
Fall Fun!




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Fort Pierce Utilities Authority Celebrates Public Utilities Week

id you know that over four million Floridians, or about **D**19 percent of the state, receive their electric from public power providers like Fort Pierce Utilities Authority? This year, it is our hope to provide you with more information and updates about what that means. We want you, our whole community, to know that a public power provider like FPUA is more than just electricity or other services to your home or business, its existence is an investment in our shared community. An investment that stays here, in our hometown.

The value of public utilities starts with ownership. Every FPUA rate-payer is a utility owner and can influence decisions affecting our community. Because FPUA is a not-for-profit utility provider, rates are set locally in public meetings where community leaders make cost and service decisions to best serve Fort Pierce. Local officials and a board of directors govern FPUA, and a Utility Advisory Committee of citizen members provides additional public input and feedback on community engagement and more.

The core of FPUA is to provide economical and reliable utility services including electric, water, wastewater, natural gas, and fiber internet. We ensure that electricity gets to your home or business, such as for the air conditioner or lighting; that you and your family can access safe and good-tasting drinking water; and that your wastewater is properly handled and disposed of without creating environmental or public health hazards.

But serving our customers means caring for our community more broadly than that. We contribute to our community by cre-



ating jobs, supporting the local economy, volunteering, and sponsoring community-based organizations and events year-round. Just last year, FPUA employees volunteered nearly 1,000 hours supporting over 120 community activities and organizations.

This school year, FPUA volunteers joined forces with 18 community groups for "Pack the Backpack 2023" at the Fort Pierce First Church of the Nazarene. Together, staff donated school supplies and packed and distributed over 650 backpacks helping nearly 200 families get ready for the new school year. We also joined many community groups in "Tunnel of Hope" welcoming more than 1,100 students back to the new school year at St. Lucie Elementary School and F.K. Sweet Magnet School.

FPUA staff and the City of Fort Pierce work together in events and activities like: Hurricane Preparedness Housing Workshops held by the Grants Administration Division; Fort Pierce Police Department Centennial Celebration; City of Fort Pierce Great American Cleanup; the Fort Pierce Arbor Day Tree Planting Ceremony; providing updates at Coffee with the Mayor; and sponsoring the Stars Over St. Lucie Fourth of July Celebration. In December, we will once again bring holiday cheer to the Sights & Sounds on Second Street Holiday Parade and Festival.

FPUA also sponsors and supports community non-profit educational and community organizations like: Learn to Read St. Lucie County; Boys & Girls Club of St. Lucie County; Incubate Neighborhood Center; Lincoln Park Young Professionals - Rooted in Change; Village Coalition of Youth Activities; Family Meals, Inc.; Treasure Coast Food Bank;



the United Way of St. Lucie County; St. Lucie County Lil Feet, and Mustard Seed Ministries. These are just some of the groups and organizations FPUA supports throughout the year.

Environmental awareness and education programs through FPUA's Manatee Observation and Education Center (MOEC) features annual community events like the Manatee Center 5K Fun Run for Environmental Education and NatureFest. Along with its seasonal activities and special events, MOEC features a summer camp introducing campers to the beauty, adventures and creatures of the Indian River Lagoon.

October 1–7 is Public Utilities Week at FPUA! The first full week of October every year, municipal utilities and the communities that they serve celebrate Public Power Week across the nation. It's a week dedicated to helping customers and stakeholders understand how they can better engage with their community-owned utility and benefit from all its offerings.

This week is also a celebration of *Public Natural Gas Week*, dedicated to showcasing public natural gas systems and the



Ecology 101: Conservation Biology

Nonservation Biology, a relatively new field of ecology, has the overall goal of conserving natural resources and living organisms for all future generations. As an applied science,

Conservation Biology studies human activities that are adversely impacting living organisms and determines what steps can be taken to reverse their effects. To achieve this goal, scientists consider the "large picture," including the anatomy, physiology, and behavior of organisms in context of the specifics of their environment (for example, does the organism live in a forest? in a lake?). Often, Conservation Biologists work with local and federal officials,

universities, and other organizations to make the public aware of potentially harmful situations or ways to solve a particular environmental problem.

A major part of Conservation Biology is the management of biodiversity, or the total variety of organisms living on the planet. Of the estimated 1.75 million described species, the vast majority are insects (about 900,000), followed by animals (about 280,000), plants (about 240,000), and then rounded out with lesser numbers of fungal, protist, and bacterial species. So why conserve biodiversity? There are many good reasons: living organisms provide most all of the foods we eat, a wide variety of medicines, and raw materials for many consumer






products. One could also add the joy we feel when diving on a coral reef or walking through a national park.

Protecting biodiversity is not an easy task. Did you know

that many scientists believe we are in the midst of a modern extinction event? It is estimated that at least 10-20% of all species living today most likely will become extinct in the next 20 to 50 years unless planned, coordinated action is taken. The causes of these potential extinctions include habitat loss, exposure to man-made chemicals, and climate change. An endangered species is one that is on the cusp of becoming extinct throughout

its natural range. Examples of endangered species are the giant panda, Florida panther, and black rhinoceros. Threatened species are organisms likely to become endangered in the near future. Examples of threatened species are the polar bear, northern spotted owl, and African elephant. As for our Florida manatee, Trichechus manatus, it was originally listed as endangered but, in 2017, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service downgraded them to threatened. Some of the main threats to manatees are boat collisions, loss of their food supply, and becoming ensnared in fishing line or nets. It is sad to say that an estimated 1,100 manatees died in 2021, about 13% of the total Atlantic population.





The Manatee Observation and Education Center is proud to be actively contributing to the conservation of the estimated 4,300 species living in the Indian River Lagoon. Following a fundraiser in November, 2021, the Center employed scientists from Sea and Shoreline to replant seagrass along a one-mile stretch of Moore's Creek in an effort to bring native species (especially manatees) back to the waterway. Another project sponsored by the Center involves creating "living docks," where oyster shells from local restaurants are attached to plastic mats and hung on pilings in the Fort Pierce marina. These mats provide suitable habitat for young oysters to settle and grow into adults. Once the goal of 17 pilings fitted with the oyster mats is reached, an estimated 85,000 gallons of water per day will be filtered by the new oyster residents, thus improving the overall water quality and health of the lagoon.

a splash of sargassum. The painting's composition gives a hint of the surface world above in the scattered glints of sunlight, but it is the expansive, cool blues that hint at the depths below, where the sleek and majestic marlin reigns supreme.

Guy Harvey is a unique blend of artist, scientist, diver, angler, conservationist and explorer, fiercely devoted to his family and his love of the sea. Growing up in Jamaica, he spent many hours fishing and diving with his father along the Island's south coast. He was obsessed with the creatures of the sea and began drawing pictures of the many different fish he observed. By 1988 he had fully transitioned from his advanced studies in marine biology to his deep dive into painting full time.

Dr. Harvey has traveled the world to gain more knowledge of the habits and activities of marine wildlife. He became an avid scuba diver and skilled underwater photographer. He pioneered a technique of diving and photographing free-swimming billfish. His personal observations made during these diving expeditions have better enabled him to capture the detail in his paintings that contributes to the popularity of his work.

A passion for the beauty and wonder of the underwater world has driven Dr. Harvey to be a leading conservationist and advocate for the protection of our environment. He dedicates much of his talent, time and resources to programs that protect our oceans, fish population and reef systems. The Guy Harvey Research Institute at Nova Southeastern University and The Guy Harvey Foundation have taken on a leadership role in providing the scientific information necessary to understand and protect the world's fish resources and biodiversity from continued decline.

Garden Preparation

by Joanne Blandford

Gardening during late summer in South Florida can be tricky. The oppressive heat requires frequent breaks inside or in shade and the bugs can be relentless. However, relief will hopefully come this month. October is a great month to start overdue garden chores: weeding, trimming, refreshing soil, mulching, etc. It is also when you can start to plant the crops that do well during the winter months in Florida - brassicas, lettuces, cabbages, beets, carrots and other crops that prefer mild temperatures to grow.


My goal this month is to get a better grasp on organic fertilizer and understanding the signs a plant will show when it needs specific nutrients. This process reminds me of those science fair projects we were required to complete each year throughout elementary and middle school - except now I am excited to participate!

> I wish I paid more attention in my high school chemistry class. I now understand the importance of the N (nitrogen) P (phosphorus) K (potassium) ratio of fertilizers. Plants need nitrogen to create new tissues and to produce leaf foliage. They need phosphorus to produce fruit or flowers and set good root growth. Potassium is needed for the overall health and regulation of metabolic activi-

ties of the plant. Sometimes plants will need less of one of these nutrients and more of another. That is where the local Florida Agricultural Extension Office can help with soil analysis. Visit the University of Florida IFAS extension website for more information: https://sfyl.ifas.ufl.edu/.

There are many other nutrients that your plants may need, but NPK are the major players behind the success or failure of a backyard garden. It has been interesting learning that too much nitrogen given to a tomato plant may lead to great leaf growth but may also lead to low production of tomatoes; or that most bean plants can produce their own nitrogen and will not do well at first if the soil they are planted in has too much nitrogen in it.

Backyard gardening has made me appreciate the time and effort that farmers put into growing the crops that sustain our country's and the world's food supply. Be sure to support our local growers and ranchers at the downtown Fort Pierce Farmer's Market held every Saturday. It is one of longest running, most atmospheric and most successful farmer's market in the state of Florida.



November 17, 2023–January 7, 2024: Kindred Spirits: Paintings & Letters from the Kiplinger Family Collection

W. M. Kiplinger (1891-1967), a famed Washington journalist with a home on Sewall's Point in Stuart, discovered the art of A. E. Backus and befriended him in the 1950s. Despite the differences in their lives, Kiplinger found in Backus a close counterpart, and commissioned a number of significant paintings. A tireless letter writer, Kiplinger corresponded with his friend as well as with other artists he met at the Backus Studio, including a remarkable exchange with future Highwaymen artist Alfred Hair (1941-1970). This exhibition is the first public showing of these paintings and rare letters, and also includes selected works by Al Black, Walter Cole, Willie Daniels, James F. Hutchinson, Kevin Hutchinson, Therese Knowles, Roy McLendon, Harold Newton, and Sam Newton acquired by W.M. Kiplinger, and in recent years the Kiplinger Family, that honor the Backus legacy.

January 13-March 3, 2024: Fast Forward: The Original Florida Highwaymen on the Way to Fame 1954–2004

When a nineteen-year-old Harold Newton became inspired to paint the Florida landscape in 1954, his vision, courage, and accomplishments encouraged his friends and neighbors to take up paintbrushes and follow a new path as professional artists.

Over time, dozens of individuals joined the venture and unintentionally founded a movement. After more than fifty years in becoming an overnight success, the 26 landscape artists now known as The Original Highwaymen were inducted in 2004 into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. This exhibition of rarely seen paintings, gathered from private collections, celebrates their first fifty years of fame and bold course forward to the hard-won triumph of statewide recognition.



It's the Mullet Run!

ctober means it's time for the mullet run! This month local captains and area anglers will be cast netting for the abundant schools of mullet along our Treasure Coast. The arrival of the mullet in our beautiful waters is proof of even more opportunities for great fishing and a much greater chance to catch trophy fish like snook, tarpon, cobia, redfish, and kingfish.

Look for these schools on the beach, moving through the inlet, and over the grass

flats. Tarpon will hit mullet and provide a great fight but they are catch-and-release only. Since snook season is going strong, using some nice finger mullet as bait will definitely give you a fantastic opportunity to hook a photo-worthy linesider. I use a 40-pound leader with size three to five hook for best results. Be sure to keep your drag tight as snook love to run and cut the line on any nearby structure. Jack Crevalle are aggressive feeders who will also snack on

live mullet all day but don't mind artificials either.

Offshore, the kingfish bite is still good with some mahi mixed in at about 80 to 100 feet and we are still catching some nice mangrove snapper, too. The recent windy weather and passing hurricanes has made it a little challenging to get out but hopefully we see a lot of improvement this month. Mullet, threadfins, or blue runners on a slow troll are best choices to put some kings on deck. You can catch king-

fish all year with a limit of two kings per day.

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Favorite Recipes from Main Street Board Members

Vegetable Tian

Ingredients

1 Large Vidalia Onion, sliced thin 2 Tablespoons Butter 1 Tablespoon minced garlic 2 potatoes (long and thin preferred) 2 Zucchini 2 yellow squash 2-3 Roma tomatoes 1 Tablespoon Italian seasoning Olive oil ¹/₂ cup grated parmesan cheese

Instructions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Melt butter in a medium sauté pan. Add the sliced onion and garlic. Sauté on low-medium to caramelize the onions (usually takes about 30 minutes).

In a 9-inch pie pan, pour onion/ garlic in to bottom of pan. Slice potatoes, zucchini, squash, and tomatoes into slices no bigger than ¼-inch. Arrange vegetables in a circle on top of the onion mixture, alternating veggies (i.e.: tomato, potato, squash, zucchini). When finished, it should look like a snail shell.

Italian seasoning.

Cover with foil and bake for approximately 45 minutes. Remove from oven, uncover, sprinkle with cheese and return to oven for 15-20 minutes. To check for doneness, check to see that potatoes are cooked. Enjoy!
