Flashlights, battery-operated radio, and extra batteries should be included in your kit, along with some cash. (Banks may be closed and ATMs will not work if there is a loss of power).
- ♠ If you are in an evacuation area, prepare a "go kit" with personal items you cannot do without (including bedding). Additional recommended items may include face masks, hand sanitizer, disposable gloves, disinfecting wipes and trash bags. If you have to evacuate, be sure to take your emergency supply kit along with your "go bag."
- Prepare your home and yard. Complete any needed maintenance early on anything that might pose a problem or danger during a storm, such as tree trimming.
- Review insurance policies and photograph/catalog house-hold belongings.
- **6** Gather financial, personal, household, medical and insurance information. Be sure IDs are up to date. Make copies and keep them in a secure location or a password-protected digital space.

#### **BEFORE A STORM**

- Fill your vehicle with fuel. Move your vehicles into the garage or to another secure location.
- **6** Review your emergency plan with your family.
- **6** Keep pets with you in your safe space.
- •Put up shutters and secure any outdoor objects that may pose a risk during high winds.
- **\( \)** Listen for emergency information and follow recommendations from local authorities. If you are told to evacuate, use



Hurricane Frances takes aim at the east coast of Florida in 2004. At 1 a.m. on September 5, the center of the broad eye of Frances made landfall at the southern end of Hutchinson Island, near Sewall's Point, Jensen Beach, and Port Salerno, Florida. President George W. Bush declared all of Florida a federal disaster area and visited Fort Pierce, assisting American Red Cross workers deliver water on September 8. Three weeks after Hurricane Frances, the center of Hurricane Jeanne's eye achieved landfall near Stuart, at virtually the identical spot that Frances had come ashore, the first time in record keeping that a hurricane made landfall in the same place as a previous storm of the same season.

roads that emergency workers recommend; others could be damaged or flooded. Never drive through flooded areas.

- Know how to turn off your power should you see flooding, downed power lines, or if you have to leave your home.
- Fill clean water containers with tap water for drinking in case your water supply is compromised during the storm. Bathtubs, sinks and buckets can be filled with water for washing.
- **\oldot** Be sure you keep cell phones and other devices fully charged in case of a power outage.

#### **DURING A STORM**

- **6**Keep your supply kit in a place you can easily access.
- **6**Listen to TV or radio for updates on the storm.
- **Stay** away from windows and doors. It is best to weather a storm in a room with no windows, or a closet.

#### AFTER THE STORM

- ♦ Listen to local officials for information and special instructions. Stay inside until authorities announce that it is safe to leave your home. Watch for announcements and updates from FPUA on www.facebook.com/TeamFPUA or www.fpua.com.
- **§** Be careful during clean-up. Wear protective clothing and work with a partner.
- **Never** go near downed power lines they may still be energized. Keep your distance as standing water or the ground around the lines could also be energized. Even underground lines can electrically charge standing water.

- **6** Avoid wading in flood water, which can contain dangerous debris.
- Save phone calls for emergencies. Phone systems are often down or busy after a disaster. Use text messages or social media to communicate with family and friends.
- **O**Document property damage with photographs. Contact your insurance company for assistance.
- Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Use generators, stoves, and grills outside and away from windows, doors and air conditioning intakes.

When hurricanes are predicted to head our way, panic can cause shortages of needed items. Don't wait for severe weather to be announced. Plan ahead to avoid the panic and purchase your supplies now. The best way to stay safe during any emergency situation is to know your plan and be prepared.




### Grace Education Campers Build Job Skills at the Manatee Center


*Grace Education & Business Community Center*, located at 712 North 7th Street in Fort Pierce, supports area youth year-round with income-based academic



Through the annual partnership with the **Manatee Center**, *Grace Education* campers become official volunteers and receive job training from the **Manatee Center** Volunteer Coordinator in various areas including care and maintenance of live exhibits, visitor services, and environmental interpretation. The youth play an important role in manning the **Manatee Center** 

1–2 times per week throughout the summer. Specifically, these young volunteers greet and interact with **Manatee Center** visitors, run the touch tank program, and educate the public with regard to manatees, water quality and our Indian River Lagoon.

## Fort Pierce, St. Lucie County Partner on SUN Trail Connection

Tonstruction of a new trail is underway through the *In*-Idian Hills Recreation Area. This joint project will help bring the Shared-Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail Network to Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County.

The construction project will create an improved north-south multi-purpose path through the recreation area from the Indian

Hills Golf Course to the south of Savanna Road. This will be the first of several SUN Trail segments planned in St. Lucie County that will eventually establish an 18-mile route of the East Coast Greenway from North

Hutchinson Island to Jensen Beach. A joint project between St. Lucie County (grant applicant), the City of Fort Pierce (project manager), and the Florida Department of Transportation (funding administrator) is valued at roughly \$500,000.

PRP Construction Group, LLC, of Indiantown, is the contractor who will be constructing this section of the trail. The contract time is 180 days with final completion set for November 9. Work will commence at the north end near Indian Hills

Drive and progress south. The trail will be 12 feet in width and approximately one mile in length.

The *East Coast Greenway* is a multi-purpose path that connects 15 states and 450 cities and towns for 3,000 miles from Maine to Florida. Through a series of grants from the Florida Department of Transportation and the SUN Trail Network,

> this area could receive nearly \$20 million worth of improved trail infrastructure by 2030.

The SUN Trail Network is the statewide system of highpriority paved trail corridors for bicyclists and pedestrians. Today, the SUN Trail Network includes a combination of existing, planned, and conceptual multiple-use trails. It is a refined


version of the Florida Greenways and Trails System (FGTS) Plan's Land Trails Priority Network.


Located at 52 Savannah Road, the *Indian Hills Recreation* Area is a stormwater treatment facility designed for a 1,242acre watershed that features passive recreation including a walking trail and exercise stations.





For centuries we've been searching for the Fountain of Youth; the mythical spring that magically restores our youthful energy, vigor, and beauty. Famed explorer Ponce de Leon was allegedly looking for the Fountain of Youth when he stumbled upon the beautiful, tropical paradise he named Florida. He may not have found the mysterious fountain, though, as records show de Leon died at 47. Still, like so many of us, he was looking for something that would keep his mind and body sharp as the years roll by. And while we now have easy access to fillers, skilled surgeons, and a host of ingenious creative and technological advances, experts suggest that there are some simple things we can do to keep our minds sharp and our brains working even as we begin to get a little long in the tooth.

According to researchers from Johns Hopkins, it has been shown that listening to music can reduce anxiety, blood pressure and pain, as well as improve sleep quality, mood, mental alertness, and memory. Their advice is simple, "If you want to keep your brain engaged throughout the aging process, listening to or playing music is a great tool. It provides a total brain workout." How do they know that music is the magic wand? "Johns Hopkins researchers had dozens of jazz perform-

ers and rappers improvise music while lying down inside an fMRI (Functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging) machine to watch and see which areas of their brains light up." Cue the downbeat, and what kicked in? You guessed it — the lights and the brain activity, proving beyond a shadow of a doubt that music is even more magical than we imagined. The official wording from the Johns Hopkins researchers went like this: "Music is structural, mathematical and architectural. It's based on relationships between one note and the next. You may not be aware of it, but your brain has to do a lot of computing to make sense of it," noted one otolaryngologist.

Members of *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* have understood this for a long time. That's why they offer so many opportunities for individuals throughout the Treasure Coast to stimulate their own brains as they enjoy live music. Throughout the summer months, from June through November, you can boost your brain power every other Tuesday evening while enjoying the company of friends, a gorgeous sunset by the water, and an adult beverage or two, as the *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* presents *Jazz Jams* at the *Fort Pierce Yacht Club*.

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

## **Gulf-Atlantic Highway is Latest Tampa Route**

## League is formed at Fort Pierce meeting to boost for short-cut across state

Organization of the Gulf-Atlantic Scenic Highway League was effected here Monday with representatives from four counties present. Eventually the league is to have representatives include all of the counties between Dade and Pinellas through which the new highway will pass.

The proposed road will provide a new route from Miami to Tampa and St. Petersburg, via Fort Pierce, Okeechobee, Sebring and Haines City.

There is about 84 miles of this route to be hard-surfaced, the rest being good, well-paved road.

One of the features of the highway is to be the planting of ornamental trees and shrubs along its entire length.

The route will be about 50 miles shorter than the Melbourne route to Tampa from points on the lower east coast.

J.E. Ethredge of Sebring was made president, and M.W. Luce secretary. A vice-president is to be named from each county through which the highway passes.

#### To Enforce Driver's Law

The state law which prohibits children under fourteen years of age from driving automobiles, unless they are accompanied by duly authorized chauffeurs or by the owner of the vehicle, is to be enforced in Fort Pierce. The city council has instructed the city attorney to draft an ordinance along the lines of the state statute with the intention to making it effective at the earliest possible moment.

#### **Surplus Sale is Scheduled**

The first of a series of "sales at site" programs launched throughout the nation by the War Assets administration will begin in Florida at the Navy's amphibious base at Fort Pierce July 15.

Announcement of the impending sale was made by WAA executives in Jacksonville who said it was designed to step up the disposal of surplus property to the public.

During the sale, from July 15 to 26, special sales will be set aside for priority groups as follows:

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Sales to veterans and federal agencies, July 15–16; to certified veterans, July 15–19; to RFC for resale to small businesses, July 22; to state and local governments and their instrumentalities, July 23; to eligible non-profit institutions, July 24, and to the general public, July 25–26.

In Washington War Assets Administrator Lt. Gen. E.B. Gregory has announced that current prices of surplus property will be maintained in line with the national fight to prevent inflation.

#### **Veterinarian Back in Civilian Life**

Dr. Jay N. Thomas, Fort Pierce veterinarian, is back in civilian life after nearly four years' service and will resume the practice of his profession here. Entering service as a private Aug. 19, 1942, Dr. Thomas emerged as a major, having been separated from service at Fort Bragg, N.C. July 4.

Commissioned as a first lieutenant soon after entry into service, he was sent to the San Antonio Cadet center for OTS, assigned to duty in the transport command of the Army Air corps. Later, he was transferred to Del Rio, Tex., where he was in charge of war dogs. Promoted to a captaincy, he was assigned to duty in the Chine-Burma-India theater, where for six months he was in charge of food inspection. He then returned to the States and shortly afterwards was sent to Natal, Brazil for duty with the South Atlantic wing.

## Fort Pierce Airport Ready for Future

Anticipating a deluge of aircraft activity when Walt Disney World opens in October, Fort Pierce – St. Lucie County airport manager Curtis King said he is ready.

The airport is equipped to handle STOL (short takeoff and landing) aircraft, and has a great potential since the construction of a STOL airport at the Disney World site, according to King.

"It's a logical conclusion we will get traffic from there," said King.

"And there also is the possibility of a regular schedule of STOL flights connecting with through traffic at Orlando Jetport to Disney World and the surrounding towns, and that should include us."

King said the present airport terminal facilities at Fort Pierce are adequate for the foreseeable future. He pointed out that application has been made to the FAA for extending the present runways to accommodate a wider variety of craft.

Recent changes in customs regulations to permit aircraft landing after regular hours to be inspected at a standard fee instead of extra fee, also opens up new potentials, according to King.

Fort Pierce is a direct route between Disney world and the Bahamas and when traffic justifies it, customs officials have indicated a full time customs service can be established here.

In addition to the extra bonus in business expected from Disney World, King said all aviation is expected to double in the next ten years.

"Our airport will get its share," he said. "In the last threeand-a-half years, our business has increased at the rate of 45 percent per year."



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
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#### Protect Your Small Business This Hurricane Season

#### Follow these steps to bolster your business against hurricane risks before one ever strikes

Atlantic hurricane season was one of the most active and costliest on record. The 2021 Hurricane season starts on June 1 but it's never too early to prepare. Damage from a hurricane can be costly for small businesses and can pose

hazards for you and your employees. Fortunately, there are ways that you can fortify your business against a hurricane to minimize losses and reduce risks for workers.

SBA offers a guide (www.sba.gov/sites/default/files/hurricanepreparednesssba.pdf) to help you consider how a hurricane might impact your operations and determine how you can prepare before one ever strikes. Below are a few key takeaways to help you get started.

#### WAYS FOR SMALL BUSINESSES TO PREPARE

#### BEFORE A HURRICANE

Some of the most important steps you can take to prepare for a hurricane occur before a storm forms. These steps include:

Putting a system in place to back up critical business data. Your data should be backed up regularly and should be accessible off-site, making cloud data solutions ideal options.

Ensuring your insurance includes relevant protections for hurricanes. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), standard insurance policies do not cover flooding, including storm surge flooding, but flood insurance is available for business owners through the National Flood Insurance Program. (www.floodsmart.gov)

Developing an emergency communications plan. Make sure you have a plan in place for how you will communicate with key stakeholders — including employees, customers, and suppliers — during and after a hurricane. As a part of your plan, keep an up-to-date list of these stakeholders' contact information accessible off-site.



Making sure your disaster kit is fully stocked. In case you are ever on-site at your business during a weather disaster, you should have a disaster kit (www.ready.gov/kit) with critical supplies such as water, food, masks, a flashlight, a first aid kit, and more.

FEMA offers an assessment to help you identify safety and business continuity risks your specific business may face in the event of a hurricane, via their hurricane preparedness toolkit. The toolkit also walks you through how to address these risks.

#### How to Protect Your Business After a Storm

#### IS ANNOUNCED

When the *National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Hurricane Center* issues a watch or warning, start taking the following steps:

Take precautions to ensure that items outdoors will not blow away or cause damage. Remove all loose debris and anchor or relocate all nonessential equipment to a safe indoor location.

Install windstorm shutters or plywood over windows and doors. Doing so will help prevent interior damage to your building.

Disconnect the main electrical feeds to the facility. This will help prevent a potential fire caused by short-circuiting of damaged equipment. Similarly, shut off natural gas supply to minimize fire loss. Get ahead of post-storm recovery efforts. Have cash on hand for



post-storm needs, such as buying food and supplies. Additionally, fill fuel tanks of generators, fire pumps, and all company-owned vehicles.

If an official evacuation order is in place during a hurricane, no employees should stay behind. However, if you are on-site at your business during the storm, remain in a place that has been identified as safe from wind and flood.


#### RECOVERING YOUR BUSINESS AFTER THE STORM

Wait until the storm has passed and local officials declare your area safe before entering your business to secure the site and survey damage. Start any needed repairs as soon as possible to prevent further damage.

If your business is in a federally declared disaster area, you may qualify for SBA disaster assistance. Check https://disasterloanassistance.sba.gov/ela/s/search-declarations to see if a disaster has been declared in your area and apply for a disaster loan. SBA resource partners are available to help you apply for disaster loans and to walk you through the steps of rebuilding your business. #### Fort Pierce Fishing is Hot!

The best way to beat the summer heat is to get out on the water! Fishing and boating are two great activities to enjoy on the Treasure Coast when it's just too hot to do

much else. Plus, there's just no shortage of fish in the beautiful waters of Fort Pierce so you should end up with a cool fish dinner.

Mangroves, lanes, and muttons are great to target on the reefs in

about 50-100 feet. As usual, live bait is best for snapper fishing but frozen will work, too. Use shrimp or live pilchards with 30-pound fluorocarbon and #2 hook and keep your bait on the bottom for best results. Snapper fishing at night before the full moon can produce some great bites. Mahi fishing is going strong offshore. Naked or skirted fresh ballyhoo are the bait





of choice for dolphin fishing. Just look for weed lines, diving birds, and floating debris on a slow troll and be prepared for some acrobatic action when you get a hit.

## Recipes from My Roots

Caitlin Raymond is our next student at Fort Pierce Central High School who participates in the Culinary Program to share a favorite family recipe. Caitlyn feels strongly about family and home. She feels it is a place to go and be loved and cared for always. Her favorite time is with her mom, dad and brother and enjoying the smells of her mom's home-style cooking.





The last time she visited family in South Africa and felt connected to her roots she was with her Mom's family sharing a dinner. Caitlyn identifies mostly with South African/Indian food and one of her favorite recipes is Soji (So-gee). Soji is made with Semolina which is a coarse flour made from durum wheat. In South Africa they use a wheat called Taystee (very similar to Semolina) to make their Soji. It is a breakfast porridge. Her first time eating this tasty meal was on her trip to South Africa with her family. ❖

#### Recipe for Soji

1 cup Taystee Wheat
90 grams butter (7 tablespoons)
1 tsp ground cardamom
2 cinnamon sticks
½ cup granulated sugar
1-½ cups warm milk
½ cup hot water

Optional golden raisins and slivered almonds

Toast the Taystee wheat, cinnamon, cardamom, and sugar in a wide pot until the color is whitish not brown. Add the butter and let it melt fully. Add the milk and water and stir until smooth and thickened. If you prefer to, mix in the golden raisins and top with slivered almonds. �



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














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
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
