



If a match is found, a text or e-mail containing the document information is sent to the registered user.

Mayor's Message FPUA Ready for Growth

This year, the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority (FPUA) celebrates its 50th birthday. Since being formed in 1972, the FPUA has made it a priority "to provide our customers with economical, reliable and friendly service in a continuous effort to enhance the quality of life in our com-

munity." Using the tag line "Your Home Town Utility," **FPUA** provides electric, water, wastewater, gas and FPUA-Net communications services.

With a five-member Board, four of whom are appointed by the City Commission, and the fifth, the Mayor of Fort Pierce, the **FPUA** operates as a discreetly presented component unit and within the voter-approved city charter; it contributes about \$6 million annually to the City of Fort Pierce.

In recent years, **FPUA** has begun to add solar energy to its electric production. Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) or "smart meters" are being installed system wide over several years. The **FPUA** is planning a" smart city" initiative with interactive kiosks in strategic locations in the city.

By far, the largest project the **FPUA** has embarked on is relocating the Island Water Reclamation Facility (IWRF). Since 2004, the citizens of Fort Pierce have expressed an interest in moving the IWRF off the Western Peninsula of South Hutchinson Island. **FPUA** has identified a location in western Fort Pierce on Energy Drive, next to the Treasure Coast Energy Center, a facility jointly operated by the **FPUA** and the Florida Municipal Power Agency (FMPA). The FMPA is the wholesale power provider to a consortium of 31 public power companies in Florida, including the **FPUA**.

Both the City and the **FPUA** have passed resolutions establishing the relocation as a top priority. The price tag to move the IWRF, estimated to be \$100 million, prevented serious consideration about relocation, however environmental concerns about the Indian River Lagoon have reached a fever pitch, making the relocation not only desirable, but imperative



and time-sensitive. The State of Florida has placed the IWRF on a list of top ten facilities that pose potential environmental threat. In addition, the property adjacent to the IWRF is ripe for future development, but cannot be developed to its fullest potential unless and until the IWRF is relocated.

St. Lucie County is the 5th fastest growing county in Florida. That growth is coming to Fort Pierce. The **FPUA** is poised to move the IWRF with a swift and thorough plan. For more information on **FPUA**, visit https://fpua.com/. **\$**

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

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Historic Approval to Relocate the FPUA Wastewater Plant

On May 16, the Fort Pierce City Commission approved plans by Fort Pierce Utilities Authority to move the wastewater treatment plant off of South Hutchinson Island. This approval came after the FPUA Board of Directors unanimously approved the plan on May 3.

The new wastewater plant will be located far away from residences. Its new address will be on Energy Lane, near the Treasure Coast Energy Center natural gas power plant. Its new neighbor, the power plant, will have the added benefit of utilizing reuse water from the wastewater plant for its cooling towers - an important conservation effort that will allow the power plant to reduce its draw from the natural aquifers beneath it.

The new plant will no longer sit on the Indian River Lagoon. This is an important priority not only locally but at the state level. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection recently listed the current wastewater plant as requiring expensive upgrades (upwards of \$16 million) under the Florida Clean



Waterways Act due to its location on the lagoon. With the recent approvals, these upgrades can be waived since we will be building a new plant. The new plant will be located far from the lagoon, with added safeguards and extra failsafe backups to protect our environment.

Construction is scheduled to begin January 2023, with early work packages (construction prep processes) starting as early as this Fall. The existing wastewater plant will continue to operate for a number of years after the new plant is constructed. This will allow the new wastewater system to become active in phases, with the two plants operating simultaneously as the conveyance system is switched from eastward to westward flows section-by-section.

FPUA and community leaders have been working toward this historic relocation for nearly 20 years. We recognize the weight of this important decision. We are grateful for the trust that you and our community leaders have put in us to make it happen. Our collective investment in this project will provide not only environmental benefits, but also equip our future generations with a state-of-the-art wastewater plant that will serve them for decades to come.

FPUA is proud to be your hometown utility provider. Our mission is to provide our customers with economical, reliable, and friendly service in a continuous effort to enhance the quality of life in our community. We will continue to communicate important progress updates, including grants and appropriations pursuits, as well as construction news, as the historic project proceeds. 🔹

Would you like to have a beautiful home landscape that attracts birds, butterflies, and other wildlife but requires little of your time and hard work? Then a Florida-friendly landscape may be just the landscape for you. Established in 1993, the Florida-Friendly Landscaping[™] Program is

centered around science based, environmentally friendly, and sustainable landscaping techniques that help to not only protect natural resources, but conserve water as well. The Florida-Friendly Landscaping[™] program is offered through a partnership between the University of Florida and Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

Anyone can participate! This program has served as a water conservation and nonpoint source pollution program with a wide range of participants. Homeowners, developers, and landscape professionals can all reap the environmental benefits

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

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of this unique program. With a little bit of work and planning up front, this amazing landscape technique requires little to no irrigation, fertilizers, or pesticides to thrive.

The University of Florida/Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences program acknowledges landscape areas based on nine environmentally friendly practices. These practices are: right plant right place, water efficiently, fertilize appropriately, mulch, attract wildlife, manage yard pests responsibly, recycle yard waste, reduce stormwater runoff, and protect the waterfront.

The Manatee Observation and Education Center has a beautiful butterfly garden on campus for visitors to enjoy. This garden, planted and maintained by volunteers, is a wonderful, peaceful place to visit right on the waterfront in downtown Fort Pierce. Home to one of Florida's more illusive butterflies, the Atala, the garden at the Manatee Observation and Education Center is truly a gem. Recently, this garden was officially named a Florida Friendly Landscape by the University of Florida IFAS office. This huge accomplishment would not be possible without the tireless efforts of some pretty amazing volunteers. So, if you would like to visit one of the prettiest places downtown, spot some rare butterflies, and maybe a manatee or two, stop by the Manatee Observation and Education Center and take a stroll through our garden. You won't be sorry that you did! 🚸



Seeing Is Believing: Announcing the Accepted Art & Artist Awards for the Annual Juried Exhibition *"Through The Eye Of The Camera"*

The A.E. Backus Museum and Gallery is pleased to again present the popular juried photography competition *Through* the Eye of the Camera. This year's exhibition features 87 of the year's best photographs drawn from professional and amateur photographers. Through the Eye of the Camera will be on view through June 24, 2022, at 500 North Indian River Drive in Historic Downtown Fort Pierce.

This year there were 61 artists who submitted 180 entries in one of four categories: (1) Animal subjects; (2) Flora & Landscape subjects; (3) People/Portrait subjects; or (4) Open, for subjects that are not included in the three major categories. The jury panel conferred 24 awards for the Best of Show, Best Black & White Photograph, Best Film / Traditional RAW Photograph, and 1st-2nd-3rd Places and Awards of Merit in the category awards.

The top eight award winners for 2022 are:

1. Best of Show - "A Shell Among the Mangroves" by Mark Stall (Port St. Lucie)

2. First Place, Animals - "Bathed in Light" by Joe Campanellie (Palm Coast)

3. First Place, Flora & Landscape - "Dead Leaf on Cardboard" by David Bence (Vero Beach)

4. First Place, People/Portrait - "Breaking Through" by Maureen Mackenzie (Port St. Lucie)

8. Director's Choice - "Foam-II" by Gregory McIntosh (Vero Beach) During the exhibition on view through June 24, visitors are invited to share their own vote for their favorite work on display. The results will be counted for the annual "People's Choice Award" given at the close of the exhibition.

"These annual juried shows are an important part of this creative community," says Museum executive director J. Marshall Adams. "The Backus Museum is well into our second decade of recognizing photographers as artists, and soon will be starting our fifth decade of recognizing fine artists in our fall juried show. Fostering artistic talent at all levels, in so many visual arts disciplines, has been one of the vital ways we extend the Backus legacy. And every year these exhibitions stop you in your tracks for their beauty, their quality, and their collective impact on viewers."

Urge Building of Bridge Now at Fort Pierce

Citizens Want Span to Lead To Ocean – Casino Already on the Beach – Cost of Project Estimated at Around \$150,000

Plans for the proposed Fort Pierce bridge and causeway will be completed within the next few days according to the committee promoting the project. For some time a group of citizens have been trying to get action in regard to a bridge across the St. Lucie river to the ocean, but until recently nothing has been done that would warrant any comment. However, with the decision that Fort Pierce must keep pace with the other cities of the East Coast, a definite policy was outline and work was begun on the plans.

The St. Lucie river is about two miles wide where the proposed bridge is to be built and it will take about eight months to complete at an estimated cost of \$150,000. The bridge will be built from the Fort Pierce side to a point about halfway across, where it will be met by a causeway constructed from the opposite side.

At present a ferry boat is the only way that the ocean can be reached. The beach is said to be one of the best on the Est Coast and there is a casino on the beach that was built about ten years ago, but which will provide inadequate once the bridge is completed. A new casino will probably follow the building of the bridge.

Fort Pierce it was pointed out, has been a little slow in building of a bridge in comparison with some of the smaller East Coast cities Vero, Quay, Melbourne, Cocoa, and Titusville, all have voted bonds for the purpose of building a bridge or the bridge is already in the process of construction.

Large Downtown **Complex Proposed for Fort Pierce**

City commissioners here listened attentively Thursday night as a Fort Lauderdale real estate executive presented a scheme to rebuild the entire downtown area.

John T. Williams, secretary-treasurer of the Broward County Title Co. said he envisions a multimillion-dollar complex of buildings which would eventually enclose the entire downtown area. The complex would bridge US 1 and Orange Avenue as well as the Florida East Coast Railroad tracks.

The initial face of the project, Williams said, would be a 106,000-square-foot area between Orange Avenue and Avenue A, and North US 1 and the FEC tracts.

Williams met with the City Commission in a special session to determine if the city is interested in selling old City Hall which comprises 35,000 square feet of the proposed development area.

Only Commissioner Charles Padrick indicated he is opposed to the plan, but the commission took no action.

"It is food for thought, but not anything we could do now or even in a year," Mayor Dennis Summerlin said of Williams' idea.

Summerlin did, however, agree to arrange a meeting with all property owners in the area as well as to forward Williams' plans to the Planning Board for its comment.

Williams, whose wife has owned part of the proposed initial development area for 30 years, said his plan is to get all the property owners to agree to place their property in escrow for a limited period of time and engage a large real estate agency to locate a suitable developer.

He said he envisions the area developing into a building complex rising 120 feet above the street with a park at the top and on both sides and vertical indoor parking facilities for at least 1.500 cars.

"I visualize a major office building in the area, a high-rise motel – maybe a theater – and high-rise apartments nearby. A development needs people." Williams said.

"A lot of people are worried about high-rises and too many people in this country. I don't think the country is getting crowded," he said.

He extolled developments in Fort Lauderdale and said Fort Pierce should be patterned after this.

This drew a reaction from Commissioner Jim Forbes.

"I don't want to be negative or anything, but we don't ever want to see Fort Pierce get like Fort Lauderdale," he said.

Fort Pierce City Marina Succeeding Officials say the occupancy rate is high and plans for

major improvements are on schedule The Fort Pierce City Marina is increasing its occupancy, and major improvements

should buoy a redeveloped downtown, city officials and business owners say. After a few years of troubled

waters, the marina at 1 Avenue A is on the road to recovery, said City Manager Dennis Beach.

"I'm not sure why some people refer to (the marina) as foundering. It's going quite well and seems to be providing the activity that it was originally intended to do as a waterfront redevelopment tool," Beach said.

Occupancy rates of boat slips at the marina have increased steadily since Dean Kubitschek was hired by the city to manage the facility in October. Transient boaters passing through for a day or two "have definitely increased," Kubitschek said.

"People know it's a city marina now and boaters are assured they'll get fair prices. We're not here to compete. We're just giving transient boaters another option," he said.

It's an option boaters are taking full advantage of. The occupancy rate of the 240 boat slips has often reached 100 percent. About 30 of the slips are usually available for visiting boaters, he said.

"The best advertising is word of mouth



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and the word's getting out this is a good place to stay," Kubitschek said. The marina is also scheduled for major improvements by the end of the year, which should make the situation even better, Beach said. He expects about \$1 million to be approved by city commissioners to provide a solid, reconstructed internal basin. Businesses in and around the marina

"Our goal is the same thing, to bring new people to the downtown area and the marina," said Bill Teitel, vice president of Creative Gaming Systems, the company that owns and operates the Midnight Gambler casino boat that docks at the Fort Pierce City Marina and opened for business about two months ago. Teitel said he's satisfied with the condition of the marina but is encouraged by the city's desire to improve. The marina "is paying for itself," Beach said, although a profit hasn't been reported yet. "To turn a profit would be ideal," but that's not why the city government took over the facility,

The marina should be considered a corridor to the downtown, Kubitschek said. "My advertising is focusing on the downtown area. I'm selling the facility but I'm also selling the downtown area,"

Work on the marina turnaround began in 1995. That's when the city reclaimed control of the marina after a five-year hiatus during which developer Audie Morris quit making lease payments,

Just last week, the city approve \$653,000 for repairs to the marina's floating docks, but mainly that was for standard repairs that come with any marina, Beach said. "They (floating docks) outlived their lives about seven years ago. Some of those docks have been there since the 1950s," he said.

Also, the fueling system will be moved from the floating docks to the internal fixed basin for safety concerns, Kubitschek said.

But the secret to keeping the marina running smoothly will be the permanent internal basin, Beach said. That's where restaurants such as the Tiki Lounge and Crazy Nick's restaurant, among others, can draw the crowds.

"It just creates a lot of activity. Our primary objective is to use (the marina) as a catalyst for downtown redevelopment," Beach said.

Allen Pellicere, manager of Crazy Nick's, said there's no doubt an improved marina with improve business. "I think it's going to draw attention to business.

"It's a good move. It'll change the image of Fort Pierce. You know, a lot of people have tis image of a redneck town. This will make it more upscale," Pellicere said.

Image is important, Kubitschek said. He said many of the boat slips in the internal basin will be reconfigured to handle small vessels and more large vessels.

"Some of these people (staying at the marina) are well-off and we may be able to get some of them interested in investing in downtown," he said.

Bids for the marina project should be approved in August or September and "it's highly likely" construction will be completed by the end of this year, Beach said.





Targeting snapper is a great idea as the mangroves, lanes, and muttons are easily found on the offshore reefs in about 50-100 feet as well as along the mangroves and cuts with good current. Live bait is best for snapper fishing but these aggressive feeders will hit frozen, too. I find it's ideal to throw a chum bag or at least some cut-up frozen bait and be sure your live bait is on the bottom with enough weight.

Trolling for mahi mahi, also known as dorado or the common dolphinfish, can be very successful this time of year. Look for weed lines and any floating debris then slow troll with fresh ballyhoo, either naked or skirted, for your best chance at hooking one of these acrobatic fish. Mahi are schooling fish so if you see one, watch for others and enjoy the fast-paced action. Targeting mahi is a win-win ... amazing fight and amazing dinner.

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Favorite Recipes from Main Street Board Members



The first day of summer is June 21st and the Fort Pierce temperatures will be rising. There is nothing more refreshing than a chilled watermelon during the heated months. Below is one of my favorite recipes using chilled watermelon.

Watermelon Salad with Mint

14 cups of cubed ripe seedless watermelon (one medium watermelon) 1/3 cup of lime juice

4 tablespoon chopped fresh mint

8 cups of fresh spinach

3 cups of sliced strawberries

No cook time: prep time 15 minutes: serves 8, dairy, vegan and gluten free.

Cube the watermelon and place it in a large bowl. Sprinkle with the lime juice then add chopped mint and strawberries and toss. It's that easy. Refrigerate and when ready to serve spoon over fresh spinach. You can add feta cheese to this recipe, if you like, but then it will no longer be a dairy free recipe. A poppy seed dressing goes well with this recipe. I like it without dressing.



















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
