



Mayor's Message Celebrate Local Voices Making Local Choices, October 18-24


Tlorida's **F**_{plus} towns and villages are as diverse in geography, population and culture as the residents who call them home.

More than 50 years ago, Floridians voted

to include municipal Home Rule powers in the Constitution. Home Rule gives each city the flexibility to craft its laws specifically to its own unique needs. This is the embodiment of Local Voices Making Local Choices.

In recent years, the state legislature has encroached on the ability of cities to craft their own unique ordinances, in response to what their residents want. The Florida League of Cities (FLC) each year creates policy positions that guide the work of cities seeking protection from state legislative overreach.

In Fort Pierce and many Florida cities, we love our trees. But, in 2019, state legislators passed a law that local government may not prevent tree removal if the owner obtains documentation that the tree presents a "danger." Vague language in this law has created conflict and litigation. Local governments are powerless to police bad actors and trees are disappearing at the whim of property owners. The League says the language needs to have stronger standards, and require more stringent documentation for assessing tree risk before a tree is removed.



Another issue facing Florida cities, especially coastal ones like Fort Pierce, is the legislature's preemption of local government's ability to regulate short term rentals. Commercial activity in neighborhoods has been regulated for a good reason: to protect residents and their neighborhoods. The League's position is that short term rentals should be a local zoning issue. Under cur-

rent law, there are little available solutions for cities to solve the problems that communities are facing. Compounding this preemption was a 2020 law that requires local governments to allow home-based businesses in residential neighborhoods.

I am a member of the Treasure Coast Regional League of Cities Advocacy Team, and will be working with our legislators to help them understand the consequences of certain legislative proposals on local governments. It's our goal to build a better understanding between local government and the state legislature.

If you wish to help us advocate for local voices making local choices, you can find tools and ways to help at the FLC website https://www.floridaleagueofcities.com/, The legislature convenes soon for committee work and in January for regular session.

If you want to protect our trees and preserve our residential neighborhoods, contact me for ways to help us preserve our community's unique character. Celebrate Fort Pierce and Florida's 400 plus municipalities, October 18–24.

City of Fort Pierce Opens Free Beach Public Parking Lot

The City of Fort Pierce opened a 165-space free public **I** parking lot on the beach to provide additional parking for access to their beautiful beaches and other waterfront amenities. The parking lot is located on seven vacant parcels on the north side of Seaway Drive (1710, 1720, 1730, 1750, 1770, 1802, and 1820 Seaway Drive). The parking lot, which

includes seven handicapped parking spaces, is unpaved with drive aisles created from coquina rock.

The lot will be opened at a minimum of a year. The lease agreement was approved on July 6, 2021. It has an option to extend the lease on a month-to-month basis after the 12 months is up. 🔹

Firefighter Challenge World Championship, November 2 to 6

Willie Daniels Leaves a Lasting Legacy Through His Landscape Paintings

Tighwaymen Artist Willie L Daniels has certainly left a lasting legacy in the art world and beyond with his colorful Florida landscape paintings. His passing on September 19th has left all of us feeling the loss of his undeniable talent. As one of the original twenty-six Highwaymen artists,

Willie's impressionistic style with vivid colors captured the hearts of many admirers, collectors, galleries and museums. The Highwaymen Artists, mostly from Fort Pierce, are a group of self-mentored African American artists from the 1950s that sold their paintings from their cars along Florida highways since art galleries at the time did not welcome their work. They are a treasured part of our local history!

Willie Daniels was born in Georgia and moved to Fort Pierce with his parents when he was nine years old. He remembered being impressed with some artists who lived near him and painted outside in the mornings, especially Mary Ann Carroll, Al


Black, Roy McLendon, Harold Newton, and Livingston Roberts. He told me that his very first painting, while in elementary school, was of pine trees on the top of a "Have-a-Tampa" cigar box. He was also greatly influenced by the encouragement of

his home room teacher, Mrs. Zanobia Jefferson, and the highly admired, A.E. "Bean" Backus, who gave Willie some paint and boards when he had none of his own. These true kindnesses were never forgotten.

Although for quite a few years, Willie only painted for supplemental income, he eventually became more serious about his art. As the Highwaymen became recognized, his landscapes brought more interested buyers and better prices and he was able to devote all his time to painting. His younger brother,





Highwaymen Artist Johnny "Hook" Daniels (1954-2009), learned by watching Willie and for a short time they shared a studio. In 2004 the Florida Highwaymen artists were inducted into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. In 2016, Willie was inducted into the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC.


Willie's art has been described in many ways, but the most common comment is that he truly captured the beauty and

charm of old Florida. He was intuitive about mixing colors and creating a mood which made his landscapes come alive. His paintings with reflections in the water are among the most beautiful. His renowned scenes include the ocean, backcountry, royal poinciana, the St. Lucie River, and his very distinctive and very popular fire sky.

Willie Daniels will certainly be remembered for his great art but to those who knew him well, he left a personal legacy just as strong. He was a man who felt his art was a gift and truly enjoyed painting. He was content with the simple things in life, never complaining about things he didn't have but always grateful for what he did have. He shared his knowledge with those who asked. He listened more than he spoke. He was generous to family and friends. He was humble when praised. He will be missed. 🚸

Ciderworks for Manatees! Coming to Downtown Fort Pierce

To kick off *Manatee Aware***ness Month**, the Treasure Coast Manatee Foundation. Pierced Ciderworks, and Manatee Observation & Education Center are joining forces with a new and exciting event in Downtown Fort Pierce on Saturday, November 6th. Best of all, 100% of the fundraising proceeds will be directed at restoring seagrass in the Indian River Lagoon.

This seagrass restoration project comes at a year when manatees have experienced one of the most devastating mortality rates in history. 942 manatees died in Florida between January 1 and September 10 of this year, surpassing the previous highest annual statewide number of 830 manatee mortalities in all of 2013. With an estimated population of only 6,800, a loss of 942 manatees represents 14% of the entire population.

Florida's Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission recognized that this year's manatee "Unusual Mortality Event" was highest during the early part of the year, when migrating manatees were in the Indian River Lagoon without enough food to eat: "As temperatures warmed up and manatees on the Atlantic Coast dispersed to other habitat for foraging, the numbers of malnourished carcasses and manatees in need of rescue decreased."

The Southern Indian River Lagoon lost 2,688 acres (26%) of seagrass coverage between the years of 2015 and 2017, and the decline continues. Researchers suspect that the 2011 algae super bloom was the tipping point of seagrass die-off in the Indian River Lagoon. Algae blooms block sunlight from getting through to seagrasses beneath the water's surface, which prevents the seagrasses from photosynthesizing and surviving. The ongoing seagrass decline is especially concerning because seagrasses are important not only as a food source for manatees, but also as a food source, habitat and nursery for many critical species in the Indian River Lagoon, including turtles, seahorses, crabs, birds and more.

The Indian River Lagoon is home to nearly one-third of America's manatees. It is also one of the most biodiverse estuaries in the Northern Hemisphere, home to 35 species that are endangered or threatened.

In response to the alarming decline in seagrass populations, and the manatees' Unusual Mortality Event this year, the Treasure Coast Manatee Foundation and

Manatee Center are partnering to bring seagrass restoration to Moore's Creek in Spring of 2022. As many as 400 manatees are counted visiting Moore's Creek at the Manatee Center every year, in part due to warmer temperatures in the shallow creek, as well as being a freshwater source for manatees to drink.

The seagrass restoration will be led by experts at Sea & Shoreline and will be situated not only as a restoration project, but also an educational exhibit where visitors can learn about the method and value of seagrass restoration in the Indian River Lagoon. The project will span from an existing restoration project at 7th Street in Moore's Creek, led by FWC, St. Lucie County, and Sea & Shoreline, for a half-mile east to the Manatee Center, bringing just under one acre of submerged aquatic vegetation to the Indian River Lagoon. The selected seagrasses will be tolerant to varying salinities, and the connectivity of the project will strengthen the likelihood of the project's successful restoration.



Historic Cannon Restored After 300 Years Beneath the Sea

The three-year reverse electrolysis and preservation pro-L cess of the 1715 cannon is nearing completion! Recovered from the site known as the Sandy Point Wreck in August of 2018, the cannon is planned to be a major historical addition to downtown Fort Pierce near the Melody Lane Pier. The removal of encrustations and the reverse osmosis bath have prevented further corrosion of this special artifact with the goal of it being a stable, long-term monument. Members of the Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful Advisory Board, Mayor Hudson and the City of Fort Pierce, Fort Pierce Lions Club, Captain John Brandon, Captain Dan Porter, and 1715 Fleet-Queens Jewels, LLC, are excited to see their collaborative efforts come together as the cannon was removed from its electrolysis bath tank for the last time on September 15th.

Final preparations include fine sandblasting to remove any rust. After that, a rust inhibiting sealer called Ospho will be applied and then a coat of a rust inhibiting flat black paint will



be added. The building of a custom-made cannon carriage is also underway as the project moves closer towards permanent public display.

The 300-plus-year-old cannon donated by Captain John Brandon, treasure diver and leader of the salvage operation, and the 1715 Fleet-Queens Jewels, LLC underwent the lengthy reverse electrolysis process, one year for every hundred years submerged in the ocean, at the City of Fort Pierce Public Works Department. It is thought to be one of forty cannons on the tentatively identified Nuestra Senora del Rosario, part of the Spanish Plate Fleet which sank off the coast of Florida in 1715 during a terrible hurricane. The loss of this 1715 fleet with significant cargo of gold, silver, and jewels off the eastern coast of Florida is the reason we are called the Treasure Coast.

"This significant artifact and its long-term public display will be an enduring reminder of the unique history of our coast," said Captain John Brandon. 🚸



She was practicing the stunt under the direction of Ruth Law, well known aviatrix, when the accident occurred. She had appeared at fairs in the west in a parachute drop, her companions said.

Drive Set for Library

Plans for the inauguration of a drive to raise by public subscription the sum of \$50,000 to construct and equip a public library for Fort Pierce were announced Friday by the library advisory committee.

The building would be constructed on property already given by the city for that purpose, located at Indian River Drive and Atlantic Ave.

Dan McCarty was designated to head up the money-raising campaign, which is to open Nov. 25 and run to Dec. 10. He was authorized to designate his assistants.

Organization details for the incorporation of a non-profit organization are to be handled by Attorney Dewey Crawford. It is proposed to expend \$35,000 on the construction of a building and utilize another \$15,000 for equipment and books.

Naval War Hero Gets Medals – 26 **Years Later**

It took only a matter of minutes on March 6, 1945, when a young Navy pilot landed his sea plane in Japanese held Davao Harbor in the Philippines to rescue a downed airman from certain capture.

But it took 26 years for the Navy pilot – now attorney Charles Becht of Fort Pierce - to receive the distinguished flying cross for the rescue.

Tuesday evening, at ceremonies in the Naval Reserve Center in West Palm Beach. Becht was awarded the decoration, along with the air medal and two gold stars in lieu of two additional air medals.

The latter decorations were for participation in the rescue of 17 wounded men, Americans and Philippine guerrillas from Porto Princesca in the middle of a heavy engagement, for the rescue of a pilot adrift in the ocean for three days, and for sinking 212 tons of Japanese shipping.

With the awards came citations commending the officer for his heroism under fire and for superior airmanship.

The awards were more than a quarter of a century late because a squadron plane, carrying the recommendations for the medals, was lost.




And Becht, busy with completing college, studying for his law degree, and then starting his practice in Fort Pierce, forgot about the awards, although he knew they had been recommended.

Congressman Paul Rogers was contacted, the records were checked, and Tuesday night the long delayed medals were awarded.

With Becht were his wife, his sons, Charles Jr., 17 and Eddie, 12, and daughter Carol, 12.

Twenty-one-year-old Barbara Becht is away at school and could not attend.





... Of Becht's original squadron of 90 officers and enlisted men, not one was wounded or killed, although the squadron was in the thick of heavy fighting. "...Living with danger was a way of life," Becht said.


"We were all young people and I suppose we were laying our lives on the line. You were caught up in what had to be done." "You know the old saw about doing it for mother, God and country - well that was exactly the way I felt."

Twenty-six years later his country gave its official honors and thanks to former Lt. Becht for what he had felt, thought and done.

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still that morning in mom's home, the home she had lived in for many, many years. As is often the case during such a time, there were light moments and dark moments. The dark moments were buffered by love. Needs changed and a trip to Hospice, thankfully just down the road, became the best choice. Never have I seen grown men so quietly and gently enter a sacred arena as we were now in, and with the grace of a finetuned, well-orchestrated precision team, respectfully transport a tiny, frail body, tenaciously holding on "just to make sure all was done and everyone was okay;" the everyone being my three siblings and myself. We rode together, hands clutched and eyes locked in a gaze of safety and assurance.

The room was beautiful, with loving attention to detail immaculate, simple and a place where someone could feel that all was in order. There was nothing left undone. The curtains were parted just enough to let the rays of God filter in from the now rising moon. Yes, I am choosing to share the beauty of the room, not the purpose of the space because this is how mom taught me to view the world, to see the beauty. It's good to remember who helped us find our spark.

When asked if there was anything that I wanted, "I want to get in bed with mom," were the words that came out. I crawled in, the rail was re-raised and mom and I floated in a space that



cannot be described. It is somewhere between the deepest pain that can be imagined and the sheerest joy, as mom begins to be released from a body no longer able to carry her soul and her soul in turn accepts a new life without her body, perhaps like a butterfly emerging from a cocoon, untethered and soaring above it all.

The person helping — and "person" does not aptly describe this professional that discretely came into our space at just the right times to help navigate the course — proved to be a source of solace and direction. This visit in the room, she let me know it was now my job to bid mom farewell and assure her it was okay to leave us. This I did in earnest. Then a thought came to mind. I got out of bed, pulled up a chair, and played mom's favorite song on my phone. Mom's spirit took to the dance floor during the first chorus. She left her body and me behind. I rejoiced at her new freedom and mourned my loss. Hours later, as I sat on the curb waiting for Uber to bring me back to

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mom's home, I felt more alone than ever before. Home took on a whole new meaning as I hungered to be back in loving arms, surrounded by the familiar.

These are the experiences of those around us in our little town. As we go about our days, visiting our downtown friends, shopping for handmade candles at Notions and Potions or getting all dressed up spiffy by the gals at Rosslow's, these are the moments we share and these are the events that fill us with awe and sometimes leave us a bit raw around the edges. As our daily paths intersect and merge for the moment, we are in the presence of others' joys, tragedies, strengths, weaknesses and uncertainties. What an honor to mingle in this way. Let's never forget the intimacy and support we provide each other. We are a unique gem that has stood the test of pressure and time, still remaining in a very special place in which to have the adventure we call life. Mullet Magic

Tow what all the excitement is about? The long-awaited I Smullet run is on! This time of year, schools of mullet migrate south along the coast and are easy to find on the beach, moving through the inlet, and over the grass flats. Mullet are terrific bait to use for some of our area's most popular fish: snook, tarpon, redfish, and kingfish. Snook season opened in September and using finger mullet as your bait of choice will provide a great chance at hooking a prized linesider.

Use a spinning reel combo with 40-pound leader and a size three hook for best results. Keep your drag tight and be prepared for some great action. Hooking a snook never disappoints but they are smart enough to run and try to break the line on nearby structures.

Regulation slot size for keeping snook is 28 inches to 32 inches. Those outside the slot should be released quickly to minimize trauma. The photo shows lady angler, Mary Kniffen, with a very nice snook!

Offshore the kingfish bite is still good with action at about 80 to 100 feet. Mullet, threadfins, and blue runners on a slow troll are best bait choices for putting kings on the deck. Anglers are allowed to keep two kingfish per day. It's also a good time to look for mahi as the water temperature starts to cool.





Tear bread into small pieces, and place in a small shallow wl. Add water to cover, and let soak about 5 minutes. ueeze water from bread; discard water. Set bread aside.

Sauté onion in butter until tender. Combine sautéed ion, bread, meat, eggs, salt, nutmeg, parsley, lemon rind, non juice, and Worcestershire sauce in a large bowl. Mix ll; shape into 2-inch meatballs.

Bring beef broth to a boil in a large Dutch over; add eatballs. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 15 minutes. move meatballs; set aside. Reserve pan liquid.

Combine flour and water, mixing well. Stir flour mixture o reserved pan liquid. Cook over medium-high heat, rring constantly, until thickened and bubbly.

Return meatballs to Dutch oven; cook over low heat until eatballs are thoroughly heated. Serve meatballs and gravy er hot cooked noodles. 🔹







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
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
