



Participants get to choose the times and locations they wish to clean up in Fort Pierce and are encouraged to share their city pride by posting photos on social media.

Registered volunteers may be provided with litter collection supplies such as trash bags, gloves, pickers, and buckets while supplies last. These items can be picked up from the Public Works Compound located at 52 Savannah Road in Fort Pierce on Wednesday, May 31, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.; Friday, June 2, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.; or Saturday, June 3, from 8 a.m. to noon.



Mayor's Message Sunrise Theatre to Celebrate 100 Years

The Sunrise Theatre will celebrate its centennial on July 29 with a Speakeasy-themed event reminiscent of the Roaring Twenties. A hundred years ago, the Roaring Twenties was symbolic of a younger generation challenging the mores of the older generation. American soldiers and

sailors returning from World War I, and their families keeping the home fires burning, were disillusioned as well as eager for good times. New media, like commercial radio and moving pictures, brought to Americans the same music, the same news and the same ads for Wheaties and Coca-Cola.

In Fort Pierce, the first theatres appeared around 1906 when moving (but silent) pictures were shown at the Electric Theatre (upstairs above the Buckhorn Saloon, in the Carlton Building, now Rosslow's) and the Keystone, 111 N. Pine (2nd Street). In 1910, the Crystal Theatre opened, located at 109 South Pine (2nd Street), just south of where the Sunrise Black Box is today. Later, the Airdome Theatre, located at 126 North Pine Street (2nd Street), opened.


Construction of our iconic **Sunrise Theatre** began in September of 1922, promising 1,200 leather-upholstered chairs, a rest room for the ladies, and a smoking parlor for the men.

The theatre, built by R.N. Koblegard, Sr., whose real estate office was next door, was the finest on Florida's east coast, and the largest between Miami and Jacksonville. It opened on August 1, 1923. The first talkie to be shown at the **Sunrise** was *The Home Towners* in early December

The Whizateria, next to the **Sunrise**, offered soda fountain and eats to theatre-goers and in its first year of operation, offered curb service.

The *News Tribune* of April 24, 1928 announced that another theatre was to be erected, located where the Airdome had been on N. 2nd Street, and called the Ritz. It closed in 1955 and was demolished in 1965.

Other theatres in Fort Pierce were the Fort Pierce Drive-In,



After bringing entertainment to Fort Pierce for 50 years, the **Sunrise** closed its doors on September 8, 1983 and re-opened after restoration in 1997, having been acquired by the City of Fort Pierce.

Boat Tours Are Back at FAU Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute

The Indian River Lagoon is an incredible ecosystem, home to over 4,000 plant and animal species. It truly is a national treasure, and we are so lucky to have it right in our backyard. At FAU Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute, we've been studying the lagoon for over 50 years,

and are excited to invite you to come explore it with us! Our 36-passenger *Discovery* pontoon has been transformed into a floating laboratory equipped with binoculars and interactive digital screens- allowing guests of all ages to spend the day in the life of a scientist. Alongside an expert guide, you'll interpret real-time water quality data from the *Indian River Lagoon Observatory*

Network, survey a seagrass meadow with an underwater drone, and identify wildlife of all sizes, from microscopic plankton to sharks, rays, manatees, and dolphins. You'll also learn about fascinating research conducted by our faculty and students, as well as important restoration and conservation initiatives

underway. Public boat tours depart from our campus in Fort Pierce and are offered every Friday and Saturday. Private charters and field trip options are also available. 

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
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


Yes, Fort Pierce, There is a Fishing Club in Town

The Fort Pierce Sportfishing Club (FPSC) has been around for over 40 years. It was founded in 1980 by local fishing enthusiasts. The goals were to meet other fishing enthusiasts, share fishing stories, find crew members to share expenses, and to educate the membership on fishing techniques and locations, bait, equipment, boats and basically anything related to fishing. The membership meets on the third Wednesday of the month at the Fort Pierce Yacht Club clubhouse located at 200 Indian River Drive.

FPSC typically holds several events each year. I say typically because events were not held during the Covid years. The club is currently rebuilding the membership and working to restart some events. For example, we recently held our first post-Covid youth fishing event. This event was held in conjunction with the *Back the Blue 100th Anniversary* of the Ft. Pierce Police Department celebration. We provided the rods, reels, tackle and bait for each of the 40 youth that participated. They were taught how to cast the bait (without a hook) on shore before being taken to a pier where they were able to try their luck at






catching a fish. At the end of the event, the youth were given the rods, reels and a small tackle box to keep.

We have also restarted the annual fish fry at the August meetings and the annual Christmas party at the December meetings but there are still other events that need to be rekindled. Those include the Saturday and seasonal fishing tournaments, a poker run, and joint fishing trips with members of the **Fort Pierce Yacht Club**. To get these events going again we need more members to help organize and run them.

Just like Covid shut down the Club's events, it also decimated our membership. We're currently rebuilding and would enjoy having you and your family as new members. Membership is only \$60 a year for the entire family. Dignity Showers Offered at First United Methodist

Under the shade of the beautiful oak trees on the parking lot of **First Church**, a mobile shower unit is ready for the

local unhoused community every Saturday morning. Teams of church members, headed by Liz Tracy, set up shop from 9 a.m. to noon to offer a hot shower to the homeless in our Fort Pierce community.

Being a downtown church, Fort United Methodist witnesses the daily struggles of our

homeless population. Dignity Showers offers an opportunity for folks to feel cared for and seen. Everyone understands how the warmth of a hot shower can offer renewal for our physical body. On Saturday mornings **First Church** offers those living without physical housing a chance to feel comfort and care. While only a few months into this ministry, the team at First



understands that this work helps our community to address the value of offering dignity to those who struggle. The *Show*-

er Ministry is "hard work." It takes all hands. Early on Saturday, before showers begin and while the electricity and water source are being setup, the day begins with lots of other tasks. The **First Church** yoga group gathers to make sandwiches for those getting a shower. The church trailer is unloaded and

new underwear, socks and t-shirts are sorted into sizes. Hygiene items like toothpaste, bug spray and first aid supplies are set out. The clippers and scissors are readied for haircuts.

Sign in sheets and prayer request stations are set up. And before you know it, it is 9 a.m. and *Dignity Showers* are ready to offer a bit of respite and hope to our fellow man. This is a new opportunity for this historic church on the corner of the entry of our beautiful downtown. Being located at the corners of Orange Avenue, 7th Street and Avenue A. **First United Methodist** is a thriving and enthusiastic partner in the downtown community. **First Church** loves being a part of the fun stuff in downtown Fort Pierce like the Christmas Parade and the Ghost Walk. *Diginity Showers* offers another way to share in the life of our city and our community.

FPUA Earns the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for FY 2023

his marks the 28th consecutive fiscal year FPUA earned this coveted award for transparency.

The Government Finance Officers Association announced that

Fort Pierce Utilities Authority was awarded the GFOA's Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for Fiscal Year 2023.

The award represents a significant achievement by FPUA. It reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, FPUA had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines

are designed to assess how well an entity's budget serves as:

- a policy document
- a financial plan
- an operations guide
- a communications device

Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all four categories, and in the fourteen mandatory criteria within those categories, to receive the award.

There are over 1,700 participants in the Budget Awards Program. The most recent Budget Award recipients, along with

their corresponding budget documents, are posted quarterly on GFOA's website. Award recipients have pioneered efforts to improve the quality of budgeting and provide an excellent

> example for other governments throughout North America.

> "Each year we develop the Annual Budget document to be more meaningful than the last, providing clarity and communicating the direction of FPUA from both a financial and developmental position," said FPUA Director of Financial Administration Barbara Mika. "We are appreciative of this honor."

Michele Harris, FPUA's Finance Manager, added, "This award was

the result of collaboration and creativity enhancing the budget for transparency and planning."

The Department of Finance at Fort Pierce Utilities Authority provides comprehensive financial services for all departments of FPUA and is responsible for planning, organizing, and directing the financial, accounting, and rate matters. The GFOA has awarded FPUA with the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award each year since 1996.

The Eyes Have It: Announcing the Accepted Art & Artist Awards for the Annual Juried Exhibition "Through The Eye Of The Camera"

The A.E. Backus Museum and Gallery is pleased to again present the visually compelling juried photography competition *Through the Eye of the Camera*. This year's exhibition features 78 of the year's best photographs drawn from professional and amateur photographers. *Through the Eye of the Camera* will be on view through June 23, 2023 at 500 North Indian River Drive in Historic Downtown Fort Pierce.

This year there were 76 artists who submitted 219 entries in one of four categories: (1) Animal subjects; (2) Flora & Landscape subjects; (3) People/Portrait subjects; or (4) Open, for subjects that are not included in the three major categories. The jury panel carefully accepted 35% of these entries for display, with a total of 24 awards for the Best of Show, Best Black & White Photograph, Best Film / Traditional RAW Photograph, and 1st-2nd-3rd Places and Awards of Merit in the category awards.

The top eight award winners for 2023 are:

Best of Show – Lovers' Quarrel by Joe Campanellie (Palm Coast);

First Place, Animals – *Clowns at Home* by Mike Ricciardi (Vero Beach); [See Front Cover]

First Place, Flora & Landscape – Elements by Hilda Champion (Naples);

The project not only includes the construction of a causeway and bridge across Indian River, but of a turning basin and deep-water channel across the river as well.

The Pioneer drug store and the vacant lot between.

get Electrical Service Shortly

That the people of White City, a prosperous little community several miles south of Fort Pierce, will soon have the benefit of electric service from the local municipal plant is considered almost certain.

At a recent meeting of the residents of that community confidence was expressed that a sufficient number of subscribers would be found to justify extension of the lines to that place. A committee was appointed to canvass the neighborhood with that object in view.

The committee is composed of E.F. Ulrich as chairman. Charles Bemenderfer and G. Ringdahl. It is believed that some twenty-five or thirty subscribers can be obtained.

50 years ago this month as reported in the Tuesday, June 5, 1973 edition of the Palm Beach Post

Reporter, John Bartlett, wrote about the Royal Palm Ice Company which was once located beside the railroad tracks in downtown Fort Pierce. In 1973, the ice company was still providing ice for commercial fishermen, local grocers and picknickers. In its heyday it provided ice for the trains that rumbled beside it with ice before refrigerated cars came along.

The original ice plant burned down in 1913. That plants had supplied the fisherman and farmers with ice in the early days of the city's history.

Library construction begins today

Reporter, Tyler Treadway, wrote about the groundbreaking ceremony for the downtown branch of the St. Lucie County Library. Susan Kilmer (St. Lucie County Library Director from 1988 - 2010, and for whom the downtown branch is now named after), was quoted as saying "We're been talking about building a new library since 1985," Kilmer said, "And in 1995 when I saw the city's plans for downtown redevelopment, I thought that this would be our time – our time to make a push. It's great to be a part of the growth that's happening down here. We've been a steady part of downtown since 1954. Businesses have come and gone but the library has remained."

Treadway also wrote about the group that originally started the library in 1905. It was the Fort Pierce Improvement Club which became the Fort Pierce Women's Club, which is still in existence today. The county library began as a reading room in the Fort Pierce Community Building, which was located where the King's Landing development site is today. After that building was destroyed by a hurricane in 1928, it was moved to the P.P. Cobb Building and then to the new Women's Club building on North 2nd Street in 1931. It was again moved in 1950 to a city owned house at Seventh Street Park. The 1st official library building broke ground in 1952 and was located where the vacant lot just north of the current library is today.



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Summer Fishing Fun



Cummer is o-fish-ally here and as our days get hotter the once you find one, a school should be close by. It's best to

• fishing gets hotter, especially for snapper and mahi-mahi. Mangroves, lanes, and big muttons can be targeted on the offshore reefs in 50-100 feet. Whether using live bait or some cut-up frozen bait, it's important to keep your bait on the bottom with enough weight to hold. Bottom fishing for snapper also provides a great chance to hook up on some significant grouper. The sharks have been sneaky trying to steal our fish lately so reeling quickly is the key!

June is a stellar time to focus on trolling for mahi, also known as

dolphinfish or dorado. There is no closed season for mahi but the best time to catch them is in the summer months when the water has warmed up. Mahi are one of the fastest growing of all fish and can swim up to 50 knots. Weed lines and floating debris are great places to find mahi hiding out and





do a slow troll with fresh ballyhoo, naked or skirted, at about 80 feet or more. Mahi is one of the most sought after pelagic fish in the sea because of their beautiful color patterns, amazing aerial acrobatics when hooked, and hands-down delicious taste.




Treasure Coast Youth Sailing Foundation Summer Classes




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
