



Mayor's Message Highwaymen Museum First Look

n July 8, 1234 Avenue D was the place to be in Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County. The community turned out in great numbers to get a "first look" at the newly-renovated Jackie Caynon Building, transforming it into the first museum devoted to *Florida's Highwaymen*.

The *Highwaymen* landscape school of art was born in Fort Pierce at Lincoln Park Academy, a racially-segregated all-black high school with a history of excellence, located in what is now the Means Court Center, at 13th and Avenue E. Zanobia Jefferson, Chicago born high-achiever art teacher, recognized talent in her student, Alfred Hair. She asked her friend, A.E. "Beanie" Backus, Fort Pierce-born landscape artist to mentor Hair. Hair and a collection of other African American young men (and one woman) began to paint landscapes at high-speed, and sell them from their vehicles by the side of the road, many when they were still wet. Tourists and residents alike bought their paintings, colorful, vivid, and portraying the essence of Florida's natural tropical beauty.

Eventually the group were dubbed the original Florida *Highwaymen* and in 2004, 26 original *Highwaymen* (including one woman) were inducted into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. Since then, the Smithsonian and the African American History and Cultural Museum have recognized their importance.

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Many of the 26 have since passed, but new generations of *Highwaymen*-type painters are thriving today.

Although much discussed through the years, a museum for the *Highwaymen* remained elusive until recently when the building, renovated by the Fort Pierce Redevelopment Agency (FPRA), was retrofitted as a museum for *Highwaymen*. State grant



funds have helped turn the former headquarters of the *Lincoln Park Main Street* into a museum, which hosted its first public viewing July 8.

The evening was a great success. Doretha Hair Truesdell, widowed when Alfred Hair was killed in 1960, has worked tirelessly with the new *Highwaymen Museum* Board of Directors to get the museum off to a good start. The *Highwaymen* have an opportunity to have their own license plate, the proceeds of which will help fund the museum. Many more license plates must be sold before October of 2022. 2nd Street Art is proud to host the *Fort Pierce Art Club*, which was founded by the famed landscape artist, A.E. Backus, in 1955. They also represent 2nd generation *Highwaymen* legacy artist Michael Love, whose uncle and mentor is Al Black. Another *Highwayman*, Willie Daniels, also served as an influential art instructor. Resident Artist Paul Gottardo is a Beanie Brat who — as a youngster — learned art at the knee

of Backus. The gallery also represents Anita Prentice who is affectionately named "The Bench Lady" as she is the creator of countless mosaic benches and public art throughout the Treasure Coast and at *Heathcote Botanical Gardens*. She also

Artist Ginny Piech Street — one of which is stationed in front of the historic **Fort Pierce City Hall**.


Established in October, 2020, 2nd Street Art is the proud recipient of the Chamber of Commerce's 2021 B&I People's Choice for Small Business Retail Award. They are currently in contention for TC Palm's Best of the Best competition as a Specialty Shop, which voting remains ongoing.

Most notable about the gallery is that many of its resident artists are pursuing a professional art

career in midlife and retirement. Their former professions include Fed Ex delivery, EMT, police officer, chef, nurse, teachers, Naval Officer, etc. Current professions include pilot, tree service, grocery retail, and others.

2nd Street Art prides itself as being more than just an art gallery. It is a meeting place where folks can visit and be warmly welcomed as family, a place where friends old and new can take a break from everyday life and find camaraderie. It's a haven for human connection. �




Dog Days of Summer



















Community Celebrations



You've probably heard the expression about 'the dog days of summer, but did you know they're a real thing and actually have a history? According to National Geographic, the Ancient Greeks noticed that Sirus—which they dubbed

the "dog star" as it is the brightest star in the constellation Canis Major—appeared to rise alongside the sun in late July. They believed the combined power of the stars is what made this the hottest time of year—a time when dogs and humans could be driven mad by the heat.

Floridians know a thing or two about heat and humidity, and we've learned how to turn the dog days of summer into a time of relaxation, enjoyment, and evenings filled with great music. *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* offers an assortment of live music every single week throughout St. Lucie County—even during the dog days of summer.

Every other Tuesday, you can find fabulous sunsets and music at the **Fort Pierce Yacht Club**, at 700 Indian River Drive, just at the base of the beautiful bridge that carries us over to Hutchinson Island? You don't have to be a member to enjoy great live music and a full bar every other Tuesday (almost) throughout the summer and fall. You can join the fun every on Tuesdays through November (August 9th and 23rd, September

13th and 27th, and October 11th and 25th) from 7–9:30 p.m. and the cover charge is only \$10 (\$8 if you're a member).

Almost every other Wednesday, you can enjoy live music and even sit in with the pros and jam at the **Port St. Lucie Botanical**

Gardens, on Westmoreland Boulevard in Port St. Lucie. The professional musicians from *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* will be on hand from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. every other Wednesday throughout the summer and fall months. For just \$7 (\$6 if you're a member of *Fort Pierce Jazz*

and Blues Society), you can enjoy live music and maybe even grab the mic or take a seat at the keyboard or drums and impress the crowd with your own musical prowess. It's a fun evening twice each month through the end of October (August 10th and 24th, September 7th and 21st, and October 5th and 19th).

If you'd prefer your music with a side of dinner, the dog days of summer are the time to pop on into **2nd Street Bistro Tap House and Eatery**, where *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society*provides with live music on the last Thursday of each month through October (August 25th, September 29th, and October 27th) from 6:30 to 9 p.m. You can sit inside or out, and no one is going to raise an eyebrow if you end up using your French fry or even your fork as a drumstick to help you keep the beat or tap on the cymbal that looks suspiciously like your beer mug.

The dog days of summer may have dogs panting and snowbirds firmly planted in the cooler Northern climes, but any Floridian worth his sweet tea knows that the dogs days are a great time for fun, sunshine, cool briny breezes, and fabulous music, and *Fort Pierce Jazz and Blues Society* has you covered. 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TREASURES OF THE PAST

100 years ago this month as reported in the Friday, August 11, 1922 edition of the Tampa Tribune

Building OperationsLarge

Summer building work in Fort Pierce continues at a good pace, and with the recent announcement of the awarding of a contract for additions and improvements to the New Fort Pierce hotel the volume of new work received quite a boost. Contract be shortly awarded also, it is expected, for construction of the new \$150,000 business and theater building recently announced by Messrs, Koblegard and Minschel.

In practically every section of town new work is under way. A large number of residences are going up, while other are planned for summer construction. In the business district the Holtsberg building, which is being enlarged and improved, is coming along at a good pace, while work on the new Rirou three-store building is more than half completed.

That Fort Pierce is growing and expanding steadily and continually is very evident.

Giving the main street a sureenough "citified" feature, a new automobile agency and display room has been opened up on Pine street (current 2nd Street) in the room formerly occupied by Baker and Company, in the Faber building. 100 years ago this month as reported in the Friday, August 11, 1922 edition of the Tampa Tribune

Photographic History of Town

H.E. Hill, head of the Florida Photographic Concern, from photographs which he has made of Fort Pierce scenes and Fort Pierce people during the past quarter of a century, has prepared a remarkable collection of stereopticon slides that give a graphic story of the history and development of the town from the days when it was but a tiny little village up to the present. Among them is a scene which show the present main business section as nothing but a stretch of unoccupied ground. Pictures of many of the prominent men of town when they were only barefooted kids are included among the lot.

Mr. Hill proposes to offer his collection, numbering 150 slides, as a gift to the Woman's Club, and it is quite likely that the whole will be exhibited to the people of the town at an early date.

French Cannons' Salvor Approves New Location

Shelton Green feels the new City Hall is a "fitting place" for the old French warship cannons he helped salvage from the Atlantic in 1928.

"I think that's the best place, I mean they are the city's," said Green, who missed the massive moving operation by city crews because of ill health.

"I wouldn't like to see them destroyed; most of them have decomposed and lots are in bad shape," he said.

The two were among 21 cannons and six huge anchors that were scattered along the ocean bottom in about 12 feet of water about one-half mile north of Pebble Park.

Several of the cannons and an anchor can be found at the entrance to Fort Pierce Park.

Green, who is now 68, was working for a salvage firm that was contracted by the city to bring up the remains of the wrecked French ship which legend says crashed during a violent storm in 1565.

Green's job in the salvage operation was to dive in nude and hook up to the grappling hooks once the items were located.

Why nude? "They had those diving suits, then but they weren't worth anything," he explained.

Among the salvage crew were Fort Pierce Mayor Denis Summerlin's brothers, Rube and Dick.

Mayor Summerlin voted at the City Commission meeting Monday night to have the cannons moved to in front of the new City Hall instead of the St. Lucie County Museum.

Thursday, workmen used a big crane to lift the massive iron pierces from their foundations onto a flatbed truck for the short trip to the new City Hall.

The work crew encountered no Spanish ships, and all wore clothes.

In his article, Progress sounds sweet downtown, David Seaton writes of the numerous projects underway in downtown Fort Pierce. These projects included:

- \$1 million road and sidewalk improvement on Avenue A and Melody Lane. Along with a traffic circle at Avenue A and Indian River Drive
- \$2 million Harbor Federal office building a drive-thru on North Indian River Drive
- \$340,000 restoration of Tickle Tummy Bridge on Second Street which will provide another entrance to downtown Fort Pierce and flow through traffic
- \$1.7 million Public Defender's building on Second Street

A quote from Dick Coke, owner of the downtown business – Coke's Stationers, was especially poignant. "There is going to be more happening in the next year and a half than in the

20-some years I've been here," said Coke. "It really is the culmination of eight or nine years of work to get to this point."

The article also listed these projects that were in design phases:

- \$2.5 million county library to be built at Orange Avenue & Melody Lane
- \$12 million federal courthouse to be built on corner of Orange Avenue and U.S.1
- Renovation of the Historic Sunrise Theatre

The article mentioned the construction was part of the master revitalization plan that was developed by community focus groups the prior year. (An updated master plan is in the works currently – more information can be found at https://smeinc.mysocialpinpoint.com/fort-pierce-downtown-master-plan/)

Other local business owners quoted in the article were Larry Lee, president of Fort Pierce Investors, Inc. and Ed Fisher, president of the Downtown Merchant's Association and owner of Fun Time Cruise and Travel.

Lee was quoted as saying "I've never seen so much excitement and enthusiasm. There's stuff happening all over."

Fisher remarked on the temporary inconvenience of the blocked roads for the construction of the roundabout at Avenue A (Marina Way) and Indian River Drive. "It's just one of those things that we all know we'll be better off in the end. It's just a matter of waiting it out."



Busy Waters

This is a busy time on our local waters and for good reason! ▲ We live in a fishing paradise. Last month was the always popular Red Snapper season, only two days this year, July 8th & 9th. Anglers of all ages enjoy catching this excellent tasting fish. The end of July also saw the highly anticipated lobster mini-season, July 27th & 28th. Boat activity greatly increased with divers that chose Fort Pierce and our great inlet as their diving destination.


August sees the start of regular lobster season so we can expect boat traffic to remain busy. Many anglers are also divers and our local reefs attract great numbers of divers from across the state trying their best to catch their limit of "bugs." This is the time for non-diving anglers to trade some scales for tails and let the seafood fest begin!

With lots of bait in the area like threadfins and pilchards, the offshore action is going strong. We are consistently pulling in mahi, kingfish, amberjack, and sails. Slow trolling live bait around weed lines can usually produce good results. Fresh ballyhoo, naked or skirted, is best for dolphin. Snapper can be found on reefs at about 50-100 feet. I like to use a chum bag and throw some cut bait to stir up these aggressive feeders. It's key to use enough weight to keep your bait on bottom and provide your best chance at landing mangroves, lanes, and muttons.

Smoked Armadillo Eggs

Ingredients


- 6 jalapenos
- 4 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 cup of shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 lb. ground sausage
- 12 slices of bacon

Instructions


- 1. Start smoker and set it to 250 degrees F.
- 2. Cut the tops of the jalapenos off and core the pepper to remove the seeds and membrane.
- 3. In a small bowl cream together the cream cheese, grated cheddar cheese and garlic powder.
- 4. Fill the cored jalapenos with cream cheese mixture.
- 5. Take 1/6 of the sausage meat and wrap it around the pepper making sure that none of the pepper is visible. Form it so it's evenly coating the pepper. Wrap two pieces of bacon around each one.
- 6. Place the armadillo eggs on smoker rack in preheated smoker. Smoke for about 2 hours. These are done when the internal temperature of the sausage is 160 degrees F.
- 7. To crisp up the bacon turn up smoker to about 400 degrees and cook for an additional 2–3 minutes or place on a baking sheet and broil them until the bacon is crisp in the oven.








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
