
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#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

# Happy Fall!

The cooler days are just ahead and just in time for *Main Street's* Fall festivities beginning with the *Ghost Walk* on October 26th and 27th. This event often sells out so hopefully you already have your tickets! If not, you can keep abreast of all the activities in Downtown Fort Pierce by visiting www.Mainstreetfortpierce.org.

As I mentioned in September's issue of the *Focus*, *Main Street's* events are wonderful, however, they are a very small portion of what *Main Street* 

is all about. The *Main Street* program was originally created by the *National Trust for Historic Preservation* and each of the nationwide affiliates strategize their community's revitalization using the four points of *The Main Street Approach* ™: Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion, and Organization. Economic Vitality (development/restructuring) involves analyzing market forces to develop long-term solutions to revitalization. New businesses, creative use of space, and sharpened competitiveness are outcomes of a more vital business district. This is all part of a national movement.

Let's look at some examples of the impact that *Main Streets* have had on Economic Development, nationally, since 1980. According to research, \$95.33 billion has been reinvested; 314,421 in buildings rehabilitated; 717,723 jobs created, and 161,036 businesses started. (From Mainstreet.org) Very impressive numbers!

Some notable and larger examples of the impact *Main Street Fort Pierce* has made at a local level are listed below:


Purchased the historical *A.E. Backus* home in 2005 and completed restoration in 2007 with grant funds.

Purchased the **Sunrise Theatre** building and began renovations in 1999. The theatre reopened in 2006. *Main Street Fort Pierce* donated the Theatre to the City who now handles the daily operations. The project received over \$2.7 million in state grants, \$8 million in government funds, and over \$2 million in private donations.

Managed the *Florida Inland Navigation District* grant for the City of Fort Pierce and raised \$150,000 in private donations to build the **Manatee Observation and Education Center** (MOEC). MOEC is operated by **Fort Pierce Utilities Authority** and sees over 75,0000 visitors per year. The value of this project was over \$350,000.

Collaborated with St. Lucie County to achieve a library grant for the construction of a \$2,500,000 library in downtown Fort Pierce. The library reopened in July 1999.

All of this can't be accomplished without community and organization which we will talk about next month. ## Plein Aire Painters of the Treasure Coast Art Show & Sale

Plein aire painters of the Treasure Coast is a group of artists that meet once a week at a park, preserve or recreational area around Fort Pierce.

While there, they spend a minimum of three hours painting scenes that appeal to them. They frequent these locations every season yet find a new piece of beauty to capture.

As part of the plein aire discipline, a painting should be near completion after one sitting. The exercise produces an explosion of spontaneity, expressed in form, color and light depicting the feel and depth of the landscape.

In this show, these paintings were done at fifteen different locations around Fort Pierce. From ocean to river to lake, from savanna to pine barren to wetland, and from populated to remote. Maybe, you've seen them painting at your favorite place.

The two Plein aire artists featured at the November 10th Platts/Backus House art show and sale will be Diane Mesagno and Lori McNamara.

*Diane Mesagno*. Diane Mesagno was born and raised in New York and graduated from the New York Institute of Technology with a degree in Architecture. Before starting her career in architecture, she studied sculpture in Austria.

Since moving to Florida, she devotes her time and energy to the disciples of Fine Art; oil an acrylic painting,

sculpture and murals.

and seascapes painted
plein aire.

Lori McNamara. Lori McNamara was born in Fort Pierce and still lives in her old home on Indian River Drive. She loves to paint the natural beauty of Florida and going to all the wonderful parks and beaches of Fort Pierce.

# Mayor's Message Meet Fort Pierce Pioneers at Ghost Walks

host walks offered by *Main*Street Fort Pierce, are a popular annual event in our city. On Wednesday, October 26 and Thursday October 27, you can meet some of our most interesting Fort Pierce pioneers.


Edwin Binney came for the winter in Fort Pierce, built a home and in-

vested in land. He was the creator, along with his cousin, Harold Smith, of the **Crayola**, used by millions of children over the century. You can meet his ghost on the South Second Street

Tour, along with A.E. Beanie Backus, our native landscape artist. You'll visit the 100-year-old **Sunrise Theatre** and meet Charles Miley, long time newspaper editor and columnist.

Sheriff Dan Carlton is memorialized with a plaque on Second Street, where he was shot and killed by Marshall D. J. Disney. Meet him on the North Second Street

was resentful about a land deal.



Ghosts on the *Waterfront Tour* include Second Seminole War Lt. Col. Benjamin K. Pierce, who built the military Fort

Pierce. Peter P. Cobb, came to Fort Pierce in 1883, worked for the canning company, then he worked for, and later bought, the general store from Benjamin and Annie Hogg. Today the original building is known as the **Peter P. Cobb Building**. South Bridge is also named for Cobb. The original name of Fort Pierce was *Cantown*.

On Thursday, meet early physician, Dr. Clyde Platts and his wife, Clara Kingsley Platts and Alfred and Lucinda Lagow, the pioneer couple who submitted the plat for Edgartown in the late 1880s. Zora Neale Hurston, the Harlem Renaissance anthropologist and author comes alive, as well as Alfred Hair,

the talented founding artist and entrepreneur of the *Florida Highwaymen*. Scottish born Annie Hogg and husband Benjamin Hogg, were early settlers who established a trading post and store. Harry Hill, photographer for Flagler's railroad and a beekeeper is also on this tour.

On the *Peacock*Arts District Tour

meet former Florida Supreme Court

Judge Alto Adams, and former Governor, Fort Pierce native Dan McCarty, who was elected in 1952, but died early in his first term on September 28, 1953.

Tours are \$12 and advance registration is required. Tours last about one hour and featured stops may change. For more information, visit https://mainstreetfortpierce.org/or call 772-466-3880. ❖






### Frank-n-Steins in the Fort — October 13th

# Tickets for 18th Annual Historic Ghost Walk — October 26th & 27th

ort Pierce is one of the oldest communities in south Florida. It has weathered many storms both literally

and economically throughout the years. In 1988, concerned citizens, city officials, business owners, private investors and other stakeholders applied to have Fort Pierce added as a designated *Main* Street community. One of Main Street Fort Pierce's (MSFP) first goals was to develop events that drew people back to downtown. Another goal was to preserve the historic stories and structures within downtown. The Annual Historic Ghost Walk was created to meet both of these goals.

Even though the word "ghost"

is in the name of this event, it is not based on paranormal events. There is a reason for this — the true stories of downtown Fort Pierce and the people who used to walk its streets are far more fascinating than the made-up ghost stories you may have heard about.

There are so many stories to be told that Main Street Fort Pierce has added an additional tour to this year's event. If you are new to the area or a lifelong local, this is a great opportunity to learn or relearn some the history of the community you live, work, and vacation in.

The development of south Florida paralleled the development of the western states in the late 1800s. This area was hard to reach prior to the railroad arriving in 1894. Many of the early American families that settled in the area came to start

new businesses, for their health or to escape their past and start anew. The lush wilderness and proximity to the ocean

> provided both rich bounties and harsh realities to the Victorian age pioneers that relocated here prior to air conditioning and mosquito control.

The Annual Historic Ghost Walk would not be possible without the help of over 100 volunteers. Each walking tour includes a volunteer guide and has eight stops where volunteer "ghosts" play the role of a figure from the past to tell their story. Tours last approximately one hour, and comfortable footwear is recommended as they take place on sometimes uneven terrain.





tradition, and is today a classy return to a fun Halloweenthemed party at the Museum for grown-ups.



Ewalk or speedily cycle. I zip around my neighborhood on the road that runs its perimeter, like a gerbil on a giant wheel. It's fun and motivating to see the same folks doing their rounds each morning as well. We have the runners, joggers, walkers, walkers

with a walker, babies in strollers and me. We also have a delightful array of city wildlife in the form of armadillos, raccoons, a plethora of birds including sandhill cranes, as well as a scurry squirrels and a clowder of outdoor cats.

Their life is not easy or pampered and yet there they are, as if the world is their oyster, mellow, relaxed and somewhat oblivious.

This is what happens as I approach a squirrel. Whether I am walking or biking, their reaction is the same. When I am just a spot on the horizon, heading in their general direction, they begin their frantic dance. A high alert has been sounded and the back-and-forth zig-zagging across the road begins. Indecisive, overly-reactive and traumatized are the terms that come to mind. It's a tricky situation for me as well when biking, as I maneuver back and forth endeavoring to give them as wide a birth as possible, to ensure no calamity befalls any of us. We

finally make it past each other, the squirrel left panting and exhausted. If I were to look over my shoulder, I would see the squirrel going through the same tumultuous encounter with the next passer-by.

What exactly have I learned from cat vs. squirrel? I see my-self in both and seek balance. Sure, laying in the middle of the road, oblivious to all that is going on around one might seem like fun and a great way to conserve energy. Yet, this does place a certain burden on those in your path to maneuver around you and it does also turn a blind eye to the fact that some may not feel inclined to or be able to maneuver around you. Perhaps, scootching to the edge of the road, in a calm and cool cat-like way might be the best route.

I realize my thoughts, actions and behaviors affect all the "walkers and cyclists" I encounter in my day-to-day life. We cross paths routinely and we all have our agendas. Life may be a bit scrappy and rough around the edges as it is for the cat colony, yet, this is no cause for disregard for others. On the other spectrum, like with the squirrel, life may feel too fast; like there is too much on the horizon that is headed directly at us. Yet, this is no cause for frantic actions.

Somewhere in the middle, conscious of others and of life's twists and turns, but not overtaken by what comes our way might be best for us as individuals and best for our "neighborhood" of fellow humans. The most valuable of lessons may well be learned as the sun hugs the horizon hello, in a simple little neighborhood in a great small town.

# Love, JAZZ Community: Farewell, Scatman Jack

ne of the most wonderful things about music is that it has the magical ability to help create friendships and memories that carry us through all the times of our lives. We hear a snippet of a melody and are instantly transported to another time and place, sometimes a moment in our lives we'd long forgotten until the music jogged our memory. One of the perks of being a musician



— or even just a music lover, comes from the memories forged when we rehearse, jam, or perform together. There may not be words to help us communicate, but the nuances of every note or even breath become syllables in a language that only other musicians understand. And one of the hardest songs to play — as well as one of the hardest words to say — is farewell.

Recently, the community lost one of its most prolific voices — one that spoke to us through the language of scat — a type of vocal improvisation using nonsense syllables and making the voice act as the instrument rather than a speaking medium. Jack Silverman, Scatman Jack, as he was known to the entire Treasure Coast and throughout the Big Apple, was a kind soul who chose to use his gifts to help others. For almost as many years at *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* has existed, Scatman Jack was a part of our history, usually lending his voice and talent to 'front' the weekly *Jazz Jams* at the **Sunrise Black Box Theatre**. His upbeat personality and ability to work the room from the microphone was legendary, and we will miss the nonagenarian terribly.

Scatman Jack played saxophone, sang, and scatted for many years. A long-time active member of Alcoholics Anonymous, Scatman Jack would visit hospitals in his hometown of New York City and perform, often incorporating into his scats the names of patients who were also suffering from the effects of alcohol or drugs to help offer hope and healing. You might

say that his form of scatting was a precursor to the hip-hope with a message so many enjoy today. His popularity in New York City hospitals grew, as did his legacy among recovering alcohol and substance abuse users because his scatting and advice were both pragmatic and issued with a great sense of humor and unconditional love.


When he wasn't helping us out with his scat talents, he

played a great game of tennis. In fact, he played tennis until he reached 90. And while he didn't make a living as a musician, Scatman Jack utilized his many talents to record two albums right here in his long-time home of Port St. Lucie, and I was fortunate to be the recording engineer for both of them. When I asked him to front the Jazz Society's weekly Tuesday evening Jazz Jam, he was really excited for the opportunity to connect with so many wonderful people in the community. To say the feeling was mutual would be a real understatement, as Scatman Jack was much-beloved by all. He was a tender and sensitive soul who had the profound ability to touch everyone he met, and his absence is already being felt here on the Treasure Coast by all of us and especially by his loving wife, Pat. We hosted a memorial for our beloved Scatman Jack in September at one of our Wednesday shows at the Port St. Lucie Botanical Gardens, and it was an evening filled with music and love — just like Scatman Jack. His memory is definitely a blessing and his contributions to our community and Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society will continue to warm our hearts for decades to come.

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



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


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# 121 Tapas on the Water — Food, Wine, Art

nating and enhancing tones and providing a more rich resulting sound. The acoustic guitar player featured has been Karalyn Woulas, among others.


Baby Grand Piano, with classical music played by the talented Uriel Natero, originally hailing from Argentina and whose experience includes performer, composer and director.

# Run of the Mullet

Around this time of the year, local captains and dedicated anglers are looking forward to the mullet run. Schools of mullet are migrating south along the coast and this means great bait to target some highly prized trophy fish like tarpon, snook, redfish, and kingfish.

Finger mullet will definitely give you a great chance at a snook. These elusive predators give a great fight and are on most angler's bucket list. They are instantly recognizable by the black lateral line that extends on to the tail. My advice is to use a 40-pound leader with a size three hook for best results. Snook season opened in September and runs through December 14th so now is an excellent time to target this mild sweet-flavored fish. If you are fortunate enough to get one in the slot, between 28 inches and 32 inches, you will be eating like a king!.

If you're looking for tarpon, using mullet is a top choice. Tarpon are powerful and acrobatic fighters so be prepared for the challenge. They are also catch-and-release only.

Offshore, we are still seeing significant kingfish action. Use mullet, threadfins, or blue runners on a slow troll and get ready for some fun. Kingfish can very quickly pull 100 or so feet of drag but that's part of the excitement. The recreational limit is two per angler per day in Atlantic waters.

Kingfish and mullet are both favored for smoked fish dip which is another delicious way to enjoy the salty groceries provided by fishing the Treasure Coast. There are a few great fish


dips out there but making your own is even better. Basic ingredients for a tasty dip are smoked fish, mayonnaise, scallions, lemon juice, Old Bay seasoning, and cream cheese. Give it a try and you'll see why!

All fishing rules and regulations plus licenses can be found at your local bait and tackle shops so stop by and support local businesses. # Favorite Recipes from Main Street Board Members





Thierry Sydné's Air Fryer Stuffed Peppers

#### Ingredients

- 3 red bell peppers
- 3 yellow bell peppers
- 1/2 pound ground turkey
- 1/2 pound sweet Italian chicken sausage
- 1 cup cooked long grain rice
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup diced onion
- 14.5 ounces canned diced tomatoes
- 4 ounces canned tomato sauce
- 2 tablespoons salt, pepper, and garlic (SPG) blend seasoning
- 1 teaspoon parsley
- 1 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

#### Instructions

Rinse and dry the bell peppers. Remove the tops, seeds, membranes, and ribs from the peppers. Cook the rice.

Add the ground turkey, chicken sausage, and onion to a large buttered skillet over medium heat. Cook and stir mixture until meat is browned through and onions have softened. Add the minced garlic and cook until fragrant.

Add in the cooked rice, diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, SP&G blend, Parmesan, red pepper flakes, and parsley. Stir to combine.

Stuff the peppers with the skillet mixture.







Arrange the peppers in the air fryer basket, leaving a bit of space between each pepper to allow for air flow.

Air fry at 360 degrees for 15 minutes or until peppers are tender. Top the peppers with mozzarella cheese at the 13 minute mark and air fry for the final 2 minutes.

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








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
