




Florida Main Street is dedicated to revitalizing communities across the state






Mayor's Message Honor Fort Pierce Police Officers

The Fort Pierce Police Department (FPPD) will celebrate its 100th Anniversary in 2023. Since then, four officers have lost their lives. Officer Willie B. Ellis was killed in July, 1986. In 2000, the Avenue D Substation was named in his honor.

Lieutenant Grover Cooper and Detective Jimmy Wouters were killed in January 1987 and in January 2012, the main police station was named in their honor. Sergeant Danny Parrish lost his life on January 18, 1991, in what was supposed to be a simple traffic stop.

You can help us honor Sergeant Parrish and all our fallen first responders with a park named in his honor. Located at 920 South U.S. Highway 1, Sergeant *Danny Parrish Fallen First Responders Park* will honor all first responders who made the ultimate sacrifice while serving their community. It will be a sacred place for our residents, visitors, and family members of our fallen first responders to visit and reflect on how much we all owe to our heroes.

In addition, a bronze statue will be placed in front of the FPPD main station, depicting a uniformed officer saluting, giving honor to the United States flag and the *Sergeant Danny Parrish Fallen First Responders Park*. The statue, titled "Hero," will represent all fallen first responders and will have pavers engraved with the names of memorial supporters and donors around the immediate area of the statue. Pavers are planned to be placed in the *Memorial Park* as well.

You can be a part of these momentous events honoring our heroes by purchasing brick paver(s) from the *Fort Pierce Police Department Charitable Trust*, a newly-formed, not-for-profit

501 (C) 3 organization, governed by a board made up of law enforcement and civilian members. Your purchase of a paver and/or any donations to the *FPPD Charitable Trust* will help complete the park and fund the statue. Your contribution will also help the FPPD fund equipment, pro-



grams, and community engagements that keep our officers safer and strengthen the relationship between the police department and our community.




As if the *Craft Cocktails on Tap* isn't enough excitement, Vero Beach native and champion surfer, Oliver Kurtz, will

Partnerships Make for Smoother Sailing

rance without the well-oiled assistance of the crew. Finding the right crew member to navigate, to crank a winch, or to raise a spinnaker is critical in performance sailing. It is much the same as one strives to improve performance in business. The *Fort Pierce Yacht Club* has as its mission to promote safe boating through boating education and activities, and to participate in community activities deemed to be of benefit to the community at large. How do we achieve those goals with a limited number of volunteer members and resources? It would not be possible without partnerships and collaboration with other community organizations, so the FPYC strives to create partnerships with those who can extend our reach and contribute critical skill sets to help us reach our goals. A few examples are:

COMMITMENT TO ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES: Several years ago, the FPYC created a "third Thursday" lecture series focused on environmental issues. After two years, there was a need to expand both the speakers and the audience FPYC could reach. This need evolved into a partnership with the *Manatee Education and Observation Foundation*. This program ran for two years prior to the onset of covid restrictions and is currently in the planning stages to resume in the fall. FPYC later extended

the partnership with the sponsorship of the *Save the Seagrass* campaign undertaken by **Manatee Center** and then the des-

ignation of FPYC as a future planting site for seagrass restoration

COMMITMENT TO CLEAN WATERS: This goal led the FPYC to partner with Marine Industries Association of the Treasure Coast's (MIATC) Waterway Cleanup on the Treasurer Coast in not only volunteering to help the cleanup effort, but also in offering resources to function as a distribution and collection center. The July 23, 2022 cleanup date will be our 15th year working with MIATC (www.TCWaterwayCleanup.com). Join us! And our partnership with FAU Harbor Branch has enabled the Fort Pierce Yacht Club Foundation to sponsor four summer research interns in various aspects of water-related research.

EXPANDING SAFE AND ENJOYABLE BOATING ACTIVITIES: This commitment led the FPYC back to MIATC to collaborate with them on the annual *Christmas Boat Parade*, serving as the local entity promoting participation. 2021 delivered the most boats participating in many years — a true example of working together!

BOATING EDUCATION: Boating education is paramount to safe enjoyment of the sport and while FPYC has many accomplished boaters, we had few educators and educational materials.



A solution was to partner with *St. Lucie Power Squadron*, *US Sailing Foundation*, *Melbourne Yacht Club* and others over the past three years to bring 15 educational courses ranging from Racing Rules, weather, cruising locations, and women's boating/racing skill courses to the Fort Pierce community. Watch for our fall schedule of courses!

MUSIC IN THE COMMUNITY: To help support music in the community, the FPYC made a decision three years ago to lend the facility to *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* (jazzsociety. org) and as a result became their summer home. This partnership enables the *Fort Pierce Yacht Club Foundation* to earn money from the sale of beverages to fund a position of junior counselor and two students at *Wesley Island Eco Camp*. This partnership helps furthering play a role in inspiring young people to learn about our waters.

Yes, Manatees have a Fossil History

What everyone knows about dinosaurs and paleontologists, those scientists who study fossils and reconstruct the environments in which they lived. But did you know that Florida manatees have a fossil record that document how they changed from land-dwelling plant eaters to the marvelous marine mammals that we see today?

As a paleontologist who recently retired from a teaching career, I became interested in tracing the fossil origins of manatees once I started volunteering at the **Manatee Observation** and **Education Center**. I would often be asked by visitors to the Center questions like "How long have manatees existed?" and "What is the closest living relative to manatees?" Turns out, paleontologists have answered these questions and more.

Let's set the stage. About 65 million years ago, a huge space rock smacked into our planet and caused the extinction of the dinosaurs and thousands of other animal and plant species. One group that survived the impact were our mammal ancestors, most of which were no bigger than a house cat. Over the millions of years after the impact, mammals grew larger and more diverse, stretching into a wide variety of body shapes and ecologic niches. For example, one group remained small in size and learned how to fly — this group became bats. Another group became large and ponderous plant eaters. About 47-50 million years ago, a group of South American plant eaters called prorastomids began spending more and more time in shallow waterways and less on dry land.

What would have driven the prorastomids to spend more time in the water? It is likely that there are several reasons, including an abundant supply of aquatic plants growing in shallow inlets and lagoons, the availability of fresh drinking water, and the absence of large aquatic predators, thereby providing a safe environment for their young. Whatever the reasons, these ancestors of manatees (and their cousins, the dugongs) completed the transition into a fully aquatic marine mammals over the next tens of millions of years with the change from front legs (walking) into flippers (swimming) and their tail into a whale-like fluke. As a group, manatees first appeared about 6.5 million years ago with the modern Florida manatee

(Trichechus manatus latirostris) appearing in the fossil record about 1.3 million years ago.

Several features of manatees ally them with elephants via a plant eating common ancestor that lived about 50 million years ago. Both groups have what are termed "marching molars", in which their teeth move in conveyor belt fashion from the back of the jaw to the front, then get spit out once worn down and useless for chewing food. Another trait is that both manatees and elephants still have finger bones and fingernails on their front limbs. Have you ever heard the term "pachyderm" used for an elephant? The word means "thick skin," a trait that manatees share with elephants.

Today, there are three species of manatees and one species of dugong, all of which descended from those ancient South American herbivores. It is only from the diligent work of paleontologists that this story has come to light and allows us to appreciate the fossil origins of Florida's amazing manatees.


Florida manatees can be observed in St. Lucie County in and near marinas and inlets, in the Indian River Lagoon as well as in freshwater rivers and creeks. The **Manatee Observation and Education Center** (MOEC) is situated on Moore's Creek where manatees find refuge and freshwater year-around. MOEC is located at 480 N. Restoration Project at Moore's Creek June 2nd & 3rd

The long-awaited seagrass restoration project in *Moore's Creek* was installed on Thursday, June 2nd and Friday, June 3rd, starting across from the **Manatee Center** manatee mural, at 480 N Indian River Drive in Fort Pierce, west until Moore's Creek at 7th street.

Last year, the Manatee Observation and Education Center (MOEC) and *Treasure Coast Manatee Foundation* (TCMF) raised over \$75,000 to restore nearly one acre of seagrass in *Moore's Creek* and educate local schools

and public about it. The restoration project will be led by **Sea & Shoreline**, a Florida-based restoration company who also led the successful seagrass restoration efforts in Crystal River. **Sea & Shoreline** will monitor progress for three years following installation. In Fall 2022, **Sea & Shoreline** will also install a seagrass enhancement and research project located at the **Fort Pierce Yacht Club** and funded by a grant from the *Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program.* •

> California where she started her new career at the famed restaurant, The Slanted Door. After handling some personal items, she returned to Florida and joined Nobu on South Beach, followed by


Chef Angela prides herself on having a wonderful team to work with her (thanks Tammy, Nelson and Paola). She is also training Nicole in the kitchen

TREASURES OF THE PAST

100 years ago this month as reported in the Friday, July 21, 1922 edition of the Palm Beach Post

To Put \$150,000 Theatre Block in Fort Pierce

Koblegard and Minshall Brothers Back of Enterprise – Also 6 Stores and 8 Offices Investors See Great Future In St. Lucie County

A \$150,000 theatre and business block will be erected in Fort Pierce on Pine street (present day 2nd Street) on the site of the present Critchley building and the two lots south, by R.N. Koblegard of Washington, D.C. and E.R. Minshall of Tulsa, Oklahoma, to be ready for the formal opening on Thanksgiving Day, according to Goodwin and Baker, local real estate men through whom the deal was made, after only a week of negotiation.

The site has already been bought and Architect John R. Sherwood employed to draw up the plans and specifications. A rough outline of the building was accepted yesterday by the builders.

The building will have six store rooms and eight offices besides, one of the most modern and best equipped theatres in the state.

The theatre will have a seating capacity of twelve hundred or more. The entrance will be a twenty foot lobby, opening on Pine street. The interior will be artistically decorated in Pompian style with a three color indirect lighting system. An air washer

ventilation system will be installed which will be placed under the seats instead of overhead. The stage will be as large as any in the state and will have modern equipment and scenery in every way.

The stores will also face on Pine street, five being on the south side of the entrance lobby with the others on the north side. Five were leased as soon as the building of the theatre became known. The offices will be located on the second floor.

The builders of this up to-date business block and theatre are men well known in and around Ft. Pierce, because of their large interests in groves and other property here. Mr. Koblegard first came to Fort Pierce about twelve years ago and financed and developed what is now known as the Fort Pierce Farms, of which all of Fort Pierce is proud. He was also the principal developer in the Seminole Fruit Company, a concern that is one of the largest in the state. This company alone owns one of the finest orange groves of 150 acres in this section. Besides these two large enterprises he also owns other property in Fort Pierce.

According to Mr. Baker of the firm Goodwin and Baker, Mr. Koblegard has been watching the rapid growth of Fort Pierce and has been considering the erection of this building for the past two years; seeing great possibilities on the account of the opening of the inlet and opening up of 75,000 acres through the North St. Lucie River Drainage District...

Business study to help FP growth

Preliminary data will be released

Efforts to revitalize business in downtown Fort Pierce will have some solid facts to keep the momentum going, say officials helping organize the push.

Halfway through a market analysis on the benefits of the downtown Fort Pierce business area, officials with Marketek of Atlanta will release preliminary data today at a meeting of downtown merchants.

In April, the Fort Pierce Main Street organization hired the company to conduct a detailed study.

The data will provide some tangible numbers at an opportune time for downtown merchants. The Fort Pierce Downtown Business Association was organized July 15.

The preliminary study's release "is perfect timing," said Lisa Horn, owner of the Beer Garden, 101 N. Second St., and a member of the association board of directors. "Anything like this helps."

Horn helped get more than 50 business owners to join the association at its first meeting and said the marketing analysis is more ammunition to promote a positive image of the area. The association "won't appear to be fly-by-night," Horn said.

"I've had people say 'I've seen (downtown organizations) come, I've seen 'em go.' Now maybe people will say this one's for real," she said.

Doris Tillman, manager of Main Street Fort Pierce, who is in charge of coordinating downtown revitalization efforts, said the marketing study will help build redevelopment momentum.

"It will give (businesses) information for themselves as to what things are needed downtown," Tillman said.

"It will let them know how they can increase their business. It will also allow them to know what kind of businesses to recruit," she said.

Horn agreed that recruiting new business is critical for downtown. "We have a lot of empty storefronts down here. That was kind of the purpose of forming the (Downtown Business) Association. I anticipate looking at the information," she said.

That information will be distrusted at a meeting set for 7 a.m. today at the Old City Hall, 315 Avenue A. Although this is a preliminary study, it's part of a larger survey that should be completed within three months, Tillman said.

"This study is the economic master plan. It will be the road map for the economic future of the city," she said.

Tillman and the Main Street organization coordinated the study, but the Fort Pierce Community Development Agency is paying the \$32,000 cost, she said.

Also at today's meeting, representatives from the Indian River Community College Business Development Center will be on hand to advise merchants on adjusting to a changing downtown climate.

"A part of any redevelopment is tied in with the folks that will staff a business. We're there to share information and explain customized training we can provide," said Richard Lyons, assistant dean of business and information technology at IRCC.

Many downtown merchants will need to restructure some of their business practices simply because the revitalization will bring more customers into many stores, he said. "In these kind of situations, it's critical to design increased customer relations skills for staff," he said.

All the information gathered at today's meeting will be shared by the board of directors of the Downtown Business Association. The board will present the data to its general membership at 8 a.m. Aug. 19, at the Beer Garden.



Free to Fish!

hen the summer heat gets more intense, remember it's cool to fish! Our local waters are an angler's paradise so it's time to have some serious fun fishing. All ages enjoy the action of reeling in a nice catch that most likely will end up on the dinner table. That's what we call "gettin groceries!"

Mangroves, lanes, and muttons are plentiful and great to target on the reefs in about 50–100 feet. Live bait is best for snapper fishing but frozen will work, too. Shrimp or live pilchards with 30-pound fluorocarbon and enough weight to keep your bait on the bottom will give best results. I also recommend snapper fishing at night right before a full moon for some great bites and an easy way to fish while staying out of the sun.

Offshore the mahi bite is going strong. Slow trolling with naked or skirted ballyhoo will increase your chances of hooking one of these colorful and acrobatic fish. Watch for weed lines and feeding birds and if you catch one, keep an eye out for others since they are a schooling fish.

This month is also the time for the highly anticipated lobster mini-season July 27th and 28th. Lobster divers will be here in full force hoping to catch some tasty spiny lobster. I can guarantee that lobster tails and fresh snapper are both fantastic on the grill.

Summer days get hot in the Sunrise City! Nothing is better than a yummy smoothie to cool you down. I hope you enjoy!

Daniela Mendoza's Red, White and Blue Smoothie

Blue Layer

4 ounces pomegranate juice (½ cup)

½ frozen banana, sliced

½ cup frozen blueberries

½ cup ice

1 tablespoon honey

White Layer

2 ounces orange juice (or juice from 1 orange)

½ cup ice

½ cup yogurt, plain or vanilla

1 frozen banana, sliced

Red Layer

2 ounces pomegranate juice (¼ cup)

1 cup of frozen strawberries, halved

½ frozen banana, sliced

½ cup ice



For the blue layer: pour pomegranate juice into the blender and add the bananas, blueberries, ice, and honey until smooth. Pour into the bottom of four 8-ounce glasses and tap the glass lightly on the countertop to help even the layer. Freeze while prepping the next layer.

For the white layer: Rinse out the blender and pour in the orange juice and add the ice, yogurt, bananas, and blend until smooth. Pour the white layer on top of the blue layer in the glasses. Again tap the glass lightly on the countertop to help even the layer, and then return to the freezer.

For the red layer: Rinse the blender once more and pour in the pomegranate juice and add the strawberries, bananas, ice, and blend until smooth. Pour the red layer on top of the white layer. Keep in the freezer until ready to serve.
